Passenger Lists Show Seventy-Three Persons Missing.

COLLIDING SHIP UNKNOWN.

MEMORIAL WINDOWS

In Memory of Charnel Mulligan and Eugene Skinner.

ARRIVED FROM PORTLAND.

Dear Guard, Jan 4
D. L. Perry, of the Perry Bros. Glass Co. of Portland, arrived in Eugene last night with the two memorial windows in memory of the late Charnel Mulligan and Eugene F. Skinner, ordered by the county commissioners' court in February, 1900, to be placed in the courthouse. On account of the great delay in receiving them the present court was in doubt whether or not to accept them but this afternoon decided to do so and pay the manufacturers the price called for in the old contract, viz. \$400.

The windows, which are the finest on the coast were hailed from the depot to the courthouse this afternoon and Mr. Perry is superintending the work of putting them in. They are being placed in the west end of the courtroom, the Mulligan window south of the judge's bench and the Skinner window north of it.

A reporter who saw the windows by Mr. Perry when they were being unloaded this afternoon. They are 10 feet high by 4 feet, 11 inches wide and are extremely beautiful in design. At the top of each is worked the seal of Oregon and the words "County of Lane" across the top. In the center of the Mulligan window worked in a large scroll is the inscription: "In memory of Charnel Mulligan, who died June 22, 1900, at the city of Eugene, Oregon." In the center of the Skinner window is worked: "Eugene F. Skinner, the founder of the city of Eugene and the donor of forty acres of land now in the city of Eugene. It was from him the city was named."

The setting in the windows was burned into the glass and is a splendid piece of work. The style of the windows is harmonious, in keeping with the architecture of the building. They are fitting memorials to the memory of the old pioneers who have done so much for the city and county.

MCKENZIE HATCHERY

Fish Warden Van Dusen Writes Upon the Subject.

SEVERAL ADVANTAGEOUS SITES.

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 30, 1901.

EDITOR GUARD, Eugene, Ore.:
DEAR SIR:—It is my pleasure to reply to your favor asking that I inform you of the locality selected for the McKenzie river salmon hatchery on my recent trip to that stream, also as to how the site compared with others in the state, and when the hatchery is expected to be put in, etc. I beg to state that as yet, no particular situation has been definitely settled upon. The river I examined quite thoroughly up as far as the McKenzie Bridge and was very much pleased with its conditions generally. It is a splendid stream of water and is apparently a natural spawning ground for the Chinook and Steelhead variety of salmon from near its mouth to its source. It affords a great many desirable situations for our work, any one of which could be put into first-class shape at a very small expense.

I found the river being used to a considerable extent for logging purposes along the banks of the lower river. This of course will interfere with work that we are desirous of doing there, but at the same time it is not a serious matter for us to contend with and there is no reason why we should not do well enough by going in up above where this logging is being so extensively carried on. The further up the river we go I know the fewer salmon we will have to handle for hatchery purposes, but in a case as this I feel that it is far better for us to have the few and a sure proposition, than to have a proposition where we are liable to lose our entire batch of fish at almost any time and of which one day's loss means the entire season's loss, for when a batch of salmon goes away from you that ends the situation entirely for that season.

The most desirable situations that I have noted on the upper waters, were at Gate Creek, Blue River, the Mason place and near the Finn hotel.

GATE CREEK.

This situation is about half a mile above the mouth of Gate creek. Here I found, on the Thompson place, a very desirable spring of water, which is very essential in the matter of maintaining a hatchery establishment, and one that is very seldom found on rivers, so this, in such close proximity to a desirable fishing ground. The river at this place is a very pretty piece of river for our work and one that could be reached and fished at not a very great expense. It is quite large and in consequence would require quite an extensive set of racks in order to reach it properly, but lumber is not expensive and if we would get a good supply of salmon the amount of making that we would have to do would not be felt very materially in the matter.

BLUE RIVER.

Just above the mouth of Blue river I found another very desirable piece of fishing ground at the head of an island that divides the river almost equally. This I found to be one of the prettiest pieces of fishing grounds that one ever runs across, and a piece that could be reached and fished at no great expense, but there I found no side stream or spring with which to supply a set of hatchery buildings, and if we were to go in into this situation we would have to contend with the matter of getting a water supply for hatchery purposes out of the main river. This would be easily done at a very great expense, for the river flows quite rapidly from this piece of fishing ground for half a mile or more, and from a mental observation of the situation, I would say, that one would not have to go more than a quarter of a mile up the river in order to take the water at a sufficient elevation to meet all requirements.

THE MASON PLACE.

The situation at the Mason place I found to be very similar to that at Gate creek, there I found a very desirable side stream of water which would furnish a hatchery plant with an abundant supply of the purest spring water and this was also directly at and adjacent to a most desirable piece of river for fishing purposes.

THE FINN HOTEL.

This situation is about half a mile below the hotel. There I also found a good side stream of water for a water supply and a set of grounds similar to the Blue River situation, though they do not offer quite the advantages.

The river above Blue River affords several other desirable situations but owing equal to those mentioned and as I prefer not to get too far up I

would recommend one of these others in preference to anything above.

As regards our contemplated work there on the river I beg to state that another year, we will test the river thoroughly with a set of racks that we will put in and determine if possible what the river is really equal to, but of course we cannot expect too much of a river situated as this is, while we have the obstructions to contend with that we have in the Willamette at the Willamette falls; but with a good passage way provided for salmon up and over this set of falls, I have no hesitancy in saying that the McKenzie river would supply salmon enough for us to maintain a salmon hatchery plant second to none in the state.

As regards the matter of providing such a passage way for salmon up over these falls, I desire to state that I have examined the situation to some extent and find nothing very serious to contend with, and feel that a good and sufficient way could be provided at not a very great expense and one that would be permanent, by blasting a set of channels and cuts up through the rocks, and can see no reason whatever for its not being taken up and provided for by our next legislature.

MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE.

Number of Marriage Licenses and Divorces in 1901.

FEWER DIVORCES THAN LAST YEAR.

The record of marriage in Lane county for 1901 has been a record breaker, compared with former years. This, of course, is due to the increase in population. Since the first of January, 1901, there have been 195 marriage licenses issued by the county clerk, against 187 for 1900, showing a gain of 8, to say nothing of the Lane county people who were married in other counties.

By the records it is seen that October was the most popular month for marriage in 1901, there being 38 licenses issued during that month. December came next with 34. The least number granted was in November, with only 8. Following is the number granted by months: January, 15; February, 10; March, 14; April, 16; May, 10; June, 20; July, 15; August, 18; September, 20; October, 38; November, 8; December, 34.

The first license was granted on Jan. 7th to J. L. Rensinger and Miss Irene Spores and the last on December 31st to Hiram E. Wood and Miss Phyllis R. Wilson.

DIVORCE.

Although the marriage record was greater than the previous year, the divorce record is not so large as it was in 1900, only 23 divorces were granted against 33 for 1900. The majority of the divorce suits instituted are by the wives, and in almost every case the allegations are cruel treatment and failing to provide.
