HOPS BOOMING

Sales Made in Salem at 12 1-2 Cents Yesterday.

F. E. DUNN HAS 1450 BALES.
Salem, Jan 15.—The hop market was lively in Salem yesterday, and showed greater strength as a result of Eastern advices, than has been noticed for some time past. During the day several important sales were made. The R G Horst & Lachmond Company, during the day, purchased two lots of hops at 12 1/2 cents—71 and 73 bales respectively. A number of other lots were in the market also and 12 cents per pound was freely offered.
"During the afternoon the Horst & Lachmond Co sold a lot of 91 bales to a local dealer for 12 1/2 cents. This was a choice lot and will be shipped east to fill an order.
"Reports from the east indicate that the New York market is firm with an upward tendency, and choice Oregon hops are quoted at 16 1/2 and 17 cents, as against 13 cents a month ago.
"There is a shortage of from 30,000 to 40,000 bales in the hops of the United States and the result is a considerable strengthening of the market, since the demand for hops, not only in this country, but in the London market, is increasing, and the holders of hops may now confidently expect good prices at an early date. Because of this condition of the market the bulls are winning out, and those growers who have held on to their product, will find that their course was a wise one."
F E Dunn, of Eugene, has about 1450 bales of hops and will make a pile of money.

A Drain dispatch of January 13 to the Daily Roseburg Review says: T R Williams, the unfortunate man who was pierced with a flying piece of wood at the Leona mills last Tuesday, died Sunday evening at 6 o'clock, after a most remarkable struggle for life. Both lungs were pierced by a piece of wood over an inch in diameter, and being wedged between the ribs required the aid of two men to withdraw it, yet his life was prolonged for over five days afterward. Williams was about 35 years of age. He leaves a wife, but no other relatives in this state. His mother lives in Michigan.

POULTRY SHIPMENTS

Extent of Business Done By One Eugene Firm in 1901.

PRICES PAID, ETC.
Lane county is one of the best poultry-shipping counties in the state. Poultry and eggs are shipped from Eugene in large quantities nearly every day, besides shipments being made from the other stations on the railroad.
E J McClanahan, of the Seattle Produce Co, with headquarters on West Eighth street, has furnished the GAZETTE with the amount of poultry produce shipped by the firm during the year 1901 and the average price received by the producer for the same.
The firm shipped 17,339 cases or 520,170 dozen of eggs and paid for them an average price of 19 1/2-14 cents per dozen. The highest price was 27 cents and the lowest price 10 cents.
Chickens—560,719 pounds; average price, 7 1/2 cents per pound.
Turkeys—45,640 pounds; average price, 10 cents, live; 12 cents, dressed.
Ducks—15,640 pounds; average price, 7 1/2 cents, live weight.
Geese—13,455 pounds; average price, 6 cents live; 8 cents, dressed.
The firm receives produce for shipment all the way from Monroe, Harrisburg and Halsey, as far south as Roseburg. They have a special agent at Seattle who handles all their produce and find a ready market for it.
The above are the figures from one Eugene firm alone. Taking the amount shipped by other local produce shippers and those in other towns in the county, one can realize the magnitude of our poultry business.

TO AID WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Western Oregon Will Have Common Settlers' Rates With Portland and the Sound.

General Freight and Passenger Agent Miller, of the Southern Pacific, has announced that settlers' rates arranged for next March and April will apply to all points on the lines of the Southern Pacific in Oregon. This application will be made only through Portland, and it will be in connection with the Union Pacific and O R & N. Eugene and every other point on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon will be on the same basis as Portland, so far as the benefit of the settlers' rates are concerned. There will be no extra charge for the ride beyond Portland.
This is the first time settlers' rates were ever applied to Western Oregon, making these points common with Puget Sound and Portland. Settlers in considerable numbers are already coming into the Willamette valley, and the new rates are expected greatly to augment this movement and extend it to the California line.
From Omaha and Kansas City the settlers' rate to North Pacific common points will be \$25 on second class limited ticket. From St Louis the rate will be \$30, and from Chicago \$35. These rates will take passengers through to any point on the Southern Pacific lines in this state. Western Oregon is expected to profit very greatly from the new arrangement, which will become effective on the 1st of March and continue at least two months.

RAILROAD SURVEY.

Our Special Correspondent Reports Telegram's Statements.

ENGINEERS STILL AT WORK.
Special Correspondence.
COTTAGE GROVE, Jan 15.—Concerning the matter of securing a right of way for the Bohemian railroad from land-owners along the line, the pacifier of the Portland Telegram has made some people to say certain things that would indicate that there is much trouble being encountered in that direction, and that certain persons are saying unkind things of the farmers that will make more trouble instead of lessening the existing difficulties. But the Telegram man, it is said, is much given to putting unthought-of words into people's mouths, and we warn people now that the statements of that paper, or at least its so-called interviews with Cottage Grove and Bohemian people, ought to be taken with some grains of allowance. So far we have heard of but one man showing any contentious spirit and certainly Mr Morphy is showing the most commendable spirit in his dealings with the people.
Five members of the committee appointed at the mass meeting last week are up the river today and may spend two or three days out there among the farmers endeavoring to reach amicable settlements with them, and it is believed that they will meet with success, as many have already shown their appreciation of the many advantages accruing from a railroad to the land owners along its line, by granting the desired right-of-way. The contract which they make binds the company to begin work by July, 1902, and complete the road by July, 1903, which is months more time than they expect to need, and they also agree to make the Cottage Grove terminus within 1000 feet of the southeast corner of the McFarland donation land claim, which corner is only about 50 feet from the S P depot. The land owners on their part agree to make deeds to the right-of-way when the road has been completed.
The engineers are still at the Warehouse comp'ing the platting of the last piece of work to that place, having been delayed by one of their draughtmen leaving. As soon as that work is finished they will begin on the Mosby creek spur for which piece of road the sum of \$10,000 has been set apart, which will probably build it at least ten miles up that river and take some distance into township 22 south, range 2 west. Engineer Wood promises his men work up to about July 1st on the three spurs to be surveyed, but long before that time construction work will be going forward.

COMES DOWN A QUARTER.
