FINE NEW UNION DEPOT.

COTTAGE GROVE, April 24.—J C Long returned from Portland yesterday, bringing some good news concerning the Bohemia railroad. While at the metropolis Mr Long, Mr Morphy and I H Bingham paid Mr Kohler of the S P railroad a visit, and found him in excellent spirits on the subject of railroads. Mr Kohler told them that he had learned that the money for constructing the proposed road to Bohemia was already on deposit in Portland and he said to them, "That will build the railroad."

Mr Kohler also disclosed the fact that the S P Co has set apart \$1600 for the purpose of building a new depot at Cottage Grove, and he assured our men that it would be a union depot, and that the Bohemia road could be connected with the S P road and the one depot used for both.

The grounds around the depot and between tracks will be filled in with crushed rock and finished with granite in the latest approved style for depot grounds.

CONTRACTS SIGNED.

Contracts were signed up yesterday for the grading and laying of ties for the flat 10 miles of road. Alexander & Campbell, of this city, are the local contractors, and they, as the Pacific Timber Co, have intimate business connections with Mr Ladd, of the Ladd & Tilton Bank of Portland, and the bonds for the contractors will come through that bank. Your correspondent is informed that two carloads of tools are already on the road and we expect to see them on the sidetrack here in a day or two.
