WALLA WALLA INQUIRY.

BIG RANCH SALE.

Lester Swaggart Disposed of His Place to David Elliott.

Lester Swaggart, of Pendleton, on New Year's day sold his ranch of 715 acres near Goshen, south of Eugene, to David Elliott, of that section, for \$5000. Included in the sale were 75 head of Angora goats at \$5 per head. Mr Elliott is a cattleman, but intends to experiment with Angora goats until he is satisfied from his own experience whether or not there is a profit in that kind of stock sufficient to justify him in engaging in the business on an extensive scale.

During the summer of 1901 Mr Swaggart bought 100 Angora goats for \$5 a head and placed them on his Goshen ranch. They became diseased and he sold 50 of them at \$4 a piece. In the meantime about 60 kids had been born, and this sale closes out the lot.

THE DUNN STORE.

Great Improvements to Be Made Immediately.

FINEST IN THE VALLEY.

Daily Guard Jan 6
F E Dunn, the well known merchant, today gave a GUARD reporter an outline of extensive improvements which are to be made on his store building immediately. When these improvements are completed the store will be the finest in the valley, one which Portland or any other city of like size would be proud of. W T Campbell has been engaged as architect for these improvements and he and Mr Dunn will leave in a few days for San Francisco to purchase material for the work to be done.

To begin with, the building will be extended 35 feet back to Park street, making a new addition of 35x55 feet and two stories high. The present Willamette street front will be placed in the rear, facing Park street, giving a double entrance. The stairway will be taken out and a smaller one built next to the Marx building, and the finest front in the city will be put in, with only one big entrance instead of two at present. A stairway will be built at the Park street front.

The building will be entirely remodeled inside. With the new addition, and with the present big stairway taken out there will be 7235 square feet of floor room, making it by far the largest store in the city. New shelving, new glass hat cases, new glass counters, cloak rooms, ladies' and gentlemen's dressing rooms, closets, numerous mirrors and a cash carrier system are among the new improvements to be put in. A basement is also included in the list of improvements with a hot water heating plant. A part of the second story will also be used for storing purposes.

When this work is finished Eugene can boast of as fine a store as can be found on the coast, and Mr Dunn is to be congratulated on his enterprise in making these improvements.

VERNON BROUGHT BACK.

The Forger of Checks is Here Again.

CUGHT IN NORTHERN CALIFORNIA.

Sheriff W W Withers arrived home from California Sunday morning, having in charge George Vernon, the violinist, who passed worthless checks on two Lane county men.
The charge on which Vernon was arrested is forgery. On November 2nd, 1901, while in Springfield, he gave a check to Merchant J W Stewart for \$31.10, drawn on the First National Bank of Portland, with the name of Geo A Melton signed to it. The day previous he gave a check for \$10, signed by himself, on the same bank to W S Leonard, of Coburg. When they were presented in Eugene for collection shortly afterward it was found that they were worthless and that the one given to Mr Stewart was a forgery. In the meantime Vernon had left for points south, leaving the next night after giving the check to Mr Stewart. A warrant was sworn out for his arrest and Sheriff Withers notified all the officers between here and San Francisco that Vernon was wanted. Nothing was heard from him until several weeks afterward when it was learned that he was operating at Grants Pass in about the same manner as he did here. He engaged a horse in that town and set out over the mountains for California, leaving the horse by the wayside and proceeding on in some other manner. The officers in that section gave chase and captured him in the mountains a short distance beyond the state line. He was taken to Yreka and Sheriff Withers was notified of his capture. Mr Withers secured regulation papers from Gov Geer, immediately left for Sacramento to get the necessary papers signed by the California executive, came back up to Yreka, secured his prisoner and left for home. Mr Withers made a short trip to San Francisco while gone and reports everything in the Bay City lively and on the jump.

SOUND OVER.

Vernon was taken before Justice Wintermeier today where he pleaded guilty to two charges, that of obtaining money under false pretenses and of forgery, and was bound over to appear at the next term of circuit court. Failing to give bonds, he was remanded back to jail.

MARRIED.—At the residence of Frank E Henderson, in Cottage Grove January 5, 1902, Wm Fernman and Miss Nellie Berry were united in marriage, J W Vaughn, justice of the peace, officiating. The contracting parties are both well known in Eugene.

BLUE RIVER MINES.

Still Working on Rich Ore at Lucky Boy.

NO SNOW AT THE MINES.

C H Park, the mining capitalist, is just down from the Blue River mines. He states that he has a good force of men at work on his Treasure mine and the tunnel has been run in to a distance of 300 feet and still progressing. The tunnel is at a depth of 275 feet. Mr Park expects to keep his men at work all winter, the weather not being severe enough to check operations. There is no snow at the mines, Mr Park says, only a little on the highest points of the mountains. The winter has been an excellent one for work so far and it is hoped will continue as it has been.

The Lucky Boy owners are still working on the rich ore uncovered in the great strike made recently and the tunnel has been extended to the granitic above. This was one of the richest strikes ever made in Oregon.

Died.

Betsy, wife of George W Whitsett, died at Prineville, Oregon, January 1st, 1902, aged 36 years. Betsy Harlow was married to Geo W Whitsett in Missouri in 1871; came to Lane county in 1875, locating near Cottage Grove, where they resided until October of last year when they moved to Prineville.

Mrs Whitsett was the mother of 14 children, 13 of whom survive her, the oldest daughter having died at the age of two years. All the living children were at her bedside during the last illness. She lingered nine weeks, at times rallying and giving hope for recovery.

On the evening of the last day of the old year she awoke from slumber and said, "I have been over the river; I am going soon. Don't be alarmed about me, I am all right." Then fell asleep, not to awake in this world.

The funeral was held from the Methodist church, Rev W C Clark, pastor, preaching the funeral sermon.

NEW PUMPING SHOP.—Will M Morrow, formerly of Baker City, but more recently from Spokane, has leased the building now occupied by a barber shop at 419 Willamette street, just north of the new McClung block, and will about the 15th of this month, open a plumbing and tin shop. Mr Morrow has moved his family to Eugene and have taken up their residence at East Twelfth and Alder streets.

DIFFICULT OPERATION.—Dr T W Harris, assisted by Drs F W Prentice and J W Harris, the other day performed a very difficult operation upon John Ogle, of Junction City, but who is now in Eugene. He was suffering from a large abscess around the liver and it was necessary to take sections out of two ribs to remove it, which was very successfully done. The patient is resting easily now.
