

A VOICE OF THE PAST.

This busy, everyday world has its own concerns to look after and has little concern for the past, or the actors thereof. It comes somewhat of a surprise to read that Mrs. Jefferson Davis, widow of the president of the Southern Confederacy, appeared before the Mississippi legislature the other day.

Mrs. Davis is a daughter of General Zachary Taylor, twelfth president of the United States. She was married in Mississippi in 1835. She retains her mental faculties to a wonderful degree, though eighty-five years of age. When introduced to the Mississippi representatives in a joint session of the legislature the aged woman burst into tears and said: "Gentlemen, I shall always tenderly love the people of Mississippi, who clung to the cause of the defeated men. I can say no more."

Mrs. Davis died at New Orleans in 1889 and was interred under the monument to the Army of Northern Virginia. He was eighty-one years of age.

AN OLD ACQUAINTANCE.

The German ambassador at Washington telegraphed Admiral Dewey an invitation to meet the visiting royal prince, Prince Henry, at dinner the 28th of February. The admiral returned regrets, Mrs. Dewey's illness at a Florida winter resort requiring his constant care.

The admiral last met the prince shortly after the battle of Manila Bay, and the meeting was a constrained one. The German warship was picking up drowning Spaniards, at the same time putting itself in a position to prevent free American firing. Admiral Dewey promptly notified the German that if he did not get out of the way at once the American guns would be turned on him. And he got.

A GOOD IMMIGRATION CHANCE

The announcement is made that the Northern Pacific railroad will meet the settlers' rates of the Harriman line—in other words, that they will carry passengers from Chicago for \$33 and from Missouri river points for \$25, and that the tickets sold in the East will be good in Western Oregon as far south as Ashland, with ten days' stop-over privilege at any station. The Great Northern will, of course, follow suit. This will put 20,000 to 40,000 new people into Western Oregon in March and April. They will be seeking homes.

Lane county and the people engaged in selling real estate should immediately move to direct part of these home-seekers to this locality.

New York City banks, according to the recent public statement, are carrying nearly a billion dollars of loans. The immensity of such financial transactions can only be realized from the statement that on October 1, 1901, the total money of all kinds in circulation in the United States, outside of the treasury, amounted to \$2,227,000,000. Nearly one half the entire stock of money of the country is loaned through New York banking houses.

They are trying a former Salem warehouseman for the larceny of about ten thousand bushels of grain, of which amount his warehouse was short when he failed last December. A good penitentiary example should be made of this man, then it might discourage people who sell grain for which they are responsible when they have no backing to make it good when called for in case of disastrous speculation.

Six members of the Portland Chamber of Commerce have gotten themselves into a pretty pickle by attempting to commit that body and, incidentally, the people of Portland to a resolution favoring modification of Chinese restriction laws. It has raised a considerable commotion in the metropolis. The Chamber of Commerce men will know better another time.

Belgian iron manufacturers have outbid the British or a large London contract for rails for suburban railroad lines. They got a sixth below the lowest English tender.

LARGE PROPERTY SALES.

The Big Judkins Farm Sold Yesterday.

Yesterday E. J. Frasier sold the old Judkins farm of 883 acres about 3 1/2 miles southeast of Eugene to William F. Martin for \$12,500 per acre, amounting to \$11,037.50. Mr. Martin is recently from Minnesota and has, together with the Farrington farm, which he bought last week from Mr. Frasier for \$7800, secured one of the best stock farms in Lane county.

It is Mr. Martin's intention to develop this property into a thoroughbred breeding farm.

Mr. Frasier also closed a trade today for the J. C. Roberts farm of 290 acres west of Eugene to R. W. Simmons from Indiana for \$4300. The papers were delivered through the First National bank today.

Mr. Frasier today closed another trade for the Misses Whitmore property on East Ninth street in Eugene; terms private.

Death of a Eugene Pioneer.

Spray, Oregon, Courier: On Sunday, Feb. 2, R. C. Breeding, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens in this community, died suddenly at his home in Kahler Basin.

Mr. Breeding was sitting quietly by the fire, and had just made some commonplace remark to his son, Henry, who was passing out of the house, when he suddenly threw up his hands and, with a slight gasp, expired. The case is supposed to be heart trouble.

Robert C. Breeding was born in Osage county, Mo., April 28, 1831. In 1851 he crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in Lane county, near where the town of Eugene now stands. Mr. Breeding served with distinction in the Rogue River Indian war, and was married in 1852 to Miss Winnie Cochran, of Eugene. They resided in Lane county until the fall of 1880, when they moved to the site of the present family home. Deceased leaves to mourn his loss, a wife, his sons, T. M. and H. C. Breeding, and his daughters, Mrs. J. F. Spray, Mrs. H. D. Hale, and Mrs. J. A. Prophet, of Spray, Ore.; Mrs. Ira Hartzell, of Fossil, Ore.; and Mrs. S. R. Hartzell, of Arlington, Wash.
