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# A SUDDEN DEATH. ADVERTISING OREGON

James H. Graham Died From Heart Trouble

AT 3:30 THIS AFTERNOON.

James H. Graham died suddenly this afternoon about 3:30 o'clock from heart trouble at his home on Pearl street between East Seventh and East Eighth. Mr. Graham had been in ill health for a year or more, and Sunday took a cold and had been confined to his bed since then but it was thought he would recover nicely. This afternoon Mrs. Graham went down town and when she returned found her husband dead. He had passed away suddenly from heart trouble. Mrs. Graham is prostrate from her sudden bereavement and has the sympathy of all.

The deceased gentleman was 67 years old, having been born in Schuyler county, Ill., Oct. 26, 1855. The family came to Lane county 19 years ago by way of Eastern Oregon and have been honored residents here since. Two sons, Harry W. of this city, and David J. in California, mourn with their mother and many friends this sudden taking away of one so dear to them.

Mrs. Edyth Tozier-Weathered at Charleston Exposition.

LECTURED ON PACIFIC NORTHWEST.

Mrs. Edyth Tozier-Weathered, one of Oregon's commissioners to the Charleston Exposition, is constantly singing the praises of this state. On March 11 she delivered a lecture at the Unitarian Parish Hall in Charleston, on "The Pacific Northwest," and of this, her latest effort, the News and Courier, of Charleston, says in its issue of the following day: "The audience that assembled at the Unitarian Parish Hall last evening enjoyed a most delightful treat in listening to the lecture of Mrs. Edyth Tozier-Weathered, commissioner from Oregon, on 'The Pacific Northwest,' a subject with which her literary work as a journalist has made her entirely familiar. Beginning with an account



of the dangers and trials that confronted the sturdy pioneers, she next spoke of the unrivaled natural resources of her section, both mineral and agricultural—its broad, almost boundless wheatfields that resemble prairies in extent, its magnificent orchards and virgin timber lands, its strawberries and raspberries that ripen in December, its rich perennial pastures, its mines of gold that today yield, some of them, over one hundred thousand dollars a month, though they have all only been opened within the past decade. From this she went on to describe in a few words the highly civilized life in the mining camps, and to speak of the superior educational advantages her section affords.

"A very entertaining portion of the address was her account of a schoolgirl's vacation jaunt, which gave opportunity for attractive sketches of the scenery along the river and in the jungles; and of the grand, inspiring sublimity of the mountains. Throughout the lecture the eternal snow-capped mountains were ever in view, giving it tone and character as they do to Western landscapes. She next spoke of the factories and other industries, and of the opportunities offered to immigrants, and, withal, this charming and gifted daughter of the great Northwest painted such a glowing picture of the attractions of her state and section as made those in her audience whose fortune it was to be sons and daughters of the land of the palm trees, the cypress and the vine, to feel that if they were not Carolinians they would most of all prefer to be Oregonians.

"Mrs. Weathered concluded her address, which was listened to with a marked interest and punctuated with applause, with some remarks very complimentary to our city and the exposition, which latter she pronounced a most beautiful and interesting one and that too comparing it with any that had preceded it, and considering all circumstances, a marvellous achievement, and a cordial invitation to all present to come to the Northwestern Centennial Exposition to be held in Oregon in 1905."

# DROWNED IN SIUSLAW

This makes three men of the Lizzie Prein who have lost their lives from drowning in the last year.

# AN ITALIAN DROWNED

His Body Has Been in the River Since April 3rd.

HIS HORSES FOUND DROWNED.

CRESWELL, April 10.—By the finding of his team in the bottom of the river near this place last night, the fact became known that Mike Bomino, an Italian farmer of Cloverdale, was drowned on Thursday, April 3rd.

He was farming on this side of the river and often staid weeks at a time, and his parents, who only recently came out from Italy, and can understand no English, thought he was still working, but upon finding the dead team by Frank Thompson last night an investigation was made with the result that Bomino was not found. On April 3rd was the last he was seen by anyone. That day he took his team to come across the river, and no doubt drove into a deep hole and was drowned.

The unfortunate man came here from Italy several years ago, and was the partner of Vatonis, who is now living in California.

## THE BODY FOUND.

Coroner G. W. Griffin this afternoon received a telephone message from Creswell informing him that the body of Bomino was found about noon today in the river about two miles above the Coast Fork bridge. The coroner will hold an inquest over the body tomorrow morning. The man was single and about 40 years old.

## WILLAMETTE PRESBYTERY.

In Session at Salem—Fall Meeting in Eugene.

SALEM, April 10.—The Willamette Valley Presbytery is holding its semi-annual session at the First Presbyterian church in this city. The concluding session will be held this evening, when an address on missionary work will be delivered by Dr. Maude Allen, a returned missionary from India. The Willamette Presbytery embraces seven counties of the Willamette valley, and has a membership of 22 ministers. The counties represented in this organization of the church are Marion, Linn, Lane, Benton, Lincoln, Polk and Yamhill. It was voted to hold the next fall session in Eugene.

## BELGIUM CAPITAL DISORDERS.

BRUSSELS, April 10.—The Socialist disturbances are daily growing bolder and more serious. The spirit of resistance to the authorities has even extended to the army. In several instances the men have defied their officers, hooted at the government and sang revolutionary songs.
