OUR POPULATION.

Five Thousand People Here According to School Children.

A LOW ESTIMATE.

According to the number of school children actually in attendance at the schools here, about 1250, Eugene now has a population of not less than 5000. These figures are based on the proportion of four people to every pupil in actual attendance. Several weeks ago the enrollment at the public schools was 1030. Figuring on an increase of 20 since then, makes an attendance of 1050 in the public schools. The attendance at the Catholic academy and those of school age at the University of Oregon will foot up a total of 1250. Four to one is a very low estimate. Most cities in figuring out their population according to the number of school children count on a proportion of five to one on the total number of children in the district, but we have figured very conservatively and based the population of the city on a proportion of four to one on the actual attendance at the schools. The Eugene district last February contained a total of 1425 children of school age. Counting on the same basis that other places do we could figure on a population of 7125 a year ago, and with an increase of say 75 children during the past year, at the present time, according to the above way of figuring, we would have a population of 7600, which everybody knows to be greatly in excess of the actual figures. Five thousand population is what Eugene can conscientiously claim. The last census, taken over a year and a half ago, gave us a ridiculously small population and a count made only a few months afterward by F J McPherson, who takes the school census, showed several hundred more people within the corporate limits of the city than the census gave us credit for. With the rapid and steady increase of residents in Eugene, evidenced by the large number of dwelling houses erected, our claim of a round 5000 can not very well be disputed.

THE DUNN BUILDING.

REGENTS IN SESSION.

Professors Ressler and Washburn Have Resigned.

REPORTS READ.

PORTLAND, Jan 22.—The Board of Regents of the University of Oregon met in annual session yesterday in Judge Bellinger's office, in the Federal building, and received the reports of Frank Strong, president of the University, and Judge R S Bean, president of the board, besides which a large volume of accumulated routine business was disposed of. The members of the board present at yesterday's meeting were: Judge R S Bean, Salem, president; C A Dolph, Judge C B Bellinger, Portland; Judge J W Hamilton, Roseburg; State Senator William Smith, Baker City; N L Butler, Mouth; S H Friendly, Eugene; Charles Hilton, The Dalles. The only absent member was C C Beekman, of Jacksonville. The report of Judge R S Bean, president of the board, dealt largely with the finances of the University, which, condensed, made the following showing: Receipts.....\$59,702.00 Disbursements..... 57,019.00 Balance on hand.....\$2,683.00 According to the report of Professor Frank Strong, president of the University, the enrollment to date is 421, of which number 315 are in departments at Eugene. The list is as follows: Departments at Eugene..... 315 Law School..... 26 Medical School..... 80 Total..... 421 Recommendation is made that the salaries of Mr Nash, in charge of the musical department, and Mr Burden, gymnasium instructor, be increased. Professor Strong also recommends that the fellowship in Latin and romance languages, and scholarships in Latin, chemistry, history, German and economics, be dispensed with for the year 1902-3. PROFESSORS RESIGN. The resignations were received of F L Washburn, professor of biology, and E D Ressler, assistant professor of education, the former to take effect February 7, and the latter October 1. Professor Washburn goes to the University of Minnesota, and Professor Ressler will take up post-graduate work in an Eastern university. The matter of a successor to Professor Washburn was referred to President Strong and the executive committee, of which S H Friendly, Judge C B Bellinger and C A Dolph are members. The dormitory which is badly run down, will be repaired. The scholarships in romance languages, chemistry, history, German and economics were abolished for the year 1902-1903. In addition to other matters contained in reports, the following proceedings occurred: The following tutors tendered their resignations to take effect at the first of next school year: Amy G Powell, Sybil Thurston; accepted. Prof Nash asked that his salary be raised from \$400 to \$800 or they could elect his successor to take effect Oct 1, 1902; the board declined to make the raise. The president asked \$500 to conduct a summer school; the board refused. The president recommended that the salaries of Professors Lachman, Gies, Schmidt, Dunn and McAllister be raised from \$1600 to \$2000 each; the board refused. The president asked that the salary of Professor Burden be raised from \$900 to \$1000; the board declined. The board of regents engaged the services of Mr Otto, a Portland landscape gardener, at a cost \$50 and expenses, to plant the University grounds into roads walks, etc. It also ordered that the recitation rooms in the third story of Deady Hall be dispensed with, and the same used for other purposes. It was resolved to paint and improve the U O buildings, excepting the president's residence, as soon as estimates are furnished. Adjourned to June meeting. It Girdles the Globe. MACHINERY HERE.

Two Car Loads for the Woolen Mill.

REMAINDER FOLLOWING.

Daily Guard, Jan 23 On last night's freight train two car loads of machinery for the Williamette Valley Woolen Manufacturing Co's new mill in this city arrived here from Fremont, Nebraska. The machinery consists of the following pieces: One set of cards; two spinning jacks of 240 spindles each; one 10-foot gig; one mixing picker; one spooler; one dresser; one grinder; six looms and all the necessary accessories thereto. Two more car loads of the machinery are now due and are expected to arrive in due time and the mill will be in operation by the time specified in the contract—July 1st. The machinery will be moved to the building in a very short time. The inside of the building is not thoroughly dried yet and the whitewashing is not quite finished, but the work is being rushed, and the machinery will be placed in position in a few days.

STRUCK AN OIL SEEPAGE.

Umpqua Valley Oil Co. Jubilant Over Prospects at Drilling Plant.

ROSEBURG, Jan 22.—G W Crews, a prominent Myrtle Creek merchant, spent Saturday in Roseburg transacting business. He gave out the very encouraging news that on Friday evening at the depth of 60 feet the big drill of the Umpqua Valley Oil Company on the White place near Myrtle Creek struck a seepage of petroleum, the sand pumping up from one pip to a quart of oil every time it made a trip. The big drill had been pounding away through blue oil shale. This is just as the company's geologist, Prof J A Slinger said that it would be found. President M McCoy and Secretary H L Masters are quite jubilant and state that there is more demand for the stock of the company than ever before and if the demand keeps up and more seepages are struck the stock will surely advance in price.
