RIVERS AND HARBORS.
Senator Mitchell Will Ask for \$30,000 for Sluslaw; \$1000 for Long Tom.

For the Willamette above Portland and Yamhill, Senator Mitchell will ask congress for \$75,000 one-third to be used in retreating the bank near Independence, \$12,500 in retreating the bank above Corvallis, and a like amount for retreating the bank near Albany. Other appropriations desired are: Clatskanie, \$10,000; Long Tom, \$1000; mouth of the Sluslaw, \$30,000; Coquille, from Coquille City to the mouth of the river, \$75,000; Coquille, between Coquille and Myrtle Point, \$19,980; Coos river, \$3000; entrance to Coos Bay, \$142,970; Yaquina Bay, \$2000; Tillamook Bay, \$27,000.

Improvements in the Willamette river between Oregon City are also authorized, as well as at Tillamook and Yaquina bays and Umpqua river.

TAXES HIGH ENOUGH.
A Letter to the Western Lane Road Question.

IVISON, Oregon, Feb 17, '02.
EDITOR OF THE GUARD:—In a recent copy of the Register we find above the name of C. W. Lyons, of Walton, a little item of interest to the residents and land owners of western Lane county.

Mr. Lyons says taxes are too low; still he is a taxpayer and evidently not a tax dodger. If this gentleman was a Carnegie or a Rockefeller one would naturally think that he is furnishing the standpoints for the Register to brace on in their effort to "raise Lane's assessment to at least eight million," but as such is not the case we will not think Mr. Lyons responsible for the proposition.

Where Mr. Lyons got the foundation for his statement in which he says that the tax people owning timber land here would not exchange it for the same amount of agricultural land in the valley is a mystery to many here and believed by few. It is true that these timber lands may some time be of good value, but the real value is not what it might be worth in after years when timber will be high in price or low with the forest fires.

In looking over the record of land sales in this county we find that during the last year that the timber lands have had a boom, but how about the agricultural lands? They have advanced also in proportion. And again, when Mr. Lyons says that the people from the valley had to make most of our roads, but few people in this vicinity would corroborate his statement.

There is evidently a scheme behind those high tax propositions; and instead of appropriating more highway funds by raising high taxes if the county commissioners would see that the road money be put to good advantage it might help the conditions of public highways, and people who think we don't pay enough taxes should "go way back and sit down."

Second Dragoons Were Surrounded---Lost Heavily Getting Out.

THE SPANISH RIOT.
