SENATOR KUYKENDALL'S PRE- DICAMENT.

Senator Kuykendall is in sore straits about the statement of Senator Inman of Portland that he voted against the memorial to exclude Asiatic races from the United States. This morning's Register publishes "remember" affidavits from President of the Senate Fulton and Chief Clerk Moorhead that:

"On the 24th day of January the Memorial came before the Senate for final action thereon, and Senator Kuykendall voted to amend it by striking out all except that portion asking for re-enactment of the law excluding Chinese, the effect of the motion being to strike out (if adopted) the portion asking for the exclusion of all Asiatic races. The motion to amend was lost and a vote was taken on the adoption of the resolution, and I distinctly remember that Senator Kuykendall voted to adopt the resolution."

Senator Inman says "remember distinctly that he voted against the Memorial." As no record is made of viva voce evidence on such a vote is a matter of personal recollection. You can believe whom you like. But there is this about the matter that seems to bear out Senator Inman's "remember" distinctly. There is no difference between the senators in the statement that "Senator Kuykendall moved to amend it by striking out all except that portion asking for re-enactment of the law excluding Chinese." That is a matter of record. Senator Kuykendall cannot get away from that. No affidavit will cure his motion, the effect of which, if it had prevailed, would be to allow Japanese, Koreans and all Asiatic mongrels free entry to this country.

Who that knows the marked resemblance between these Asiatic races will believe that the shrewd Chinaman could be kept out if the kindred Asiatic races were allowed free entry?

Senator Kuykendall must have known, too, that the Southern Pacific Railroad, the largest employer of labor on the Pacific Coast, employs Japanese labor wherever possible. It is business as a physician calls him a drive along the railroad track two days for him to be ignorant of the fact that Japanese labor keeps up that track. Probably, though, Senator Kuykendall believes that it is right that Japanese should be employed in preference to white men. His vote, taking either horn of the dilemma in which he is placed, warrants such conclusion.

"ABE" S. PATTERSON.

The Democratic candidate for county treasurer, A S Patterson, is

an Indian by nativity, and there he was raised and educated. And, by the way, Governor Whiteaker and himself came from the same locality, being born but eight miles apart. He received a good common school education and while hardly out of his teens was admitted to the practice of law. He practiced some in his native state, and was admitted to the bar in Oregon, but never "hung out his shingle" here.

Mr Patterson may well take rank as a Lane county pioneer, coming to Oregon by the ox team line in 1853, arriving in Eugene about the last of October of that year. Since that time his life has been a part of the history of the town. Probably no man among us is so well and generally known. In early days he engaged in the merchandising business. Was connected with the river transportation lines as local agent before the advent of the railroad. Engaged in the sawmill and logging business, and for a number of years owned a one-fourth interest in the Eugene flouring mill and the water power and other property connected therewith. Was appointed postmaster of Eugene July 1, 1869, and held the position for several terms. He was succeeded by F W Osburn on the expiration of the term during the first Cleveland administration.

COUNTY TREASURER.

Mr Patterson has held the office of county treasurer three terms, giving excellent satisfaction by the personal attention he gives the affairs of the office. For years before his first election the office was "farmed" out to the banks to a considerable extent, the treasurer paying little attention to the affairs of the office as a rule. Mr Patterson changed that regime. He moved the office from the banks to the courthouse. If you want to do business with the county treasurer nowadays you can do it at the courthouse, the same as with the clerk and sheriff.

The nomination first came to Mr Patterson from a Populist convention in 1896, followed by a Union convention in 1898, and a Citizen's convention in 1900. Those organizations having been merged in the Democratic party, very naturally he received the unanimous Democratic nomination this year.

It has not been all good fortune with A S Patterson. A number of years ago he lost an arm through disease, amputation being made at the shoulder joint. He has never regained the robust health he enjoyed before that great misfortune overtook him. And now in the midst of a campaign when he feels that he should be at his post of duty, he is confined to the house with a rheumatic attack, his illness not being so serious, though, as to preclude his signing orders and necessary papers prepared by the deputy treasurer, his son Percy. His reelection would not only be a just tribute to a faithful and painstaking official, but a deserved recognition of the sturdy pioneer element that has contributed to so large a degree in making Lane county what it is today.

DR. F. E. SELOVER.

The Democratic candidate for coroner, Dr F E Selover, was born in Morrow county, Ohio, in 1872. Came to Portland, Oregon, in 1887. He entered the Bishop Scott Military Academy in that city and pursued his studies within a year of graduation, when ill health compelled him to quit school. He finished the course of studies later under a private instructor.

Dr Selover graduated from the University of Oregon Medical College at Portland in 1897. Before graduation, however, he took a year's instruction in Chicago, in the nature of a post-graduate course. Going there with the intention of finishing his medical education at Rush Medical College he found the clinics connected with the college so overcrowded as to lose much of the practical benefit they sought to impart, so he took private instruction and returned to Oregon to graduate as above noted. Was connected with St Vincent Hospital, Portland, from the Spring of 1897 till the Spring of 1898, coming to Eugene in the latter year.

During his residence in Eugene Dr Selover has built up a good practice through careful, faithful work. He stands well with his brothers of the medical profession.

MR FURNISH'S PAST RECORD.

The Oregonian reports Mr Furnish as having said at Oregon City that "The Democrats do not want to hear of their past record. The people know the Democratic party and will not take any of its promises." The Republican candidate for governor probably meant his own record as a Democrat—taking bums to Portland from Pendleton for selling whiskey to the Umatilla Indians, at the rate of \$16 for every working day for two years. He got \$9651.84.

If not that his record as the Democratic sheriff of Umatilla county which he worked by some means to the amount of \$24,000 a year, an average of about \$80 a working day. Umatilla county and Lane have about the same population. To any sheriff of Lane county who held office under the fee system about the same time with Mr Furnish, even the verified statement that Furnish got that amount out of the Umatilla county treasury seems like fiction—impossible. Eighty dollars a day! And that for four years!

Farmers, will you take chances on such a governor for four years? He would own the state house before he was in Salem a year!
