THE COMPLETE TICKET.

Daily Guard, March 29.
The republican county convention met in the circuit room at the courthouse today. The room was filled with delegates and a large number of spectators. The convention was in a noble hands and the work was carried on smoothly.

Before the convention assembled no caucuses had been held and no "singles" had been fixed. From the beginning to the finish it was a difficult proposition to forecast the result of the convention.

The convention met at 10 o'clock this morning for temporary organization. Mayor G R Christman, chairman of the republican county central committee, called the meeting to order, stated the purpose for which the convention is held and read an editorial from this morning's Register in which a wrong impression in regard to Mr Christman's attitude toward the republican party was corrected.

HON S M YORAN CHAIRMAN.
Senator R A Booth placed in nomination for temporary chairman Hon S M Yorán, and he was unanimously elected. Mr Yorán, upon taking the chair made a short address which was enthusiastically applauded.

B F KEENEY SECRETARY.
B F Keeney, of Goshen, was placed in nomination for secretary and he also was elected by acclamation.

COMMITTEES.
Chairman Yorán then appointed the following committees:

On credentials—R McMurry, North Eugene No 1; Geo O Walker, Saginaw; B A Washburne, Springfield.

On permanent organization and order of business—D A Paine, South Eugene No 1; G W Griffin, North Eugene No 2; L E Parks, Pleasant Hill; W W Scott, Creswell; J I Jones, East Cottage Grove.

On platform and resolutions—E O Potter, North Eugene No 2; W T Bailey, Giletta; J E Bond, Irving; J F Kelly, North Eugene No 2; F G Eby, West Cottage Grove.

Tellers—G W Griffin, North Eugene No 2; Geo H Kelly, South Eugene No 1; A C Dixon, Willamette; W M Green, South Eugene No 2.

The convention then adjourned until 1 o'clock this afternoon.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The courtroom presented an interesting appearance as the numerous delegates and spectators took their places. The delegates were all prompt in attendance. There was no excitement and the regular order of the convention was uninterrupted.

S M Yorán, chairman called the convention to order to complete temporary organization at 1:08 p m and announced that the first order of business was the report of the committee on credentials which was read by chairman R McMurry. The adoption of the report seated 198 delegates. W T Bailey was seated as delegate from Heecta precinct, making a total, 199.

Chairman D A Paine read the report of the committee on permanent organization and was adopted as follows:

1—We would recommend that the temporary officers be made permanent and that W G Gilstrap and F G Eby be declared elected assistant secretaries of the convention. We recommend the order of business to be as follows:

2—The election of 18 delegates to the state convention.

3—The election of 18 delegates to the congressional convention. The 18 candidates each for delegates to the state and congressional convention receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected; tellers to be appointed, the vote taken and canvassed while the convention proceeds with the regular order of business.

The appointment of tellers as follows: Three for the congressional delegation. Three for the state delegation. Seven on the general business of the convention.

4—The nomination of one candidate for state senator.

5—The nomination of three candidates for representatives in the state legislature.

6—The nomination of one candidate for county clerk.

7—One candidate for sheriff.

8—One candidate for county commissioner.

9—One candidate for county treasurer.

10—One candidate for assessor.

11—One candidate for surveyor.

12—One candidate for coroner.

13—The election of county central committee by precincts.

Names of committeemen to be reported to chairman, with postoffice address.

14—Miscellaneous business.

It is recommended that Robert's Rules of Order govern the deliberations of this convention.

All instructions and resolutions to be referred to committee on resolutions without debate.

All candidates must have a majority of all votes cast to become the nominee of the convention.

Meeting of county central committee immediately after convention adjourns to elect chairman and secretary.

It is also recommended that two ushers be appointed for the afternoon session.

STATE SENATOR.

R A Booth nominated, in a glowing speech, parading with complimentary gems, which brought a burst of applause from the whole body assembled, Dr Wm Kuykendall. C H Baker, of Waverly, seconded the nomination. All parts of the county responded with seconds. The doctor carried the convention by storm. The secretary was instructed by the convention to cast unanimous ballot, and Dr Kuykendall was declared the nominee for state senator.

HARRIS, SHELLEY AND EDWARDS REPRESENTATIVES.

Walter Griffin placed in nomination the name of Lawrence T Harris for representative. E O Potter presented the name of J M Shelley. C J Howard of Cottage Grove, placed in nomination Chas H Burkholder of Cottage Grove. W H Weatherston nominated Wm Kyle, of Florence. Jared Scott nominated Jas E Bays of Florence. A R Martin nominated I N Edwards, the junction farmer. H Winfield Hall, a farmer from Zanawab, created considerable flurry by making a speech against returning any candidate to the legislature who had given his support to the enactment of the present tax law.

The first ballot, which resulted in the nomination of the first three gentlemen named, was as follows:

First ballot: E U Lee, 106; A C Jennings, 39; L E Bean, 65. Total vote, 201. J L Page moved that the nomination of E U Lee be made unanimous. Carried and E U Lee was nominated.

JOHNSON FOR SHERIFF.

Dr D A Paine, Eugene, in a neat speech nominated W H Luckey, of Eugene, for sheriff. N J Moffitt, of Junction, nominated J H Miller, of Junction; J C Brattain, of Springfield, nominated A J Johnson, of Creswell; Luther Rowland, of Walton, nominated C W Lyons, of Walton.

First ballot resulted: Luckey, 61; Miller, 40; Johnson, 37; C W Lyons, 11, total 202.

Second ballot—Johnson, 124; Luckey, 24; Miller, 24. Total 202. Johnson declared nominated.

EDWARDS COMMISSIONER.

J C Brattain, Springfield, nominated H D Edwards, of Springfield. Geo Smith was nominated.

First ballot—Edwards, 106; Smith, 31. Total 137. Moved and carried that nomination be made unanimous.

CRAW FOR TREASURER.

A C Dixon, of Coburg, nominated Geo F Craw, of Eugene. Dr D A Paine, of Eugene, nominated J T Rowland, of Eugene. First ballot—Craw, 142; Rowland, 59; L Gilstrap, 1; total, 202. Craw declared the nominee.

BURTON FOR ASSESSOR.

W W Scott, of Creswell, nominated D P Burton, of Cottage Grove, for as-

essor. H W Wheeler, Goshen, presented the name of B F Keeney, of Goshen. First ballot—Burton, 119; Keeney, 78; R S Huston, 1; total, 198. Burton declared the nominee.
