SIUSLAW LUMBER.

One Company Shipped 15,000,000 Feet Last Year.

TALK OF A RAILROAD.

The San Francisco & Siuslaw Lumber Company, of Acme, shipped 15,000,000 feet of lumber by schooner last year to San Francisco, says the Oregon Timberman. On March 3, there were five vessels with 900,000 feet aboard, waiting to get a chance to cross the Siuslaw bar with safety. These vessels have been bar-bound for nearly two months. Nearly one million feet of lumber is lying at the San Francisco & Siuslaw Company's wharf awaiting the arrival of five vessels which have been chartered to load and are compelled to remain outside. These are some of the reasons why the coast lumber interests of Oregon have not flourished. The government appropriation in behalf of the Siuslaw river should be large and continuous.

Lane county has more timber within its confines than any county in the United States, and fully one-half is on the west slope of the range and naturally should seek an outlet via the mouth of the Siuslaw.

A RAILROAD.

There has been some discussion regarding the extension of a branch of the Southern Pacific from Eugene to bring out the timber, and there is every reason to believe in due time this will be accomplished.

ROHRER CAPTURED.

Found at Roseburg Saturday Night.

ARRAIGNED THIS MORNING.

Daily Guard March 24. Sheriff Withers found Walter B. Rohrer, the man who assaulted his wife and mother-in-law and abducted his little daughter Thursday afternoon, at Roseburg Saturday night about 8 o'clock. He was brought to Eugene Sunday morning, and this morning at 11 o'clock was arraigned before Justice of the Peace C. A. Wintermeyer, when he entered a plea of not guilty to the three charges brought against him, viz: That of carrying a concealed weapon; that of assaulting his wife, Bertha Rohrer, and that of assaulting his mother-in-law, Mrs. Margaret J. Jenkins.

The time of his preliminary examination was set for Wednesday, March 26, and he was placed under \$300 bonds to appear at that time. E. R. Skipworth appeared as counsel for the prisoner and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. T. Harris represented the state.

The little girl was brought back with Rohrer and restored to her mother who is prostrated from the shock and excitement of the affair of Thursday.

THE ENDEAVORERS.

Business Meeting of the Convention Held This Forenoon.

MR. BAER LEFT TODAY.

Today's work of the Lane and Douglas county district convention now in session in Eugene began with a sunrise prayer meeting at the Congregational church.

The business session of the convention was held at the same place this forenoon. Reports of committees were read and the following new officers for the ensuing year elected:

President—Mark C. Munson, of Roseburg.
Secretary—Miss McCallum, of Eugene.

Treasurer—Miss Constance Handwerker, of Eugene.
Advisory Committee—The five vice-presidents. Rev W. A. Wood, of the Christian church, Roseburg; Rev Dr. Thompson, of the Presbyterian church, Roseburg; Rev J. T. Merrill, of the U. H. church, Eugene; Rev Mac H. Wallace, of the Congregational church, Eugene, and Rev L. D. Beck, of the C. P. church, Cottage Grove.

Secretary Baer and Rev Mr. Temple returned to Portland this afternoon. The convention held no session this afternoon, but a rally meeting was arranged to be held in the Congregational church this evening.

The convention has been a profitable and an interesting one, but not very largely attended by outside delegates.

A WRACK.—The cause of the delay of yesterday morning's train, mentioned in the GUARD yesterday evening, is explained by the Roseburg Review as follows: "Last evening about 6 p.m. a car of bananas attached to through freight train No. 222, en route to Roseburg, jumped the track a half mile south of Ruckies station, badly damaging both car and contents. A wrecking train was dispatched to the scene from Roseburg and by midnight the track was sufficiently cleared to allow the southbound local, which had been delayed here in consequence since its arrival at 5:30 p.m., to proceed on its run, leaving here at 12:25 this morning. Two freight cars were also derailed near the same place Saturday morning."

SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Mrs. Bertha M. Rohrer Wants to Be Free From Her Husband.

Bertha M. Rohrer, through her attorneys, L. Riley and Geo. B. Dorris, has commenced suit in the circuit court against her husband, W. B. Rohrer, for divorce and custody of a minor child. The couple were married in Lane county April 10, 1895, and have one child, Esther, aged 6 years.

The plaintiff alleges that the defendant has been guilty of cruel and inhuman treatment. The complaint states that ever since they were married Rohrer has treated her with great cruelty, often leaving her alone days at a time without provisions; that the plaintiff and defendant have not lived together since March 21, 1900; that on March 20, 1902, defendant came to her father's house where she was staying, armed with a revolver and took away their child by force, and knocking down its mother and its grandmother, Mrs. Jenkins.

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
