THE JUDSON ROCK MINES.

Large Amount of Stock Disposed of in Eugene.

J M Sherwood, of Cottage Grove, vice president of the Judson Rock Mining Co., operating in the Bohemia district, has been in Eugene the last two or three days, returning home this afternoon.

Mr Sherwood was in the city for the purpose of selling stock in his company and succeeded in disposing of 30,000 shares during his short stay here.

The property owned by this company consists of what is known as the Judson Rock group of mining claims, situated on the western slope of Fairview mountain and directly on the line with the famous Musick lode, with an elevation of 3000 feet and extending down to Fairview creek where mill sites are located giving a vertical depth of 1000 feet below the apex. The group consists of nine claims, viz: The O'Leary, Denver, Three Brothers, Blue Jacket, Pueblo, Black Jack, Overlight, Hemetake and Pilot Boy.

A great deal of development work has been done on these properties and assays of ore run from \$10 to \$20 per ton in gold. This group of claims is about two miles from the terminus of the proposed Cottage Grove-Bohemia railroad.

VOTERS MUST REGISTER.

Former Registrations Are Void by Limitation.

Through the courtesy of Secretary of State Dunbar the GUARD is in receipt of a copy of the revised election laws of Oregon. The new law provides, among other things, for the registration of all voters before they shall be qualified to vote at the coming county and state elections to be held on June 2, 1903. The principal sections of the law on this point are as follows:

"Section 3. It shall be the duty of every elector in the state of Oregon between the first Monday in January, 1900, and 5 o'clock p.m. of the fifteenth day of May, 1900, and between the same date and hour biennially thereafter, to register with some notary public or justice of the peace, or with the county clerk of the county in which the elector resides, in accordance with the act."

It should be remembered that all voters must register if they wish to cast a ballot, whether or not they have registered for previous elections. Former registrations are now rendered void by limitation.

CONCERNING FRANK WHITE.

Baker City Herald Tells of the Young Man's Death.

The Baker City Herald, in speaking of Frank White's death, says:

Mr White came to Durkee yesterday to secure a position in the public school at that place as teacher, vice Miss Casbeer, who contemplates removing to Baker to accept a position in the school here. Yesterday evening Mr White walked about town, apparently in the best of health. He visited the O R & N pump house late in the evening and sat chatting with the engineer. The odor of oil and escaping steam seemed to overcome him and he started for the open air. With one foot across the threshold of the door he fell dead. The body was removed to a hotel and the coroner notified. Death has evidently resulted from heart failure.

Prof J P Heiland, of Sumpter, formerly principal of the Sumpter public schools, has known Mr White for the past ten years. Over the phone this afternoon Professor Heiland gave the Herald the following facts concerning the unfortunate young man:

"Mr White came to Sumpter last year, and was employed in the store of Mr Hawley. Later, while I was principal of the public schools, he was employed as teacher. Upon my resignation as principal Mr White covered his connection with the schools and came to work in my warehouse. He was about 25 years old, and was universally loved and respected. He left Sumpter for Durkee on Monday morning. He was apparently in the best of health when he left. Mr Hawley and I will confer today and make arrangements for the burial of the body."

NEW TEN DOLLAR NOTES.

Have Reached Eugene—Drayman Hubble Had One.

The new \$10 U S legal tender note recently authorized by the treasury department, has made its appearance in Eugene. Drayman M S Hubble showed a \$10 note reporter one the other day and it is a pretty piece of work. It will be called the Lewis and Clark Exposition note, as it is certainly commemorative of the proposed exposition to be held in Portland in 1905. The striking feature of the face of the new note is the vignette of a buffalo, which occupies the center, and is slightly larger than the Indians on the new \$5 note recently issued. On one side of the buffalo is a smaller vignette of Lewis, and on the opposite side a vignette of Clark. The portraits of Lewis and Clark give Oregon the right to claim that the note is commemorative of the exposition of 1905, and this claim is certainly well founded.

New Road Law.

Hereafter all road taxes must be paid in cash, while the road supervisor will hire men and teams, their wages being paid from the county treasury. A county roadmaster will be appointed to have general supervision of the work, thereby giving road work and improvement a more connected system. The roadmaster will visit all portions of the county and confer with the supervisors as to the needs of the roads before making an apportionment.

The commissioners' court will appoint the roadmaster, probably at the March term of court. It has been intimated that the court would like to hear from the taxpayers in regard to the appointment either by petition or otherwise. It is an important position and a careful selection should be made.
