

THE MESSAGE.

President Roosevelt is verbose. His message of near twenty thousand words is much above the ordinary. Still a considerable part, the introductory, is devoted to his predecessor and the lamentable circumstance by which he lost life. One cannot but be struck by the thought that the president draws the incident out too fine, realizing that his elevation to the high office the result of accident, and seeks support by appealing to the sympathies of the people. President Roosevelt cannot have failed to make a careful study of the rocks upon which his vice-presidential predecessors in the high office struck and met political shipwreck.

He steers about the burning question of trusts with great caution, giving due consideration to modern commercial methods whereby products may be cheapened by manufacturing combinations, if rightly conducted, yet on the other hand may be made oppressive and a means by which to rob the producer of his just earnings. The recommendation that these great combinations be compelled to give full publicity to their affairs, capitalization, actual investments, earnings, dividends etc will meet the approval of everybody, except the holders of the watered trust stocks.

CHINESE EXCLUSION.
President Roosevelt is entitled to the special gratitude of Pacific Coast people by reason of his recommendation that the Chinese exclusion law, about to expire through limitation, be re-enacted. The Chinaman is not wanted in this country, and while there is no difference in sentiment on this side, the east is careless and indifferent. It needed the recommendation of the chief executive to make sure of the eastern support necessary to re-enactment of the law.

GEER AND THE RAILROAD TRUST.

T. T. Geer, the Shanghai governor of Oregon, is a typical Hanna statesman, who is a worse toady than ever since his head has swelled by a stumping tour through the state of the great boss. While there he distinguished himself by saying that "the democrats are worse than trusts," evidently meaning to compliment the democracy, when his high opinion of the trusts is fully understood.

In a recent letter to the Spokane Spokesman-Review, this freak statesman said:

"Looked at above the surface it seems that the combination of railway lines could work no injury in any way unless it should be followed by an increase of passenger or freight rates, or both. At this time, I think, it cannot be said that this has followed such action in the past or is likely to in the future. But if it should, the courts have decided that the power rests with the state governments and it has been exercised many times. My opinion is that much of the consolidation of capital for various purposes has been used frequently for a scarecrow and that it is not, as yet, necessarily a menace."

Thus we have the chief executive of a great state arguing in favor of, or at least condoning, the organization of a gigantic railroad trust which is designed to and absolutely blots out all competition, and places the people of the entire Northwest at its mercy in the matter of freights and fares. Such a man is unworthy of the high official position he holds, while the accident that placed him there was a misfortune to the people of Oregon.

TAKES ISSUE WITH THE PRESIDENT.

The Telegram says "the creation of great corporate fortunes has not been due to the tariff or any other governmental action." As to some cases, he is clearly mistaken. Carnegie's fortune, for example, was due largely and directly to the tariff. Stanford's was due to "governmental action." Instances might be multiplied.

Nicaragua route is made with the object of forcing more favorable and reasonable terms from the owners of the Panama concession.

Apart from a gain of one to two days time for shipping that will go over the respective routes Panama has every advantage. Only 49 miles against Nicaragua's 183. Twelve hours for passing through against thirty-three for the other. Fair harbors at either end while there are neither in Nicaragua. And the Panama ditch could be operated \$1,350,000 cheaper a year. It would appear that an estimated saving of about fifty millions in the construction of the Nicaragua route would be poor economy.

When the MS chart of this region was being constructed on board the ship Herald, attention was drawn to the fact that this point had no name, and a mark (?) Name) was placed against it. In the hurry of dispatching this chart from the ship this ? appears to have been inked in by a rough draughtsman and appeared as Cape Nome, but the stroke of the "a" being very indistinct, it was interpreted by our draughtsman here as C. Nome, and has appeared with this name ever since. This information is from an officer who was on board the Herald when the chart was being constructed.

Women need education extended to all practical affairs of life. An instance of a sad result from lack of practical education comes from The Dalles. A young matron entered a cigar store in that city the other day on some errand, and while waiting before the counter pressed the end of a finger in one of the nickel plated cigar-end cutters. A terrible drain, not counting the loss experienced through the enforced idleness of hundreds of thousands of men in the best years of their manhood.

Good for President Roosevelt! He stands with the Pacific Coast for Chinese exclusion. These are his words: "I regard it as necessary to re-enact immediately the law excluding Chinese laborers and to strengthen it wherever necessary in order to make it effective." There is no uncertainty about that utterance.

A singular Southern Pacific railroad wreck took place on the headwaters of the Sacramento river the other day. While rounding a curve seven cars went out of the middle of a freight train into the river. Neither end of the train received damage, though five hundred feet of track was torn up.
