ASHLAND WINS.

Under the Charter the City May Decide Whether Saloons May Be Licensed.

The Oregon supreme court at Salem, has rendered two very important decisions.

In what is known as the Ashland saloon cases, that of Jessie Houck and Joseph Dame, appellants, versus the City of Ashland, respondent, the supreme court affirmed the decision of the circuit court of Jackson county, in upholding the authority of the city of Ashland under its charter to decide whether or not liquor saloons may be licensed. The opinion was given by Chief Justice Bean.

This was the test of one of the well known Ashland saloon cases, in which the appellants were convicted in Justice Berry's court of the city of Ashland, upon the charge of selling intoxicating liquor within the city limits of Ashland without a license, and were sentenced to pay a fine by the recorder for a violation of the city ordinance. From the judgment of this conviction the appellants sued out a writ of review to the circuit court of Jackson county, and upon a hearing thereon Judge H K Hanna sustained the decision of Justice Milton Berry.

STRANGE EFFECT OF OIL DRILLING.

News comes from Idaho of a most remarkable strike by the Riverside Oil Co, while drilling for petroleum at their plant one mile east of Volcano Springs. At a depth of five hundred feet the bit penetrated a subterranean volcano which released a column of steam, hot mud and molten rock that shot into the air for a height of over one hundred feet. The drilling outfit was wrecked but fortunately no one operating the rig was injured. The location is now a miniature volcano, hurling steam, mud and molten stuff high into the air, the roaring noise from which can be heard for over a mile distant. Operations have been entirely abandoned, and the hole is constantly enlarging and fears are entertained that the well may turn into a volcano of large proportions. Boulders of a large size have been hurled hundreds of feet by the subterranean disturbance. The locality is on the edge of the well-known Salton Basin.

The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company is building fourteen miles of line in Pennsylvania, which is believed to be the crookedest railroad in the United States. This little road will extend from Boswell, Pa, to Friedens on the Somerset and Cambria branch of the Baltimore and Ohio. The air-line distance is about five miles but the peculiar configuration of the country makes it necessary to loop a number of hills in order to get an easy grade. The new road doubles on itself four times and at one point after making a loop of about five miles the road comes back to within three hundred feet of itself on a grade fifty feet lower.

Again the United States has had to take charge of the transportation facilities across the Isthmus of Darien. The first thought of revolutionists down there seems to be to destroy the only valuable piece of property in that country. But this country will not allow it. Our interests there are infinitely greater than those of the mongrel Spaniards who inhabit the country. The world can get along without them. It cannot fairly get along without the isthmus transportation facilities.
