PLATFORMS AND PARTIES.

Senator Mitchell's drastic measure to exclude Chinese from the Philippines and to prohibit their employment on ships carrying the American flag was defeated in the Senate yesterday. How was the vote? Well, the Republican senators with few exceptions voted in favor of the Chinese, the Democrats for exclusion. How will our Republican friends and candidate throughout Oregon meet this vote? 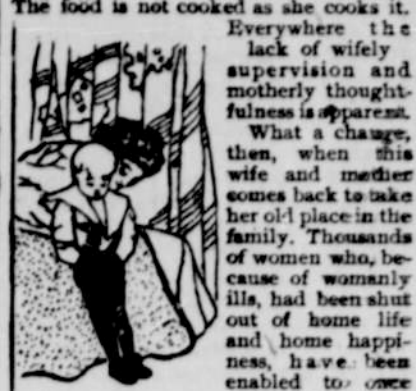

W. W. WITHERS.

From the sheriff's office he was elected into a legislature and when Bryan was nominated for president became a Gold Democrat. Always a shrewd politician he had within two years time captured the Republican organization of the county and shoved the old time leaders into the background. Now, less than six years from the time he first joined the Democratic ticket, he becomes the Republican candidate for governor.
