LANE COUNTY TAX LEVY.

Increase for State and School Purposes.

Some inquiry has been made of the GUARD as to the cause of the increase in the Lane county tax levy from 23 mills for 1900 to 24 mills for 1901, the present tax year. The tax is practically the same for county purposes as it was last year, the decrease being one-tenth of a mill on the dollar. The state levy is two mills higher than last year and the levy for roads and bridges six-tenths of a mill higher, leaving the levy for county and school purposes 21 3-10 mills this year against 22 mills last year, a decrease of one-tenth of a mill.

TOOK AN OVERDOSE DIED OF HEART DISEASE.

Richard McGovern Thought He Was Going to Die.

Frank P. White Expired Suddenly in Baker County.

SWALLOWED STRYCHNINE. Daily Guard Jan 9. Last night about 10 o'clock Policeman Croner's attention was attracted by some man yelling at the top of his voice. He was puzzled for a time as to where the yells came from but finally located them in the Matlock lodging house. He proceeded to the third floor where he found a man in his underclothes stretched out in the hall. J D Matlock, the proprietor of the house, ran up stairs as soon as he heard the man yell and when he reached him, the man told him to go for the doctor and to bring a stomach pump as he had taken strychnine. Mr Matlock telephoned for several doctors and was unable to secure one for some time but finally Dr C H T Atwood came. In the meantime Policeman Croner had arrived and the man, who was proven by letters on his person to be Richard McGovern, of Lorane, stated that he had taken the poison with suicidal intent and that he had swallowed 20 grains of the stuff. It was feared that the man was going to die before medical assistance arrived, but when Dr Atwood came he found his pulse to be about normal, and the man was not in such a bad shape as he imagined. After a hyperdermic injection McGovern's pains in his stomach were eased and he was carried back to his bed in room 12. In his clothes were found two bottles which had been emptied of a compound containing strychnine and phosphorus which McGovern stated, when he became more rational, that he had been in the habit of taking in small quantities for his nerves. It is thought he took an overdose by mistake, causing severe cramps in his stomach, and he thought he was going to die. He is getting along all right today and ate quite a hearty meal this morning. He had been drinking yesterday which probably accounts for his mistake in taking an overdose. The occurrence created considerable excitement on the streets at the time as McGovern's yells were plainly heard for several blocks. A large crowd of men and boys flocked to the scene of the supposed suicide.

BURIAL AT COTTAGE GROVE. Daily Guard Jan 9. The following dispatch appeared in his morning's Oregonian: Baker City, Jan 8.—F P White, formerly of Eugene, but recently a resident of Baker county, dropped dead of heart disease at Express this morning. He was formerly principal of the high school at Sumpter, and left there to take charge of the public school at Express on Monday last. His people reside at Eugene, where he has a mother, brother and two sisters. The body will be sent there for burial. Mrs Mary White, the mother of the deceased young man, received the above intelligence last evening, but no particulars were sent. She sent word to Express to have the body shipped to Cottage Grove for interment, and she and her daughter, Miss Bertha, going to that city on this afternoon's train to prepare for the burial. The deceased was raised in Lane county, having lived above Cottage Grove and in Eugene all his life. He graduated at the University of Oregon three or four years ago, after taking a all six years course in the institution. After graduation, he opened an assay office in Cottage Grove and last summer went to Baker county, where, as the dispatch says, he was principal of the Sumpter high school for a time. Besides his mother, the deceased leaves three sisters, Mrs Lottie Hunt, residing in the vicinity of the Bohemia mines; Miss Marjau White, teacher in the Cottage Grove public schools; Miss Bertha White, residing in Eugene with her mother, and one brother, William J White, who resides in Portland, and who came up on the afternoon train. Mr White was a member of the Christian church, was liked by all and led an exemplary life. He had many friends here who are pained to hear of his death.

IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

Alleged Violations of the Food Law by the Creamery Man.

J W Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, came up from Portland last night for the purpose of looking into alleged violations of the state law by C M Elspass, the proprietor of the Eugene creamery. Mr Bailey seized five cases of the Elspass butter which had been shipped from here to Portland on its arrival there, on account of the rolls not conforming in weight to the figures on the wrappers. Mr Elspass will not be prosecuted this time, as he promised the commissioner he would have the butter shipped back and would re-mould it. It will be remembered that Mr Elspass was arrested and fined several weeks ago for selling short-weight butter. This time the butter weighed more than the figures on the wrappers called for, but it is said was still several ounces short of the required two pounds.

CHILEAN CABINET CRISIS.

VALPARAISO, Chile, Jan 9.—A cabinet crisis is impending. It is expected that most of the cabinet members will offer their resignations.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn, Jan 9.—Harvey Logan, a prisoner in the jail here has been positively identified as a participant in the Wagner, Montana, train robbery.

PARAGUAY PRESIDENT PRISONER.

BUENOS AYRES, Jan 9.—A revolution is in progress at Asuncion, the capital of Paraguay. President Alcedo is a prisoner in the hands of the revolutionists.

CONGRESS IN SESSION.

WASHINGTON, Jan 9.—There was a big attendance in the House at the opening of congress after the holiday adjournment. Representative Adamson of Georgia made a strong plea for the immediate passage of the Hepburn Nicaragua Canal bill. He deprecated any delay or equivocation in dealing with the canal question. The Senate committee on Commerce made a favorable report on the bill providing for the addition of another cabinet portfolio to be known as the Department of Commerce, to which all commercial legislation should be referred.

LATER.

WASHINGTON, D C, Jan 9.—The Nicaragua Canal bill has passed the House by a vote of 308 in its favor to 2 against.

CHINESE RAILROAD DEVELOPMENT.

NEW YORK, Jan 9.—Incorporation papers of the American Development Company have been filed here. The company has been organized to build a railroad across China from Wu Chang to Canton. The proposed road will tap a vast fertile and wealthy district of Southern China.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Piece of Board From Edger Went Through Both Lungs.

DEATH, Or, Jan 8.—T R Williams, an employe at the Leona sawmill, three miles north of this place, was struck late last night by a piece of board, which was thrown back from the gang edger with terrific force, the sharp point of which entered his left breast just above the heart, and passing diagonally through both lungs, stopped against the right shoulder-blade. A piece of the board 11 inches in length was extracted from the wound, and though he still survives, little hope is entertained for his recovery. The man mentioned is described as being 40 or 45 years old, with three or four weeks' growth of beard on his face. The police are on his track and it is probable he will be caught soon.
