PRESBYTERIANS MEET.

Dr. W. R. Henderson Will Leave About April 1st.

Last evening the annual meeting of the Presbyterian church was held in the church parlors. Preceding the order of business the members enjoyed a repast in the lower room. About 250 people partook of the good things set before them. J. W. Kays, chairman of the board of trustees, presided at the meeting. The annual reports of treasurer, elders, trustees, ladies' aid, Y. P. S. C. E., Junior Endeavor and Sunday school, were presented, accepted and filed with the clerk. J. M. Day and Robt. Patterson were re-elected to their offices of elders.

Prof. C. H. Hunt and John Strain, having resigned as trustees, Joe J. Cronack and Calvin K. Kays were re-elected to fill the vacancies. S. B. Eakin, treasurer, and C. C. Corcoran, clerk. A. L. Campbell was elected clerk pro tem in the absence of Mr. Corcoran.

Rev. W. R. Henderson, D. D., who was employed as a supply pastor for six months, notified the congregation of his intention of leaving at the expiration of that time, April 1st.

The sum of \$115.50 was raised on a small debt of \$140 by personal subscription. There is no money in the treasury but the debt is practically nothing, showing that the financial affairs of the church are in fairly good condition.

The membership of the church is now 170. The average attendance at Sunday school has been 70 for 1901. The Y. P. S. C. E. has 34 members. The Ladies' Aid society handled about \$80 during the year.

A NEW INSTRUCTOR.

Prof. Albert Sweetser Will Succeed Prof. Washburn.

FROM PACIFIC UNIVERSITY.

Albert Sweetser, A. M., professor of biology and chemistry at Pacific University at Forest Grove, visited the University of Oregon yesterday, returning home on the northbound overland train last night.

Prof. Sweetser has been offered the chair of biology at the University which was made vacant by the resignation of Prof. Washburn. Prof. Sweetser carefully surveyed the work of the biological department, its scope, courses, equipment, etc., before giving any decision as to his acceptance of the position. He is very much pleased with the situation and will no doubt accept the chair.

Prof. Sweetser is a man who is well up in his work. His attention during the last few years has been devoted to the study and classification of the fungi of Oregon.

THIRD ANNIVERSARY.

Three Years Ago Tonight the Filipino Insurrection Began.

Today, Feb. 4th, is the third anniversary of the breaking out of the Filipino insurrection. About 9 o'clock on the night of Feb. 4, 1899, a Filipino lieutenant and several soldiers attempted to pass an outpost in charge of a squad from the First Nebraska regiment then stationed at Santa Mesa, on the outskirts of Manila. After repeated demands to halt and the Filipinos refusing the entry on duty at that time, the killing of the lieutenant. This shot started the memorable engagement which lasted during that night and all the next day and which extended entirely around the city of Manila for a distance of 20 miles or more.

All that was done that night by the American troops was to hold their positions in the trenches surrounding the city, but as soon as daylight came they charged the enemy, drove them from their positions and pursued them far into the interior.

Those were exciting times for our boys. The Second Oregon regiment was stationed inside the old walled city, doing police duty at the time of the breaking out of the insurrection, and did not take an active part in the earlier engagements, but distinguished themselves later at the waterworks, at the great battle of Manila, on the long "hike" with General Lawton to the north, and on the memorable "hike" to Morong.

The members of Co. C, Second Oregon, and members of other companies and regiments who reside here have gathered in knots on the streets today and fought their battle over again.

While the hardships of a soldier's life in the Philippines are numerous, many of the boys yearn to be back there again to chase the elusive Filipino over the rice paddies, through the bamboo jungles and across the low lying swamps.

OWNS AN INTEREST.

F. A. Rankin Now a Part Owner in the Eilers Piano House.

Young Griffo Badly Frozen.

Chicago, Feb. 3.—Albert Griffo, the Australian prize-fighter, best known as "Young Griffo," was found today nearly frozen to death in a vacant lot within half a block of the Bridewell. Both hands and feet were frozen, and physicians are of the opinion that amputation of the hands will be necessary.

Griffo for many years was a fistie marvel, and was considered a great fighter, one of the best that ever donned boxing gloves. Of late years Griffo has been leading a fast life, and was penniless.

Riddle, of Riddle, has filed suit against the Southern Pacific Railroad Co., for \$30,000 damages, for injuries received while he was in the employ of the company as fireman, in the head-end collision between two freight trains which occurred near this city over a year ago and in which disaster Mr. Riddle lost a leg and the serious and permanent injury of one arm.
