CHINESE EXCLUSION.

The Oregon Republicans have a drastic Chinese exclusion plank in their platform. And irony of fate! The platform was barely formulated when the Republican majority in the United States senate voted to extend the present exclusion law, under which a Chinaman can come in any time he wants to, ten years. The Democratic senators voted solidly for the bill formulated by Senator Mitchell of Oregon and Representative Kahn of California, for absolute exclusion.

The Republican platform makes Chinese promises—without hope of performance. The Democratic platform is backed up by the absolute certainty that the Democratic vote in congress will be cast against Chinese immigration. There is the choice in your vote for congressman next June.

A trust lesson comes all the way from Colorado. The sugar trust has absorbed a Colorado beet sugar factory which had been established by local people. The methods of the trust in this transaction were somewhat out of the ordinary. The trust demanded that it should be made the agent for all the sugar manufactured at the local factory, to sell at such prices as the trust would make from time to time. If this demand was not agreed to the trust would erect a factory of its own and pay as high as \$10 per ton for beets until the local concern would be forced to close. The local factory has capitulated and the trust will either take over the factory or else control and dispose of its product. It is well to remember that the tariff on refined sugar practically prohibits foreign importation. The sugar trust is supreme.

As an example of the good work one man can do toward the rectifying of a public wrong it is worthy of note that the railroad assessments of the state of Ohio have been almost doubled, the companies themselves in many cases giving in the increased valuation. For this good work, by which the transportation companies were made to share their just proportion of the burden of taxation, Tom L. Johnson, mayor of Cleveland, is a glorious responsible. He started a vigorous warfare in this line, demonstrating that the railroads were assessed at practically only one-fourth the rate at which other property was taxed.

While Belgium is a monarchy her people are Democratic in their actions, having little respect for the "divine rights of kings" idea. King Leopold is credited with having practically suspended his marital vows, the occasion thereof being a French dancer. When the king started for Paris not long since a large concourse of his subjects witnessed the departure, and pleasantly regaled his majesty's ears with shouts of "Vive Clio-pold," the name of his French lady. It is not all fun being a king—of Belgium at least.

A New England paper reports that several ministers in that part of the country have recently sued for divorce. In every case the defense was that the social duties of a minister's wife were too heavy to bear, that his salary wasn't sufficient to provide a fitting support and, generally, that being a parson's wife is a bore. If this be the general opinion and common course of action in that part of the country, the ministers' wives must be quite "new women," as compared with those of half a century ago.

Merrill, the Portland bicycle man, is nothing if not unique in his advertising methods. Yesterday's Portland Journal tells how "a unique procession wended its way through the streets this afternoon. It consisted of the Third Regiment brass band, four automobiles and 13 teams drawing as many drayloads of bicycles. The wheels are a consignment which has just arrived from the East for Fred T. Merrill."

DAVID CHASE

Expired While Sitting in His Chair This Morning.

SHORT SKETCH OF HIS LIFE.

Daily Guard April 25

David Chase died at his home a mile or so northeast of Eugene on Sunday morning at 6:30 o'clock while sitting in his chair. He had been in very feeble health for some time, and this morning upon arising, his wife led him to a chair, and was assisting him to dress when his head dropped to his shoulders and he expired.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the residence and the remains will be interred in the Springfield I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Miller, of the Springfield Baptist church, will conduct the ceremonies.

David Chase was born in New York state 17 years ago. He was married to Miss Rhoda Root, and at an early day they moved to Michigan. From there they moved to Kansas in the fall of 1887. They resided in that state until 8 years ago when they moved to Oregon, settling on the farm where death occurred this morning.

Eight children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Chase, seven of whom, with their mother, are now living, one son having been drowned in the Willamette river several years ago. The other children are: Mrs. Melissa Baldwin, of Michigan; Mrs. Charles Richardson, of Michigan; Mrs. Ida Kingsley, of Kansas; Mrs. Ann Kingsley, of Washington; Chase Chase, of Washington; J. W. and F. B. Chase, of near Eugene.

Mr. Chase was an honored citizen and has many friends who are pained to learn of his death.
