"TO BE REMEMBERED."

The accursed gold standard, we were told, would ruin the country. January payments on account of interest and dividends at New York reached the great total of \$118,000,000. This does not include Government bonds, bank dividends or corporations other than those whose stocks are on the market.—Oregonian.

Then the Oregonian gives figures showing that interest-paying stocks have increased in par value during the seven years past in the New York stock market to the extent of \$2,410,097,369. And the Oregonian does not even hint at trusts, or fictitious values resultant from trust combinations. The editor sees nothing but "gold standard" in all this vaunted stock prosperity. Prosperity does not come from stocks, tariffs, gold or any other monetary standard, but from the soil. And whatever prosperity the country enjoys must be ascribed to the sturdy farmer, not to gambling stocks nor the robber tariff with its ill-begotten brood of trusts.

The American Agriculturist, the most reliable farming authority in the United States, tells whence our prosperity comes. Here are some things it tells about the year 1901 and preceding years:

The cereals—wheat, corn, oats, rye barley—raised in the United States during the past five years represent a value to the farmer of \$6,250,000,000, or an increase of nearly \$1,000,000,000 over the preceding five years. Cotton-growers have netted \$400,000,000 more for the last five crops than for the previous five. Taking 1896 as a fair basis of values during the late agricultural depression, nine staple crops for this year represent an increase in value of more than \$700,000,000. Livestock is worth \$1,000,000,000 more than then. During the past five years agricultural exports have been \$938,000,000 greater than for the preceding five years, a gain of 30 per cent.

The wheat crop is estimated to have been worth \$150,000,000 more than that of the previous year, and the values of other crops on which detailed estimates are not given are said to be equally gratifying. The shortage in corn was made up by the rise in price; apples have been high, and of potatoes it is said prices were so high that the short crop probably returned more money to the growers than any other potato crop on record. Finally, it is said that the livestock of the farmers represents nearly \$250,000,000 more than it did in the previous year. These good results came as the culmination of a series of good years.

The Oregonian would have it believed that special laws brought prosperity. The Agriculturist ascribes it to the production of good crops of wheat, corn, live-stock, etc., with good prices not only at home but abroad. Witness the almost billion-dollar increase in value of exports. It is not necessary to ask which will be believed.

CENSUS YEAR, (1900), POPULATION AND MILITARY SERVICE.

The census bureau has issued a report announcing that the population of the United States, including

all outlying possessions, was 84,233,069 in the census year of 1900.

This is itemized as follows: United States proper, 75,994,575; Philippines, 6,961,339; Porto Rico, 953,243; Hawaii, 154,001; Alaska, 63,592; Guam, 9000; American Samoa, 6100; Persons in the military and naval service of the United States, outside territory and the United States proper, 91,219. There are but three countries which now have a greater population than the United States, viz, China, the British Empire and the Russian Empire.

OREGONIAN PLEASANTY.

The Oregonian has made a discovery—that Portland is a moral town. Supplementing the protest of the preachers against the town being run on the wide-open plan during the Lewis and Clark Centennial, the editorial innocent takes a confiding public into its confidence with this astonishing statement:

Portland has never been a prohibition town, but it has always been a moral town. At a time when it will be the cynosure of thousands of critical eyes, it should be specially careful to live up to its traditions.

"A moral town" and "to live up to its traditions"—at least in the way it was meant—were good ones. Ordinarily such a statement would be regarded as sarcastic, but the writer is evidently in earnest.

The benighted Chinese minister cannot understand why we send missionaries to prepare his countrymen for paradise but slam the door of America in their faces.

SUSLAW PIONEER DEAD.

A. R. Buttolph Passes Away at Acme January 6th.

Flourished West, Jan 10. Died, at the residence of G. R. Mills, in Acme, Monday evening, January 6, 1902, after a long illness, A. R. Buttolph, aged 73 years, 9 months and 28 days.

Albert Russell Buttolph, the son of Rev Reuben and Betsey Buttolph, was born in St Armand, Quebec, March 8, 1828. At an early age he moved with his parents to St Albans, Vermont, where he remained till 18 years of age, getting his education in the meantime in the academy of that state.

He crossed the plains to California in 1848 and came to Oregon in the "diff-tie," and has since resided most of the time in this state. He came to the Suslaw twenty-six years ago and took up a homestead on North Fork, where he made his home for the rest of his life. For many years he devoted a portion of his time to the business of notary public and also did some surveying, and the remainder of his time was spent on his ranch.

He was married some three years ago to Mrs Sarah Akerly, who died May 31, 1901.

Funeral services were held Wednesday by Rev G A McKinley and the remains laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery beside those of his wife, who passed away last summer.

LANE COUNTY THE BEST.

Where a Man With Limited Means Can Make a Living.

W F King, who is engaged in garden-truck raising near Bangs' park, left yesterday for his old home at Luddington, Michigan, to straighten up some business affairs and will not be back for several months.

Mr King, in conversation with a GUARDIAN reporter at the depot yesterday, stated that he left Michigan for this coast two years ago, stopping first at San Diego, Cal. He spent \$1200 traveling all over California looking for a suitable location. Failing to find a desirable place for a man with limited means in that state he came up through Southern Oregon and as soon as he reached Eugene found the country exactly to his liking and settled here. He is making a success of his garden-truck raising and when his business affairs in Michigan are settled up expects to return and purchase a farm.

Mr King says California is no place for a man with a capital of less than \$5000. For a rich man it is a very desirable state to live in.

John W. Masterson Dead.

The Ashland Tidings of January 10 has this about a sterling citizen who passed the best years of his life in Lane county:

"John W. Masterson was born in Morgan county, Illinois, February 10, 1832; died December 12, 1901, being at the time of his death 69 years 10 months and two days old.

"Mr Masterson crossed the plains in 1852, coming into the Rogue River valley. He fought in the Indian war in 1855 and 1856. In 1857 he went to California and in 1858 he was married to Belinda Allen who with him came to Oregon in 1859 and settled on a farm two miles below Eugene, Lane county, where they lived until 1865, then moved to Cottage Grove where they lived for 22 years; in 1887 they moved to their present farm two miles from Gold Hill. Four children were born to this union: Delia L, nee Mrs W O Moore; Chloe Anna, deceased; Nancy J and John C. He was generous and kind hearted and always followed the golden rule, 'Do ye unto others as ye would that others should do unto ye.'

"Rev Lockhart conducted the services at the M E church, afterward the I O O F, of which he had been an honored member for 21 years, taking charge. He was buried in the I O O F cemetery at Rock Point."
