Republican Senators Warn the President Against Disciplining General Miles

MILITARY MEN SYMPATHIZE WITH MILES

WASHINGTON, March 22.—President Roosevelt is in breakers at the very place where he thought there was plain sailing.

The expressed intention of the President to discipline General Miles for his utterances before the senate committee on military affairs is not only the talk of the national capital, but has brought the friends of General Miles, from all parties, to his defense.

Several Republican senators have warned President Roosevelt that if he attempts to discipline or degrade the commanding general of the army that trouble will certainly ensue. In addition to the support of senators, General Miles has practically the unanimous sympathy of the military arm of the government, of whatever position. Army officers are not chary in saying that General Miles has been unjustly used and humiliated, at the behest of favorite subordinates who could hold the presidential ear.

A WET EXPERIENCE.

Rev Hansen and Louie Luckey
Upset in Turbulent Wolf
Creek.

Rev P. L. C. Hansen, the well known Danish minister of this city, and Louie Luckey had a very wet experience in Wolf creek Tuesday, according to a resident of that vicinity who was in Eugene today.

The reverend gentleman and his companion drove out in a buggy to look after some homestead interests and when they came to the Van Curen ford across Wolf creek, about 30 miles from Eugene, they found the stream to be a roaring torrent on account of the recent heavy rains. They decided to drive across, however, but hadn't gone only a few feet until the horse was forced to swim and the buggy was afloat, and the whole outfit went down stream at a rapid rate. The buggy turned over and the occupants had difficulty in reaching the shore. The horse swam to dry land with the front wheels of the rig but the remaining parts were not fished out until next day. It was a close call from drowning. It is said Rev Hansen could not swim a stroke.

STORE SOLD.

J. W. Stewart, of Springfield, Disposes of His Store.

A CHILD KIDNAPPED.

W. B. Rohrer is Wanted By the Officers.

A BRUTAL ASSAULT.

Walter B. Rohrer, formerly in the butcher business in Eugene with his father-in-law, Shelton Jenkins, is wanted by the local officers, a warrant having been issued by Justice Wintermeier for his arrest.

Rohrer has been separated from his wife some three or four years, and has been in southern Oregon since that time. Recently he returned here and yesterday afternoon proceeded to the residence of his former partner in business, Mr. Jenkins, out west of town, where his wife is living, for the purpose of taking away their little daughter, aged five years. Mrs. Jenkins and Mrs. Rohrer expostulated with him and tried to prevent him from taking away the child, whereupon he brutally knocked Mrs. Jenkins and his wife both down and succeeded in getting the child away.

Before Rohrer proceeded to the house he took the precaution to decoy Mr. Jenkins away by sending him word that a certain party wanted to see him about some land matters.

It is supposed the man has taken or will take the little girl with him back to Southern Oregon. The officers are on the sharp lookout for them and have notified all officers up and down the line of the occurrence.

Sheriff Withers will leave for Roseburg on tonight's train to look for Rohrer.

BROKE HIS LEG.

Emory Gessler Met With an Accident Near Cottage Grove.

Mr. Gessler, accompanied by Dr. L. W. Brown, left for Cottage Grove on the 2.08 train this afternoon to attend the injured man, who is well known here.

Several Propositions Under Consideration By the New Organization.

The new commercial club is going to have a fine home or none, and at least two prominent capitalists of the city are figuring on erecting a building to be used principally by the club. The trustees have several propositions on hand and they will perhaps be brought up for consideration at the next meeting of the club, Monday night.

J. B. Coleman, who owns the three one-story brick buildings occupied by Chas. Littlefield's and Julius Goldsmith's cigar stores and the Oregon saloon on Williamette street, today told a GUARD reporter that he has offered to build a second story to the buildings and extend them back to Park street, the whole upper story to be occupied by the club if it so desires. The building would then be 55x114 feet, which, it seems, would be plenty large.

C. H. CAREY FOR GOVERNOR.

It is Thought Portland Delegates May Support Him.

Thursday's Portland Evening Journal: Who the 67 delegates to the republican state convention will support for governor is a question that the general public would like to have answered.

W. J. Furnish, the Pendleton banker, is in the city from Umatilla county and he would like to know; Gov. F. T. Geer is down from Salem and he would like to ascertain. Others, too, are interested.

Phil Metchan, one of the delegates, was asked this morning what was the status of the delegation on the gubernatorial question and he replied that the subject had never come up in caucus. He believes that at the convention the delegation will be divided. Mr. Metchan said that he thought that Governor Geer had some personal followers in the delegation, but that it was likely that a conference would be held on the question and the county might vote as a unit.

On the street it is generally conceded that Ex-Judge C. H. Carey will receive the support of the delegates elected yesterday. A few days ago Judge Carey said that he was not a candidate but it is not likely that he will refuse the berth.

OUR POPULATION.—Albany Democrat: "The Register said a directory census showed the population of Eugene to be 5,500. The GUARD wishing to give facts presents the actual figures 3,958. The statement is not made whether this is actually confined to the city limits or includes the suburbs as directory censuses often do." The count was not extended beyond the city limits.

FARM SOLD.—The sale of the Henry Coleman place of 313 acres three miles south of Eugene was consummated today by R. F. Baker & Co to Mr. Elliott, who lives near by. The price paid was \$10 per acre.
