KUYKENDALL'S RECORD.

Cottage Grove Leader, April 25.

That Senator Kuykendall is owned body and soul by corporations and is an enemy of the laboring classes is clearly proven by his record in the last Oregon legislature. The senate journal of the last state legislature, upon page 137, shows that upon the 24th day of January, 1901, quoting the words of senate journal, "Senator Kuykendall moved to amend by striking out" the memorial to congress asking for the reconnection of the Chinese and Japanese exclusion laws, and he gave a long and bitter debate against the passage of the memorial.

Speaking of this, the Daily Oregonian, a Republican newspaper, on the 25th day of January, 1901, says, quoting the exact words: "In discussion of the memorial Senator Kuykendall provoked a spirited debate by moving to strike out the sections extending the act to Japanese and other Mongolians, on the plea that the Japanese were progressive and civilized. He further declared that he was personally opposed to all exclusion laws and believed that the United States could compete with the entire world." He also said that we needed cheap labor to develop this grand and beautiful Pacific Coast.

Senator Kuykendall is the employee and physician of the Southern Pacific railroad for Lane county. The railroad company wants cheap labor, and Senator Kuykendall is willing to obey the dictates of the railroad company and open the gates for the flooding of the coast by the "yellow terror," rather than work for the interests of the laboring classes. He furthermore is the champion of the railroad company in preventing the passing by the legislature of a three cent a mile fare law, and a maximum freight law. Our candidate for senator, pledges himself to work at all times for the people, rather than for the railroad. And, is elected, he will introduce a law to take the people out of the clutches of the railroad company. You cannot expect any assistance from their employee and their doctor.

Twelve cents per bushel for wheat and \$9.20 to ship a horse from Eugene to Portland is robbery of Lane county farmers by the railroad corporation. Thousands of people coming west are settling in Washington rather than Oregon, because Oregon has the reputation of being within the clutches of the Southern Pacific railroad.

These facts are sufficient to prove to the entire satisfaction of the rank and file of the Republican party in Lane county that Mr Kuykendall is the tool of the corporation, and as such is bound to be a hindrance to any legislation that is calculated to be of benefit to the people.

ONE TRUST COMES TO GRIEF

The natural thing has happened. The Chicago packers and slaughterers formed a trust and put

up the price of fresh meats to the retailer. Of course the retailer had no choice but to advance the price to consumers. But the great majority of consumers have no choice but to fix the cost of living according to their income. So, with high priced fresh meats, they are using more salted meats, butter and lard in their living, with the result that sales of fresh meats have fallen off one third in the past few days.

There is full compensation in nature for wrongs committed against her laws. There is no little satisfaction in the thought that at least this one combination that was made to rob the public—no other word fits the case—has come to grief through the ability of the people—coupled with necessity—to change their mode of living.
