LIFE-SAVING STATION

Expressions in Regard to a New
One at Siuslaw.

NOT MUCH HOPE.

The citizens of Florence and vicinity
have been making strenuous efforts to
induce congress to establish a life-sav-
ing station at the mouth of the Siuslaw
river in Lane county.

I. B. Cushman of the Siuslaw and
San Francisco Lumber Co., has written to
Oregon's representatives in congress
and Lane's representatives in the
legislature about the matter. Con-
gressman Tongue replies that he
thinks there is not much hope of con-
gress doing anything towards estab-
lishing a station there, but that he
would introduce a bill to that effect.
Senator Mitchell said he would give
the matter his immediate attention
and ascertain from the treasury
department and head of the life-saving
service what their views are on the
subject.

MONEY HAS ARRIVED.

Second Oregon Men Can Get Their
Back Pay This Week.

Governor Geer has received a war-
rant from the secretary of the treasury
for \$21,799.94, together with a state-
ment of differences from the auditor of
the war department. Of this sum
\$17,106.44 is for payment of claims of
members of the Second Oregon reg-
iment, who volunteered and were ac-
cepted under the call of the
president. The remaining \$4,693.50 is
to reimburse the state for per diem
paid about two years ago to men who
volunteered and were rejected.

This money will be paid as soon as
called for. Persons who can call at
the adjutant general's office, 723
Chamber of Commerce, will be given a
blank claim to be signed and verified,
and will be given checks at once,
which can be cashed anywhere in the
state. Others are requested to write to
Adjutant-General Gantenbein for
blanks, which they will fill out and
forward him for verification, together
with letter of instructions. Upon re-
ceipt of the verified blanks he will
mail the checks.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

North Fairview Mining Co
Organized Last Night.

OWNS RICH PROPERTIES.

The North Fairview Mining Co,
which was recently incorporated, with
the principal office and place of busi-
ness in Eugene, and the purpose of
the incorporation of which is to operate
extensively in the Bohemia mining
district, held a meeting last night in
the office of Deputy Prosecuting At-
torney L. T. Harris in this city and
elected the following officers:

First vice president—Alf Walker.
Second vice president—S. J. Brund.
Treasurer—A. G. Hovey.
Secretary—L. T. Harris.
General manager—C. A. Harlow.
Directors—Wm. Faber, Alf Walker,
S. J. Brund, C. A. Harlow, J. H. Potts.

The new company owns nine
claims in the Bohemia district,
all of which have been quite
thoroughly prospected, and the
work has shown four very rich chutes
of ore on the main ledge. The names
of these claims are: Maine, Belle of
Fairview, El Belmont, Miscellaneous,
Golden Stairs, Teddy, The Danianelles,
Eva and Golden Curry. Extensive
development work has already been
done on the Maine, Miscellaneous
and Belle of Fairview.
It is the intention of the company to
at once commence active develop-
ment work on all the claims, and one
or more quartz mills will eventually be
put on the properties, which are con-
sidered to be among the richest in the
district. They are at the terminus of
the new telephone line which has been
recently built, and of the proposed
railroad into the district.

ACTION TAKEN.

Lane County Volunteers Will Not
Contribute to Portland Mon-
ument.

Daily Guard, Feb 25.
It seems the Lane county veterans
of the Spanish and Philippine wars do
not take kindly to the proposition
made to hold out one-tenth of the
money now due them for back pay for
the purpose of erecting a monument in
a cemetery at Portland in memory of
the volunteers who are buried there.
The Lane county veterans have a lot
of their own in the Eugene I. O. O. F.
cemetery in which quite a number of
their comrades are buried, and if
money is going to be contributed by
them for a monument they want to
erect one for their own dead.

At a meeting of the veterans in Col
Yoran's room at the armory last night
the following resolutions bearing on
this subject were drafted and a copy
sent to Adjutant-General Gantenbein
and General Summers at Portland:

Whereas, There has been a meeting
of the Second Oregon Volunteers of
Lane county for the discussion of the
question of contributing 10 per cent of
the money due and about to be paid to
the members of the Second Oregon
volunteers to the Portland monument
fund, and

Whereas, The Volunteers of Lane
county have a plot which is to be as
much a national plot as any in the
state, where several comrades are laid
to rest and as no monument marks
their resting place, and as we have
other necessary expenses in connection
therewith, be it

Resolved, That we consider it our
first duty to look after the plot which
is left to our direct charge and that we
recommend that the Volunteers of
Lane county make such contributions
as they see fit toward improving and
beautifying our own plot.

LAUNCHING IN DRIZZLING RAIN

President Roosevelt and daughter, Miss Alice, and
Prince Henry were heartily cheered by the great crowd
that was present to witness the event.

Miss Roosevelt broke the traditional bottle of wine on
the yacht's bow as the vessel first touched the water.

DEATH ON THE RAIL.

AUBURN, New York, Feb 25—A passenger and a wreck-
ing train collided on the New York & Erie Central Rail-
road this morning.

Five persons are dead and two injured as the result
of the accident.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA FEUD.

WASHINGTON, Feb 25—Senators Tillman and McLaurin
of South Carolina, who were suspended from the Senate
yesterday for thirty days on account of a personal alterca-
tion in which the lie was given and blows struck, were re-
stored to the Senate today.

Both senators seem inclined to drop the matter so far
as any further controversy in the Senate may be concerned.

The fight will be taken up by the adherents of the
senators and fought out on South Carolina's political hus-
tings.

BOTHA'S OFFER REJECTED.

LONDON, Feb 25—General Botha's alleged offer to sur-
render the Boer forces under his command to Lord Milner,
governor-general of Cape Colony, has been rejected by the
British war office. No other terms than "unconditional
surrender" will be granted.

THE RAIN.

A Storm of Severity Raging
Today.

Daily Guard, Feb 25.
A rapidly falling barometer last
night indicated heavy rains and equally
weather today and it did not fail to
appear. At an early hour this morn-
ing rain began to descend in vast
sheets and there has scarcely been a
let-up all day.
The streets have been nearly deserted
during the day on account of the se-
verity of the storm, and those who did
venture out were mostly clad in water-
proofs.

The rain is not a very cold one and
will bring the river and its tributaries
up with a bang. There is not very
much snow in the mountains, how-
ever, and if there is any high water it
will not last long.

The sloughs and creeks around town
are all full and overflowing and many
small bridges will be washed out if the
rain continues in this manner.

TRAINS DELAYED.
The storm seems to have been
heavier in Northern California and
Southern Oregon than here. Several
weekouts have occurred on the line of
the Southern Pacific railroad and all
trains are delayed in consequence. The
northbound overland due here at 1:42
this afternoon is tied up somewhere
out south, it is not known where by
the depot men here, as the telegraph
wires are down. No word whatever
can be had from southern points. A
stub train of two passenger coaches and
baggage car was made up at Roseburg
this morning and sent through to
Portland, arriving here slightly ahead
of schedule time.

LOTS OF WILD CATS.—W. H. Man-
ning, an old settler of Pine Openings,
in the Cascade mountains, brought
down to town yesterday a number of
wild cat scalps which he took to the
county clerk's office and received \$2
each for them, the amount allowed by
the state law. Mr. Manning stated
yesterday afternoon that the "var-
mints" are growing much more nu-
merous in his locality than they have
ever been before. He says they are
running the deer out of the moun-
tains, and their scarcity is becom-
ing very noticeable.
