\$10,007 RAISED.

Enough to Erect the Y. M. C. A. Building.

33000 MORE WANTED.

As announced in yesterday's GUARD, a meeting of a committee on the proposed new Y M C A building at the U O, consisting of W O Ziegler, P E Snodgrass and R McMurphy, was held with President Strong and Stuart Hanna at the First National bank last evening.

Mr Hanna made a report on the amount of pledges for the building, which is \$10,007 to date, enough to erect the building, but a total of about \$13,000 is wanted, the \$3,000 to go toward purchasing a lot and equipping and furnishing the building.

President Strong last evening, immediately after the meeting, told a reporter that he and Mr Hanna met with very good success with their recent canvass in Portland, securing two subscriptions of \$500 each from Hon H W Corbett and W S Ladd besides other good sums. He stated that the people of the metropolis were very willing to subscribe to the fund notwithstanding the fact that they all had just made big subscriptions to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition fund.

Mr Hanna this morning informed us that a site for the building has not yet been decided upon but it will be in close proximity to the U O campus. It will be remembered that the board of regents decided not to allow the building to be erected on the campus. He stated that the work of construction might commence by next June, but nothing definite along that line is assured.

Of the \$10,007 raised, the students of the U O pledged \$2,700; the faculty \$1,500, the citizens of Eugene \$2,500 and the remainder was raised in Portland and elsewhere.

JUDGE FISK DEAD.

Expired Suddenly Near Mapleton Monday Night.

WILL BE BURIED HERE.

This morning at 7 o'clock a special messenger brought to Eugene the sad news of the sudden death of Judge A H Fisk which occurred Monday night at his ranch on Knowles creek near Mapleton. His son, Fred Fisk, deputy sheriff, was immediately notified of his death and arrangements were at once made to bring the body here for burial.

About 10 o'clock this forenoon Harry Graham, of the Kays undertaking parlors, and B D Paine left in one of E Baag's rigs after the body and will probably meet it on the road, as Mr Fisk has a son living near Mapleton, and it is probable that he has started out with the remains. If not, it will be Saturday before they arrive here.

The cause of death is supposed to be heart trouble, but it is not known that he suffered to any great extent from that complaint. The circumstances leading to his death as far as obtainable are as follows: A H Emerson and family, who live a few rods from Mr Fisk's house, spent Monday evening with him. When they left he appeared to feel very well. The next morning George Fisk, his grandson, who had been staying with him but who had been away for a few days, upon returning found Mr Fisk dead in his chair, sitting as when Mr Emerson and family left him the night before.

The deceased gentleman had been in ill health for several years past, but had been improving lately, and only a few days ago his son, Fred, received a letter from him stating that he felt much better and that he intended to come to Eugene about Christmas time and spoke of his intention of going East in the spring.

Alva Henry Fisk was born at Northfield, Vermont, Oct 28 1833. He was married to Jane A Henry at Concord, New Hampshire, July 6, 1853. Three children, A H Fisk, of Mapleton, W E Fisk, of Eugene, and Ceila (now deceased) were born to them. The first wife died in January, 1867, and he married Elizabeth S Emerson at Concord, N H, Sept 2, 1867, two children, Fred and Mamie J, both of Eugene, being the issue of this marriage, the mother and children surviving. From the New England states Mr Fisk moved with his family to Illinois, thence to Iowa and Nebraska and came to Eugene in 1888. He was elected county judge in 1892 and served the people well and faithfully one term of four years. When he went into office the county was about \$160,000 in debt and when his term expired the debt had been reduced to practically nothing. The deceased was also instrumental in inaugurating the present system of good road building in the county. Several positions of trust were also held by Fisk in the states in which he resided before coming to Oregon.

Judge Fisk had been a prominent Mason for 30 years or more and a good and true citizen. He was extremely fond of nature and spent a part of each year in the mountains hunting and fishing. About a year ago he went to the lower Snake country and found a sulphur spring on Knowles creek, the waters of which seemed to benefit his health. He took up a claim on which the spring is situated, built him a cabin and has lived there ever since.

Mr Fisk had led an active business life and was one of the partners in the Frank department store on Ninth street when it was first started. Besides his property in Eugene he leaves interests in Nebraska and Colorado.

Word was brought to Eugene Thursday night by the Sinclair stage driver that the body was to have been buried at Acme that day by H H Fisk, son of the deceased.

"At Happy Camp, Vernon went a step further and bought a horse, giving a check on a Portland bank in payment therefor. The check proved worthless and officers are now camping on Vernon's trail. A warrant for his arrest had arrived here just prior to his departure and the moment the sheriff was looking around town for the elusive gentleman, the latter was borrowing a saddle from a stable of the sheriff."
