

THE PULPIT IN POLITICS.

FLORIDA SPRINGS.

The United States Geological Survey press bulletin of March 8 says nearly all the streams of Florida originate in large springs of remarkably clear water. Some of these springs form lakes of considerable dimensions, while others flow off directly in bold streams. The water is so clear that the most minute objects, even on the bottom, are readily distinguished, and large streams of crystal water can be seen gushing up through the white colored limestone beds beneath. The outlets of the springs are generally deep, narrow and rapid streams.

One of these characteristic springs is the head of Ocala River and also the head of navigation, as steamboats come up the river into the spring and have a regular landing wharf there. The river flowing out of this spring is 60 feet wide.

THE HORSE'S OLD AGE.

Of all useful animals man uses the horse, about the best, the worst. He is cared for in different fashions by different owners while able to work, but his end in almost every instance is a pitiful tragedy. Now Harvard University has been compelled to cut out the department of veterinary science for the very sufficient reason that it got no students. In formally announcing the abandonment of the department, President Elliott took occasion to remark:

The university has never before been compelled to abandon a department of instruction once adopted by it. The fact seems to be that small domestic animals, like dogs, cats and birds, engage the affection of their owners to such a degree that money will be spent freely to save their lives or relieve their sufferings; but the larger animals, like cattle and horses, do not so much enlist affection, so that moderate money value and the restoration to usefulness are allowed to limit the expenditure upon them when disabled.

A REPUTATION GRAVEYARD.

Field Marshal Wolseley is now on his way to South Africa, on a secret mission it is said. He is the only well-known British general who has not already been on the African field of action and lost his reputation. The truth is that Lord Wolseley was not obliged to go into the war to lose his standing as a general. He lost his reputation and his position of commander-in-chief of the British army without going outside of London.

Lord Wolseley was blamed early in the fight for his alleged incompetence in not having a more complete knowledge than he had of the strength of the Boer army and its equipment. He thought that 50,000 men or so would easily wipe the Boers off the face of the earth. When the English government had put over 250,000 men into Africa and it was found that the burghers were still doing business at the old stand, it was concluded that it was time that the army had a new head and that is the reason Lord Wolseley was supplanted by Lord Roberts.

The Oregon supreme court handed down five decisions Monday, reversing the lower court in every instance. It would be interesting reading if some of the circuit judges could have the opportunity of sitting in judgment on the court of final appeal—that is final so far as state courts are concerned.

It is not easy to comprehend what that means, but taking Eugene weather of this morning as an instance—forty degrees above zero—it would have to go to ten degrees below zero by tomorrow evening to equal the Chicago record. Such a change would not kill Oregonians but it would make us feel very bad.
