JAMES B. CHAMBERS.
Died Last Night After a Severe Illness.

A PROMINENT CITIZEN.

Last evening about 7 o'clock J B Chambers, the well known and highly respected citizen, died at his home, corner West Ninth and Lincoln streets, after a lingering and severe illness from kidney troubles. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the residence and interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery. The obsequies will be conducted by Rev B F Rowland, pastor of the Humphrey Memorial M E church.

James B Chambers was born in Quincy, Logan county, Ohio, April 20, 1830, and died at Eugene, Oregon, March 25, 1902.
His early life was spent in Ohio. In 1859 he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church at Quincy, Ohio, and continued a member of that denomination until his death. On January 29, 1865, he was married to Miss Martha Nies, who with three sons, Frank, Charles and Fred, survive. He came to Oregon in 1884, and located in Eugene in 1887.
His fifteen years of active business life in this city has made his circle of friends and acquaintances very wide. The effect of his quiet and unassuming career cannot be overestimated. He was known as a man of good judgment and practical piety. He may have been somewhat diffident but he never refused to perform what was set before him as his duty. The first Sunday he spent in Eugene he united with the Humphrey Memorial M E church, and from that day until his death he was actively interested in all that pertains to the welfare of the church. Called to the several offices of the church open to laymen he honored every one of them. He was a firm believer in the doctrines and discipline of the church of his choice, yet full of Christian grace and charity, having a warm place in his heart for all Christians. He was a true husband, a kind and affectionate father and, surrounded by those who were dearest to him, he passed away. His name is precious and his life fragrant to our memory. The home, the church, the community will sorely miss his presence and influence. The precious communion he held with his Lord caused him to triumph when the hour of dissolution came, for he was ready to depart and with Christ, which was far better. She who was ever at his side, mourns her loss, but sorrows not as those who have no hope.

EXPIRED SUDDENLY.

Vincent Straub Has Passed to the Great Beyond.

FUNERAL TOMORROW.

The residents of Eugene were shocked this morning to hear the announcement of the sudden death of Vincent, the son of Prof and Mrs John Straub, at 12 o'clock last night.

Up to the time of his death the young man seemed to be in his usual health and his parents had no thought of death coming so soon and so suddenly. Last night the family had been talking pleasantly until quite late. The other members had stepped out of the room, but in a very short time Prof Straub returned and was horrified to find his son expiring, sitting in a chair and with his head on a table. Dr Harris was summoned but before he arrived the young man was dead.
Vincent J G Straub was born in Eugene, near the place where he died, on September 3, 1879. He received his education in Eugene at the public schools and at the University of Oregon. He left the latter institution while in the sophomore year five years ago on account of very poor health. He and his mother then traveled extensively for three years and when they returned, two years ago last June, Vincent seemed to have regained his health. He did not re-enter school, but last fall took a lecture course under Drs Friedel and Condon and was still pursuing the course at the time of death.

Vincent was an exemplary young man and was liked splendidly by all who knew him. He was of a kind and affectionate disposition and was never known to speak ill of anyone. Besides his father and mother and sister, Mary E Straub, large numbers of friends grieve at his untimely demise. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence, corner of East Eleventh and Patterson streets, to be conducted by Rev Mac H Wallace, of the Congregational church, and Dr W R Henderson, of the First Presbyterian church. The remains will be laid to rest in the I O O F cemetery.

GEER'S CHANCES
Are Said to Be Not Flattering—Lane Anti-Geer.

The Portland Telegram of yesterday prints the following concerning the governorship:
"Conservative leaders in Multnomah county declare that T T Geer's chances of securing a renomination are not particularly flattering. They concede 59 votes to the tall yankee of the Waldo hills, declare that there are 141 anti-Geer votes in sight and 145 doubtful or for other known aspirants."
"Geer is conceded six counties, as follows: Marion, Polk, Sherman, Wasco, Wheeler and Yamhill, with an aggregate of 59 delegates. Harney, with its four votes, is in doubt, as there is a contest on there. The counties said to be anti-Geer are Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Crook, Gilliam, Grant, Josephine, Lake, Lane, Malheur, Morrow, Polk, Tillamook, Union, Umatilla and Willamette, aggregating 141 delegates in the republican state convention.

"In the doubtful column are placed Baker, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Harney, Jackson, Lincoln, Linn, Multnomah and Washington, with a total of 145 votes."

THE EXCELSIOR MILL.

A New Dry Kiln Now Being Erected.

MORE MACHINES TO BE ADDED.
The Eugene Excelsior Mill, Royce & Peterson proprietors, is one of the city's busiest manufacturing plants. It has been running night and day for a long time in order to keep up with the big orders for their product, but being unable to fill them fast enough, they will in a few days enlarge their plant, adding two more excelsior machines, which have just been manufactured at Gross Bros' iron works, making a total of ten machines in use.

A new dry kiln has also been found necessary to meet the demands of the factory, and a building for that use is now in course of erection by Contractor N B Alley. It is 30x50 feet and 44 feet high, and is located just north of the kiln now in use.
The company already has thousands of cords of balsam wood, from which the excelsior is made, piled up at the factory site and at other places in the city, which, it seems to a casual observer, would last for years, but they are now advertising for men to cut more wood on their lands on the river bottoms.

At the close of the feet-washing ceremony the paupers were arrayed in new garments and made to partake of a three-course meal, being served by the Emperor and Archdukes.

It was an ancient Holy Thursday custom.
