UMATILLA AGAINST FURNISH.

His Home County, Says J. J. Coleman, for Chamberlain.

PORTLAND, May 27.—J. J. Coleman, a prominent insurance man of this city, has returned from a trip throughout Eastern Oregon. Mr. Coleman said today:

“I predict that George E. Chamberlain will cross the Cascade Range out of Eastern Oregon with at least 2,000 majority. I base this prediction upon my observation throughout the counties of Eastern Oregon.

“I predict that George E. Chamberlain will carry Umatilla county. I personally visited Pendleton, Milton, Athens, Adams, Helix and Echo, points distributed well throughout the county, and I find the condition such as to warrant the forecast I am now giving you.

“It is a remarkable movement such as I have never before witnessed in Oregon. It goes without saying that the valley counties will be loyal to Mr. Chamberlain, so that if Multnomah county be even a stand-off, Mr. Chamberlain will be elected Governor. However, it is fair to assume that Multnomah county will do better than that, and give him a majority.”

LARGE FARM SALE.

DR. KUYKENDALL SQUIRMS.

Made a Pithy Spectacle in Answer to a Straightforward Question.

PLEASANT HILL, May 26, 1902.
EDITOR GUARD:—Having been a life-long Republican and a resident for many years of Lane county, I deem it my privilege to comment on the conduct of any candidate whose name appears on the Republican ticket and who asks for my political support.

It was my pleasure to attend the joint debate of the candidates at Pleasant Hill yesterday, but it is with chagrin and disappointment that I feel it my duty to call the attention of Republican voters of Lane county to the conduct of the man whose name appears at the head of the Republican ticket and who asks the citizens of this county to continue him in the position of state senator, Dr. William Kuykendall.

After Kuykendall had closed his address a gentleman arose from the audience and asked permission to submit some questions to the Doctor. The Doctor replied that he would prefer that the gentleman would defer his questions until after all the candidates had spoken, at which time he would answer any and all questions fairly and squarely.

After the debate had closed the Doctor indicated that he was ready to answer any and all questions. The questioner arose and addressing the Doctor personally, asked:

“First: Are you in sympathy with and an advocate of the principles of the Initiative and Referendum?” To which the Doctor replied in substance, that he was.

“Second: Are you in favor of the election of United States senators by the direct vote of the people?” To which the Doctor said, “I most certainly am.” “Very well; those two questions being settled, I should like to ask you this: If Hon. T. T. Geer receives a majority of the Republican votes of this state, or of this county endorsing him for United States senator, will you support him and vote for him in the next legislative election of senator, if you are elected?”

The Doctor's answer to this question was pithy in the extreme. He parried, avoided and floundered about, in fact did everything but give a straightforward answer.

Not being satisfied with this answer or with the Doctor's quibbling, the question was put in another form: “I perceive,” said the questioner, “that Dr. Kuykendall has not caught the spirit of my question. You say, Doctor, you are in favor of the Initiative and Referendum, and that principle coming from the very hearts of the people, why do you not say then, if you desire to represent the wishes of your people honestly, that if Governor Geer should receive a majority of all the Republican votes you will support him?”

Here is what he said, crouching behind Mr. Travis, his opponent, with his hand upon his shoulder: “I will agree to support him, if elected, provided my opponent, Mr. Travis, agrees to support him if he is elected.” A general uproar followed the puerile evasion, and there would most certainly have been a climax had not our good old neighbor, Mr. Rigden, the chairman of the meeting, realizing the disaster that would surely befall the Doctor, for there were many Republicans on their feet ready to demand a straight, honest answer, suddenly adjourned the meeting.

Friends of Governor Geer and Republicans of Lane county, are we not entitled to know how Dr. Kuykendall stands upon the issues that are vital to us all?

AT COTTAGE GROVE.

How Travis was Easily the Favorite of the Day.

A FROST FOR KUYKENDALL.

A special to the Salem Journal from Cottage Grove says:

COTTAGE GROVE, May 24.—Wednesday the county candidates held their joint debate in this city. A large crowd was in attendance, which means considerable interest in this section over political matters. The debate was a disappointment from a Republican standpoint as Senator Kuykendall has been placed in the uncomfortable attitude of defense of his legislative record. He was coolly received at this place and even the popular representative of the lower house, Hon. L. T. Harris, was unable to stir up but little enthusiasm. If Lane county goes as Cottage Grove votes, Mr. Kuykendall will be left at home by a big majority.

