A CURIOUS CERTIFICATE OF CHARACTER.

Senator Kaykendall tells the public in this morning's Register how the bill to cut off from Lane county four by twenty miles of territory including much of the Blue River mining district, was killed in the House by the efforts of the House members after he allowed it to pass the Senate. The Senator has secured a curious certificate of character from Lane county gentlemen who were prominently interested in saving the valuable strip of territory to Lane county. It is an extraordinary document. Referring to his statement in the Register they certify:

To the best of our knowledge and belief the above communication is a correct statement of the matters set forth therein.

"Extraordinary," we say, for it is most unusual for signers of what is clearly intended for an endorsement and defense to certify according "to the best of knowledge and belief." Did these gentlemen refuse to sign any other endorsement than that of "best knowledge and belief?" They were in a position to know at least ascertain the facts. Why do they seek cover under a certificate of "belief?"

Here is what the DAILY GUARD of February 1st, 1901 said about Senator Kaykendall's surrender, without a word of protest from these gentlemen who now attempt to bolster him up:

AN OUTRAGE.

Our Senatorial Delegation Surrender to the Enemy.

The business men of Eugene and all those miners who are in the city are roaring at the "surrender" of the Lane county senatorial delegation to the Linn countyites in the matter of the annexation of a portion of our county to the latter. It is not a "compromise." It is an absolute surrender of most valuable mines and timber interests. A mass meeting of the citizens of Eugene, duly advertised, declared against the surrender of one foot of the land belonging to Lane county in that section. Now her own senators not only consent to the taking but vote for the same. It is stated that they, the senators, were afraid that Senator Kelly, of Linn county, would defeat the University appropriation bill, notwithstanding this measure had passed a full house of 60 members without a dissenting voice the day before. And still they were afraid of Kelly in the senate! It seems to us that this is a weak explanation.

"UNDER DURESS" HOW?

The Oregonian reports Senator Kaykendall as saying "he consented under duress," to the bill. Will he explain fully to his constituency what this means?

A SPLENDIDLY QUALIFIED CANDIDATE.

Simon Klov Dahl, the Democratic nominee for county surveyor, is a native of Norway, where he received his professional education after graduating with high honors both from the High School and the Military Academy. He afterwards took a technical course in Denmark. Fifteen years ago he came to the United States and located in Superior, Wisconsin, where he was engaged in civil engineering and surveying up to a year ago, when he considered that there was a better climate and place for a home on the Pacific Coast, and after looking over the different points he located in Eugene where he has resided for the past year.

The qualifications of Mr Klov Dahl render him splendidly fitted for the office of county surveyor. Though his residence among us does not date far back, old time friends vouch for his personal character and responsibility, while many newly formed acquaintances hold him in high esteem. Our local surveyors who have had the opportunity to test Mr Klov Dahl's technical knowledge bear witness to his special fitness for the place.

VERACITY?

Register: The election of Farnish is conceded as well as that of the entire state ticket by majorities ranging from 8000 to 15,000.

The opposition to Mr Farnish is the only party that may "concede" the election of the ex-Democratic officeholder. The recognized representatives of that party, county and state committee chairmen, have not "conceded" the election of Mr Farnish. On the contrary they hold out a reasonable hope that George E Chamberlain will be elected governor on the second day of June. Newspapers as well as individuals should keep within the bounds of truth. SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Lane County Sunday School Workers Met at Creswell.

Special to Guard. CRESWELL, May 13.—One of the most interesting and best attended Sunday school conventions ever held in Lane county convened at Creswell May 9th and 10th.

The zeal and enthusiasm manifested during their convention should be encouraging to all workers in this good cause and inspire them to greater efforts in the future. The time allotted for the convention was entirely too brief.

The convention was opened at 3:15 by President Rydard. Friday afternoon was devoted to reports of district presidents, appointments of committees and the assignment of delegates to their places of entertainment. Friday evening was occupied by Rev H A Green, pastor of the First Baptist church of Eugene. Mr Green delivered an excellent address upon the subject of "The Holy Spirit as Teacher in the Sunday School."
