

CECIL RHODES.

Cecil Rhodes has been painted unscrupulous and black as the devil. His death at the early age of forty-seven—early for one whose fortune is counted by the hundred million—may win a more lenient estimate from public opinion. John Hays Hammond, the New York correspondent, who was with him several years and claims an intimate acquaintance, sets him in a more favorable light. He writes:

Mr Rhodes, whose sun went down when it was yet day, died in the 47th year of his age. He leaves no posterity, but leaves his name on the map of Africa (Rhodesia), sponsor for a commonwealth nearly as large as our Western states. Had he lived he would have devoted the remaining years of his life to and would have spent every dollar of his fortune in equipping that commonwealth.

Judged by American standards Mr Rhodes was truly a great man. He was not only a great empire builder, but also a captain of industry. He is often reported as a shifty, unscrupulous financier, in league with capitalists to coax the Transvaal into a hopeless war in order to steal the mines of the country. He is also reported as giving his entire life to the amassing of large wealth and ready to employ the most unscrupulous methods to that end. The truth is that Rhodes cared little for money beyond the power it gave him to assist in the development of South Africa.

Personally, Mr Rhodes was democratic in his tastes, and a colonial in his political and social bias. He was fond of the simpler and better pleasures of life, devoted especially to out-of-door life on the veldt, and had a contempt for and disdain of social conventionalities. He was a man of innate refinement and culture, and a graduate of Oxford. Rhodes had an indomitable spirit and dogged perseverance.

Until the unfortunate Jameson raid, for which he has received far more blame than he deserves, as history will prove, he was very popular with the Dutch of South Africa. Within a very short time there would have been a revolution of feeling, and strange as it may sound today, Rhodes would have been able to re-establish his influence with the Dutch, and he would have been quick to take advantage of the situation and would have passed into history as the great pacifier of South Africa.

JIM YOUNGER CANNOT MARRY.

Jim Younger one of the celebrated Younger brothers, under parole from the Minnesota penitentiary, wishes to marry. He cannot, because legally he is dead, hence he is unable to enter into any contract. Younger submitted the question of whether or not he could wed to Governor Van Sant, who has looked into the matter with surprising results. In Minnesota a man who is a life prisoner is civilly dead. The only way he can make any binding contract in the eyes of the law is through the board which paroled him, in this case the Board of Control, which is empowered to enter into a contract for him. It is not probable, however, that three members of the Board of Control, separately or as a whole, will agree to enter into a marriage contract with any woman for the benefit of the paroled life convict. The only way for Jim Younger to become a married man in Minnesota is to get a pardon which will restore him to the rights of a living citizen.

Another phase of the law is that neither Jim Younger nor his brother, Cole, if they establish any business of their own, as has been contemplated, can be held for any debt which they may incur. In his application to the Governor requesting information as to his rights to marry, Younger said nothing regarding his proposed bride.

ABOUT HOPS.

Buyers Securing Contracts For Next Season's Crop.

NEXT YEAR'S OUTPUT.

J. Pincus, of Scio, H. L. Hart, of North Yakima, and B. O. Schucking, of this city, hop buyers, were seen at the Belvedere Hotel today, says the Portland Journal. Very little is said to be doing in the hop market now. Most of last year's crop has been disposed of. About 400 bales remain in the hands of Oregon growers and the dealers have not over 4,000 bales. The ruling price is 12 to 14 cents.

There is considerable activity in making contracts for next year's crop. Twenty thousand bales have been reported as signed for at figures ranging from 11 1/2 to 12 1/2. One lot went for 13.

Hopmen are looking forward to a big yield next season. The railroad companies have just completed their estimate of the quantity raised in this state the past year as being 74,500 bales.

This output is considered low. With the increase in acreage and more favorable conditions this season the estimate is placed at from 85,000 to 90,000 bales. In the Yakima country, Eastern Washington, only 225 bales are left of the old crop, and 3500 bales are said to be contracted for. The total yield in that section last year was 15,500 bales.

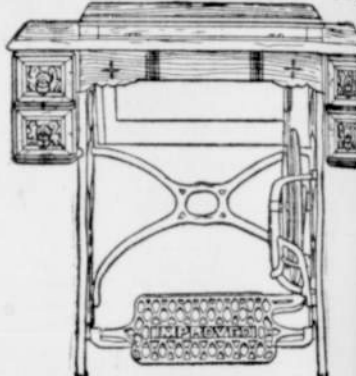

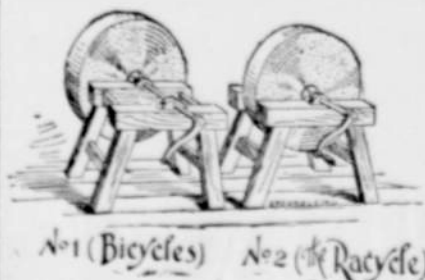