Hon. Lee M. Travis, Democratic nominee for state senator, was the favorite of the day and will run even ahead of Chamberlain at this place. The city is Republican by about 75 votes, normally, but Chamberlain and Travis will poll from 50 to 75 majority in June.

VIOLENTLY INSANE.

George Higgins brought in From Five Rivers Sunday.

Deputy Sheriff Harry Bown returned Sunday from Five Rivers precinct, away out in the northwestern corner of the county, having in charge George Higgins, an insane man. He was examined this morning by Drs. L. W. Brown and F. E. Selover before Judge Kincaid and sentenced to the insane asylum at Salem. Sheriff Withers took him below this afternoon.

Higgins is a single man aged about 35 years and lived in a cabin up in the mountains by himself. He is violently insane on religion and had terrorized the neighborhood in which he lived. He ordered several ranchers off their places at the point of a gun and created consternation wherever he went.

Deputy Sheriff Bown left here Wednesday to get the man, and arriving in that vicinity proceeded to his cabin in company with two young men who knew him, and before he could do them any bodily harm, hand-cuffed him and brought him out over the mountains on horseback to Junction, a distance of 60 miles, coming on up to Eugene on the train.

RICH STRIKE IN BOHEMIA.

Ore Assaying \$413 Per Ton in Golden Slipper Mine.

JUNCTION CITY, May 27.—Dr. W. W. Oglesby, of this city, president of the Golden Slipper Milling & Mining Company, received word from the foreman, Harvey Johnson, of the mine which is in the Bohemia district, that he has made a wonderfully rich strike on the company's property, the ore assaying as high as \$413 a ton. The company has a group of nine claims, all prospecting well.

OREGON DID RIGHT.

In Refusing to Compete in the U. O.—W. U. Meet.

Oregonian: The protest against the Pearson brothers of the University of Washington, and Oregon's refusal to offer effective competition in the dual track meet at Seattle last Monday has caused widespread commotion in intercollegiate athletic circles throughout the Northwest during the past week. Oregon's action is unprecedented on the field of sport, and the Eugene men have been severely criticised for turning what promised to be a good meet into a miserable farce. On the other hand, many students from other institutions, who are familiar with the athletic methods now in vogue at the University of Washington, declare that Oregon did just the right thing, and their sentiments have been endorsed by not a few of the Washington students themselves.

Citizens of Seattle who are familiar with Washington's disreputable athletic policy are inclined to sympathize with the Oregonians, although those who paid a round sum to see the meet feel that they were duped. Washington's absolute and positive refusal to arbitrate the matter puts the Seattle men in a very bad light, and Oregon's willingness to abide by any decision that an investigation committee shows that the visitors were inclined to play fair. Their action on the track was the result of Washington's continued refusal to grant the protest even a respectful hearing, and the threat of Manager Gaches that no expense money would be forthcoming unless a meet of some kind be held. The whole affair has been an unfortunate one, but its effect may be wholesome on the ambitious athletes of the Northwest.

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J. A. BURLINGAME DEAD.

His Remains Brought Up From Portland Today.

J. A. Burlingame, who has been in St. Vincent's hospital in Portland died Sunday morning, May 25, at 1:30 o'clock from the effects of an operation for liver trouble.

The news of his death was a great shock to his many friends here as he had spent a few days at home here only a short time before he died, and reports from the hospital after the last operation was performed indicated that he was getting along nicely.

Mrs. Burlingame accompanied the remains up from Portland this afternoon.

Mr. Burlingame was a prominent worker in the G. A. R. and Royal Arch Masons. He has lived here about 12 years and has lived an upright and honorable life. He served in the civil war in Co. K, Second Maine Volunteers, and in the First Maine heavy artillery. He was at one time state senator of Nevada and has held other important offices. He was 60 years old. His wife has the heartfelt sympathy of the entire city.

GRANTS PASS FIRE.

A Loss of \$100,000 in the Factory Fire Yesterday Evening.

GRANTS PASS, May 27.—Fire yesterday evening destroyed the factory and mills of the Sugar Pine, Sash and Door Company, Williams Bros' and a number of dwellings in Grants Pass. The loss will be about \$100,000 and the insurance is very small. In fighting the fire J. A. Turner was severely injured and may die.

The Hooth-Kelly Co., of Eugene, owned an interest in the Sugar Pine Co., and R. A. Booth has gone to the scene of the fire. It is probable the mills will be rebuilt.
