Afternoon.

A TICKET PUT UP.

Daily Guard, April 2

The socialist party of Lane county

met in county convention this

afternoon about 3 o'clock in the hall

over Lake's marble works at the cor-

ner of West Eighth and Olive streets.

A good number of delegates were in

attendance. The meeting was called

to order by Chairman Rosman and

Secretary Cole kept the records of the

convention.

The first thing done was to appoint

a committee on resolutions and plat-

form as follows: W M Davis, H M

Mauville, A C Barrett, J L Atkinson,

A E Whiteaker. The committee made

its report. The platform declares for

the doing away with the fee system for

state officers and placing them on a

flat salary; for equal political and civil

rights for men and women; for the

election of U S senators by direct vote

of the people and for the exclusion of

Chinese and Japanese laborers.

A NEW FLYING MACHINE.—Port-

land Journal: A J Parrot, a well-

known East Side manufacturer, has

invented a new flying machine which

he says will surely fly. The machine

is built in the shape of a naval shell,

will be located, being placed quite a
