RAN ASHORE.

The Schooner Nettie Sundborg on the South Spit.

Florence West, Jan 17.

Yesterday afternoon the schooner Nettie Sundborg, from San Francisco for the Sitka, sailed in across the bar and when some distance inside the breakers went ashore on the south spit.

She soon began leaking badly, and the crew seeing that the craft was filling rapidly, went ashore in a small boat, taking the compass and their private property with them.

A crew of men were taken down from Florence last evening who put out anchors to prevent the boat from going further on the sand. They went back this morning and found the vessel resting on the bottom and nearly full of water. She lies a short distance below the end of the jetty.

The Nettie Sundborg is a small two-masted schooner and is owned by Julius Hyman, of San Francisco. She has been under charter to A W Beadle & Co, who used her for carrying lumber. The vessel has no freight on board but is in ballast.

In A MUDHOLE.—Messdames Wm Forrester and Ernest Miller had a very unpleasant experience Saturday while coming home from the Geo Bushnell funeral. Coming along A W Brey lane they drove into a mudhole and mired to the hubs. A tug broke and the women waded knee-deep in the water and mud to get the horse unhitched. They walked two and one-half miles before they got help.

RED-LETTER MISSION DAY.

Methodist People Pledged \$650 for Missionary Purposes Yesterday.

A SUDDEN DEATH.

George Rubarts Succumbs To Heart Trouble.

AN ECCENTRIC CHARACTER.

George Rubarts, commonly known as "Whispering George," a well known and eccentric character about town, died suddenly from heart trouble in McGuire's Ninth street restaurant this afternoon shortly before one o'clock.

Rubarts was eating dinner in the restaurant. The waitresses noticed him gasping for breath and acting strangely and thought he was drunk.

They notified W C McGuire, proprietor of the restaurant, who at once knew that the man was sick. He was placed on the floor and physicians sent for.

Dr. King, Brown and Atwood soon arrived and found him sinking fast with heart trouble. Restoratives were applied but with no avail, and the man breathed his last at 1:10 o'clock.

Those who saw Rubarts around town this morning say that he appeared in his usual good health and he was working early in the morning, sweeping out a saloon. Death came suddenly and without warning.

Rubarts came to Eugene from Albany about 10 years ago, and since coming here has earned a living by doing odd jobs around town, such as sweeping out saloons, sawing wood, etc. He was a single man and was aged 50 or 55 years. He has two brothers down in Lincoln county, and his father was formerly owner of a sawmill at Albany. While he was rather eccentric, he was harmless and was known to all who have occasion to be down town a great deal.

Coroner Griffin was immediately notified of the death and he soon arrived at the scene, but deemed an inquest unnecessary. The body was taken to Day & Henderson's undertaking rooms and will be buried in the potterfield at the county's expense tomorrow at the county's expense, the man having no money.

The funeral was held this forenoon, the services being conducted by Rev Edward Gettings, pastor of the Springfield Methodist church. The remains were laid to rest in the Springfield I O O F cemetery immediately after the service.

SUDDENLY ILL.

Hon. S. M. Yoran Attacked by Heart Failure.

About 2:30 o'clock this afternoon Hon S M Yoran was attacked by heart failure at his shoe store, and it was feared for a time that he was dying.

He began to feel very ill and asked his son Darwin to telephone for a physician. Dr J W Harris was sent for and he arrived soon to find Mr Yoran in a very serious condition.

The doctor announced that he was dying as his pulse indicated no action of the heart at all. Stimulants were applied, however, causing him to revive, and he was taken in a carriage to his home, corner West Tenth and Olive streets, where he was placed in bed. At 4 o'clock this afternoon he was resting easily and it is thought he will recover.
