Gibson gave himself up to the custody of the sheriff. He claims the killing was done in self defense. The body was brought to town last night. An inquest is being held today.

MURDER WILL OUT.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—Several months ago a most sensational murder was committed in this city. The almost nude body of a young girl was found in an unoccupied residence. She had been murdered several days before the finding of the body, its condition and the period she had been missing from home fixing the date of the crime very nearly. She had left home about the day of the murder in response to an advertisement in one of the daily papers.

This morning the police placed Charles B Hadley, for fourteen years an accountant in the Examiner newspaper office, under arrest and charged him with the murder of Nora Fuller.
