ALREADY TEARS FOR FURNISH.

The GUARD believes that Mr. Furnish, the hero of fat faces as sheriff and Deputy United States Marshal, will be defeated for governor. "Why?" the reader will ask. We reply, because the Oregonian and Salem Statesman, the leading Republican papers of the state, virtually admit his defeat. Read these editorial notes from their issues of yesterday morning, Tuesday, then consider the stream of mind that makes such extraordinary utterances possible less than a week before the election:

Salem Statesman, May 27.

No matter what he thinks of Mr. Furnish, or who he thinks ought to be on the ticket in his place, no Republican has any right to vote anything but the straight ticket this year.

Portland Oregonian, May 27.

We shall see how many men there are in Oregon who have professed to be Republicans, yet who care less for the policy and purposes of the party than they do for petty office and their private revenge.

The Oregonian and Statesmen people are in a position to form a very correct estimate as to how badly Grover Cleveland's "whiskey-to-Indians" rustler will get hurt Monday. After reading the above can you believe that they have even a forlorn hope that he may be elected?

BOASTS HIS DUPLICITY.

It is surprising! What must the people really think of Senator Kuykendall when he tells them that he agreed to and voted for the cession of the strip of Blue River mining territory to Linn county with the mental reservation that he would use all his influence towards defeating the measure in the House? It is an astonishing confession! Men seldom go out in the open and boast of duplicity—bad faith.

And Senator Kuykendall claims credit for his perfidy with the statement that he did it to save the University appropriation. If that is true, though reliable gentlemen inform us the University appropriation was never in the least danger, it is the certain way to raise up enemies against the University. They that "sow the wind" are liable to "reap the whirlwind."

A FAMILY ROW.

This is one campaign in which the Oregonian is not particularly abusing the Democratic party, and for a very good reason. It has a lot of Republican dirty linen in

the suds and that must be got out. Witness:

Republicans of Marion county and elsewhere, too, would do well to look out for the stiletto and fifth-rib politics of Governor Geer. It is known that Senator Simon is doing his utmost to stab the Republican party, wherever he can.—Oregonian, May 28.

A. J. SMITH.

The Democratic candidate for constable in the Eugene Justice District, A J Smith, better known as "Jack," came to Oregon in 1881 from Indiana, where he was born forty-two years ago. He located in the Bailey settlement, southwest of Eugene, and lived there till five years ago when he moved to his present home on the corporation line of West Eighth street, Eugene.

It is remembered, doubtless, that things were not very good some years ago, when the Democratic party had direction of the affairs of the country.—Oregonian.

Those times the Oregonian refers to came at the last year of President Harrison's administration. The financial condition of the country was such that Harrison was defeated for a second term by Grover Cleveland. The last years of Cleveland's second term had fairly prosperous conditions. It was one of Shakespeare's characters, we believe, who exclaimed, "Lord, Lord! How we old men are given to lying!" The worst of it is in this case the Oregonian is not ignorant of the facts.

The Register, too, resurrects the remembrance of Ben Harrison's hard times, and lays it to the Democratic party because the full force of the panic that came in Harrison's last year spent itself in the first year of Cleveland's second term. Why should partisans treat politics different from business relations? The man that would not misrepresent the least business proposition often willingly becomes a most cheerful liar where politics is concerned.

How does it come that Senator Kuykendall deems it necessary to get Editor Scott, Senator Mitchell, Speaker Fulton and others from "away off" to give him certificates of character? The county is being flooded with such stuff. Surely Senator Kuykendall's many years of residence in Lane county should not require this outside bolstering! Has he no confidence in his own people?

TO NON-REGISTERED VOTERS.

If you have not registered with the county clerk you will have to get six freeholders to certify that you are a resident of the precinct and entitled to vote before you can cast your ballot on election day. Those who failed to register should be at the polls early and get affidavits of the freeholders before the rush comes on in the middle of the day. No man should stay away from the polls; all should exercise the elective franchise.

A PERSONAL STATEMENT

To the Voters of the Eugene Justice District.

The following reasons why James F Amis should be elected Justice of the Peace are submitted for your consideration:

Mr Amis was admitted to the bar in 1852, in Kentucky, and subsequently practiced in the courts of Oregon. This by way of his legal attainments.

He is entitled to your votes, we think, for other valid considerations. He has been a citizen and taxpayer of Oregon for 44 years, and a resident and taxpayer of Eugene for 9 years of that time. He has contributed hundreds of dollars in the way of taxes and labor, to make roads and bridges and build schoolhouses. He was a contributor towards securing the University of Oregon for Eugene.

As a citizen and man of a family Mr. Amis' interest is and always has been closely identified with that of the people of the county and state.

His fellow citizens have several times bestowed on him offices of honor and trust, and no breath of complaint has ever been uttered against him for not faithfully performing his duty.

A MEXICAN WAR VETERAN.

Mr Amis has not only served his country in a civil capacity, but he is one of the few remaining veterans of the Mexican War who served under General Taylor on the Northern line of the army. He cast his first vote for that old hero in 1848. [General Taylor was elected as a whig—the predecessor of the Republican party.]

Being now too old to perform manual labor, run a newspaper, [his latest occupation], or to devote the energy necessary to the successful prosecution of the practice of law, the office of Justice of the Peace would eminently fit Mr. Amis and render him some little compensation for his services.

THE OPPOSING CANDIDATE.

As to Mr. Amis' opponent, he is a young and able-bodied man. He has not helped to build roads, school-houses or other public institutions—at least not to any noticeable extent. He has held the office for four years—long enough according to the well founded principle that rotation in office inures to public benefit.

The office of Justice of the Peace is an important one, and above all other county offices should be entirely removed from partisan influences and considerations at all times.

FROM COTTAGE GROVE.

Progress on the New Railroad—
Dr Kuykendall's Little Book.

COTTAGE GROVE, May 29.—There are eight carloads of steel rails on the siding here now for the Bohemia railroad. Graders are at work on the new siding that is to connect the new road with the S P road. Their new switch was put in yesterday about 400 yards south of the depot.

There are a lot of bridge timbers here awaiting the completion of the siding so that they can be unloaded directly on the spacious framing yard when they will be made ready and shipped to the bridge sites on Mosby creek and Row river.

Dr Kuykendall's little book reached this place yesterday in considerable quantities and it fell as flat as a cold pancake on a dirt floor. The average man read only the names signed to the letters in the little book. That was enough.

The Hiawatha Mining Co set up a big load of supplies this week and will begin active work soon.

The planing mill and ash and door factory at this place will be put in operation this summer and run under the management of J I Thomas, of this city, and Mr Abrams, the planing mill man of Eugene.
