Now that peace has been declared in South Africa it may be interesting to note a few facts concerning the war. Here are a few figures, etc.:
Boer October, 1899.
Total available fighting force of Boers (estimated), 50,000.
Total number of British troops engaged from first to last, 500,000.
Largest number of British troops in field at one time, 280,000.
British losses (official statistics to April 1, 1902):
Total deaths—Officers, 1,020; men 20,031. Missing and prisoners—Officers 384; men, 9,181.
Boer losses—Prisoners, 37,000; killed and wounded, no statistics available.
Cost of war to Great Britain to date, about \$1,250,000,000.
Cost of war to Boers—No statistics available.
Commander-in-chief of British forces in South Africa—Buller, Roberts, and Kitchener.
Principal Boer commanders—Joubert, Botha, DeWet and Delarey.

PORTLAND, May 3, 1:10 p. m.—Harry Lane, the Democratic nominee for state senator, is leading Henry McGinn, the Republican nominee.

HEPPNER, June 3.—Partial returns from Morrow county places it in the Chamberlain column.

Umatilla County.

PENDLETON, June 3, 2 p. m.—Umatilla county elects Walter M. Pierce, Democrat, to the legislature. One Republican representative is elected.

Washington County.

HILLSBORO, June 3.—Washington county elects the Republican legislative ticket, also recorder, assessor and coroner. Furnish for governor has 270 majority.

Yamhill Changes Front

McMINNVILLE, June 3.—Yamhill county gives Chamberlain 100 majority, Gallo-way, Democrat, is elected to the legislature.

Multnomah County.

PORTLAND, June 3, 12:50 pm.—With not half the votes counted in Multnomah Chamberlain has 400 majority.

Clatsop County.

ASTORIA, June 3.—Furnish has carried Clatsop by 72 majority. Fulton for state senator has 200 majority.

Portland Vote.

PORTLAND, June 3, 2 p. m.—R. D. Inman, Democratic candidate for mayor, is now ahead of Geo. H. Williams, Republican, by 150 votes, 3 Chamberlain leads Furnish 87.

PORTLAND, June 3, 3:25 p. m.—With half the vote counted Inman leads Williams for mayor by 176, a gain of 431 votes since 7 o'clock this morning.

ASHLAND, May 31.—Supervisor Garner a few days ago picked up a nugget worth over \$350 from his Greenview mine, just over the California line. Garner stumbled onto the nugget when least expecting a find. The specimen resembles a human hand both in size and shape.

CORVALLIS, June 2.—A. Cauthorn, a pioneer of 1862 died here this morning of heart failure. He was one of the oldest men in the county, being nearly 84 years old when he died.

SPokane, Wash., June 3.—A remarkable gold discovery in the Tyson mining camp, in Northern Idaho, is reported by H. W. Des Granges, who is in the city today. For weeks the owners of the Richmond claim have been tunneling through what was supposed to be a barren porphyry dyke, having crossed it for 185 feet. Now tests have been made of samples taken from 25 places in this supposed worthless dyke, and it is stated that it yields returns of \$18.09 in free-milling gold, with assays running as high as \$75. Mr. Des Granges declares it is "the largest thing in Idaho."

LANE CROPS.—The weekly report of the weather bureau at Portland has the following: Springfield, Lane county, J. C. Bratton: The week has been rainy and quite cool; unfavorable for fall wheat; spring wheat and oats are looking fair, but are needing more sunshine; hops are making a good growth; gardens are not doing very well.

OREGON POSTOFFICES.

Fourteen to Pay Increased Salaries on July 1—Four Will Have Their Salaries Cut

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The following changes in the salaries of presidential postmasters in Oregon, in effect July 1, have been announced at the department:

Increases—Astoria, \$230 to \$240; Dallas, \$140 to \$150; Grants Pass, \$170 to \$180; Lebanon, \$100 to \$110; Oregon City, \$180 to \$190; Silverton, \$100 to \$110; Tillamook, \$110 to \$120; Albany, \$210 to \$220; Ashland, \$170 to \$180; Cottage Grove, \$120 to \$130; Forest Grove, \$130 to \$140; Hillsboro, \$110 to \$120; McMinnville, \$160 to \$170; Prineville, \$110 to \$120.

Decreases—Arlington, \$1300 to \$1200; Huntington, \$1100 to \$1000; Independence, \$1200 to \$1100; Sumpter, \$1700 to \$1600.

Eugene remains stationary, no increase or decrease from the present salary of \$2300 a year.—ED GUARD.
