BIG MINING DEAL.

Jennings Bros. Purchase Bruneau's Interest in the Helena Co.

PURCHASE PRICE NOT PUBLIC.

Jennings Bros have purchased the stock in the Helena Consolidated company, owning rich properties in the Bohemia district, which was previously held by Chas. B. Bruneau. The amount of money involved in the transfer was not made public, but it is known to have been a considerable sum. The Helena mine, which is one of the principal claims of the Consolidated company, was located in 1896 by C. B. Bruneau. In the following year P. J. Jennings acquired a two-thirds interest in the mine, with the understanding that he was to expend \$20,000 in development work. After two years' work a large body of high grade ore was discovered and the mine developed into one of the best paying properties in the Bohemia district. From time to time other claims have been added to those held by the Helena Consolidated company, and the stock rose steadily in value. P. J. Jennings has invested a large amount of money in the district, and recently took over the holdings of Messrs Cook, J. I. Jones, O. E. Brady and Jess. of Los Angeles, in the Muskeg mine, and also purchased the White Wings mine from G. G. Warner. Other claims acquired recently by Mr. P. J. Jennings include the Hughes and Hartley group and W. E. Ferguson's interest in the Star mine.

In disposing of his stock to Jennings Bros Mr. Bruneau severs a partnership which has been in existence for over five years, and has been mutually agreeable and pleasant to all concerned. Mr. Bruneau intends to begin active development of the Sarah claims, in the Bohemia district, which he controls.

ARRESTED.

WILL PROBATED.

Joseph K. Sturtevant Left His Property to His Wife.

The last will and testament of the late Joseph K. Sturtevant, of Crow, was filed for probate at the county clerk's office this morning.

The will was executed on April 24, 1901, in the presence of A. C. Woodcock and G. R. Chrisman, and provides as follows:

First.—I bequeath to his wife, Mary E. Sturtevant, all property both real and personal.

Second.—At the death of his wife the real property goes to his sons, Clark C., James K., Albert W. and Andrew M. Sturtevant, share and share alike.

Third.—All personal property except money to Andrew M. and Albert W. Sturtevant.

Fourth.—All money to Lucy Bell Mitchell, daughter, Clark C., James K., Albert W. and Andrew M. Sturtevant.

Fifth.—Provides that bequests to Lucy Bell Mitchell shall be retained by executor and loaned out at interest until her daughter, Lydia Ann Mitchell, becomes 21 years of age when the principal goes to said Lydia Ann Mitchell.

Sixth.—Clark C., James K., Albert W. and Andrew M. Sturtevant are given 80 acres in tp 18 s r 5 w.

Seventh.—All funeral expenses to be paid.

Eighth.—T. G. Hendricks is appointed executor without bonds.

Ninth.—All former wills revoked. The probable value of the estate is \$8000.

STATE CONVENTION.

Democrats Will Meet on April Tenth.

PORTLAND THE PLACE.

Portland, Feb. 18.—Democrats will hold their state convention in Portland Thursday, April 10.

This announcement was made by Chairman Samuel White yesterday morning. The date was given to Secretary Montague, and while it has not been made public officially this detail is to receive attention within the next few days.

Throughout the state democrats had commenced to wonder when their state convention was to be held, and were becoming anxious to have the date settled. This matter was left in the hands of Samuel White, chairman of the state central committee, at the meeting held in Portland a few weeks ago. At the time it was decided that the best policy for the democrats would be to hold the convention after the republicans had named a ticket.

The republican state central committee has already set a date for its state convention, April 2.

Among local democrats it was expected that the convention would be called for either April 5, 8 or 10. In order to comply with the law governing the filing of nominations for state office, the convention cannot well be delayed beyond April 10, for the day of election falls on June 2 this year.

ATHLETICS AT CORVALLIS.

A Track Team to Be Put Out by O. A. C.

A Corvallis correspondent writes as follows about athletics at the O. A. C.:

The school will be represented in the sprints by C. C. Cate, Cathey, Woodcock and Burnough; in the high jump by Burnough and Moore; in the weights by Bunn, Gault, Sweet and Hamlay. Woodcock did well at pole vaulting last year, and he will likely do better this year. There are several men who might go in the runs, but no one has been mentioned in particular.

In each event there will be one or two new men, who may possibly make a showing. The formation of a permanent athletic organization in the school, which was done February 5, was a manifestation of some enthusiasm. A constitution was adopted which established what will be known as the "Athletic Union of O. A. C."

The purpose of the organization is to promote clean athletics. An athletic council, composed of the managers of the different teams and the officers of the union, looks after the welfare of the athletic department as a whole, and seeks to promote its best interests.

This insures much better management and places the whole athletic department on a firmer foundation.

Considering the fact that dropping track athletics entirely for one year has crippled the institution badly, and that it takes time to build up again, O. A. C. does not expect to accomplish much this coming season. However, there will be an effort made to meet some of the colleges of the state in a dual meet or otherwise, and it is hoped that some progress will be made towards getting back to the old place among the athletic institutions of the state.

Pioneer and Present-Day Sturgeon.

The Oregonian tells about the short supply of sturgeon and the 124 cents a pound price thereof, then gives a dealer's fish story:

"Times have changed since I was in the commission business some 10 years ago. A fisherman down the river sent up a sturgeon which weighed over 300 pounds. I asked a fish dealer who had lately opened a market if he wanted a sturgeon. He asked how big it was, and I told him it was a good-sized one, and he bought it at three cents per pound. When it was sent up to him on the dray the tail dragged on the ground behind, and when the market man saw it he came near fainting. He came down to my place and set up an awful howl, and said he did not want \$24 worth of sturgeon. After teasing him awhile, I told him he could have the fish for \$3, and that pacified him. Since then the large sturgeon have all been caught and smoked and sent to New York, and now when a pioneer citizen wants a piece of sturgeon he has to pay a bit a pound for it."

GRANTS PASS, Feb 18—Three white and one negro hobo were arrested today for breaking into Chile's grocery store last evening about 10 o'clock.

The negro rushed out and covering the party with his revolver ordered them to run. "Kit" Baber, one of the arresting party had a gun and attempted to run around the corner from which he could slip upon the negro, but the darkey was too quick for him and, poking his gun in Baber's face, ordered him to replace the gun, which he quickly did. Afterward the city officers arrested the men.

NOTED SANITARIUM BURNED.

BATTLE CREEK, Michigan, Feb. 18.—The Sanitarium located in this city was destroyed by fire early this morning.

The loss will reach \$1,000,000. The patients, about 400 in number, were gotten out without loss of life.

This sanitarium drew patients from all over the middle West. It will be rebuilt at once on the same location.

Miss Lena Callison of Jasper now holds position in the Pendleton public schools. She is teaching a mixed grade in the assembly room and takes the place of Miss Elizabeth Parrott who was transferred to the Field building to take charge of the primary grade. Miss Callison is a graduate of the Monmouth normal school of '97 and is an experienced teacher who comes here highly recommended.—Pendleton Tribune.
