THE FINISH OF A BOODLE CANDIDATE.

Therank and file of the Republican party have the opportunity to keep wondering how a convention of several hundred representative Republican delegates could nominate such a man as Furnish. Not to mention the turning down of Governor Geer and Judge Lowell for the comparatively recent acquisition to the party, his fee record as sheriff of Umatilla county and as a deputy United States Marshal was enough to defeat him.

We cannot but believe that many who voted for him did so under protest from their better judgment, and are really glad that he has been defeated. In all the history of Oregon there was never such another example of a boodle candidate from primaries to the close of the polls.

OREGONIAN MENDACITY.

"Is Oregon back of the Administration and against the trusts, or isn't it?"

That was a parting Oregonian shot in its Election morning issue. Accustomed as one is to Oregonian misrepresentation in dealing with political questions this willful attempt to mislead and deceive surpasses previous efforts of that kind. The Oregonian well knows that the Republican legislation alone has made trusts possible, and that they have been organized and operated entirely under Republican control, both of congress and the chief executive. Farther than no practical or effective stand against trust organizations has yet been taken by the Republican congress, that alone has power to break the combinations in restraint of trade. Not taking the total absence of shame that permits the making of such a statement into account, it does seem strange that the editorial management of the Oregonian places such a low estimate on the intelligence of its readers as to dish them out such stuff.

ANIMALS SUFFER WITH HUMILITY.

Even Great Britain's animals must suffer from the Boer war. A Saturday's London dispatch says: A deputation representing the owners of half a million horses interviewed the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, today, and strongly protested against the tax on oats and maize. The Chancellor informed them that it was impossible to give up the general tax on grain, or especially exempt oats or maize, and there was no greater reason, he pointed out, for the exemption of horse feed than there was to exempt wheat or other grains used by humans.

The Oregon Short Line will resort to a novel plan to keep down the dust along the roadbed. Beginning Thursday of this week a train loaded with crude petroleum oil will pass over the road, sprinkling oil as it runs. This oil train will cover the entire distance through Southern Idaho, where the dust has been offensive to passengers.

Assuming Husband's Name.

The practice of the wife assuming the husband's name at marriage, according to Dr. Brewer, originated from a Roman custom and became the common custom after the Roman occupation. Thus Julia and Octavia, married to Pompey and Cicero, were called by the Romans Julia of Pompey, Octavia of Cicero, and in latter times married women in most European countries signed their names in the same manner, but omitted the "of." Against this view may be mentioned that during the sixteenth and even at the beginning of the seventeenth century the usage seems doubtful, since we find Catharine Parr so signing herself after she had been twice married, and we always hear of Lady Jane Grey (not Dudley), Arabella Stuart (not Seymour), etc.

Some persons think that the custom originated from the Scriptural teaching that husband and wife are one. This was the rule of law so far back as Bracton (died 1268), and it was decided in the case of Bon versus Smith, in the reign of Elizabeth, that a woman by marriage loses her former name and legally receives the name of her husband. Altogether the custom is involved in much obscurity.

Holy Coat of Treves.

The holy coat preserved at Treves, in Germany, is claimed to be the seamless garment worn by Christ and for which the Roman soldiers cast lots during the crucifixion. It is a tunic about five feet long, cut narrow at the shoulders and gradually widening toward the knees. Many miracles are said to have been performed by this robe.

Its history for the last 500 years is clear enough, but darkness shrouds the story of the relic prior to the twelfth century. The Catholic church relies for proof of its authenticity upon a tradition that it was one of a chestful of relics sent as a gift to the church at Treves by the Empress Helena. She is said to have found the coat at Jerusalem while in search of the true cross.

A legend says that in the ninth century the holy coat was concealed from the Normans in a crypt of the cathedral. There it remained forgotten until 1194, when it was rediscovered and placed in the high altar.

An Extraordinary Shower.

Daniel O'Connell, the Irish agitator, once complained in the house of commons of a report of a speech in a London newspaper which, he said, put into his mouth opinions he had never expressed. He vowed that if the editor did not apologize he would move that he be brought to the bar for a breach of privilege.

Next day the reporter of the speech waited upon O'Connell and gave a most remarkable explanation. He stated that during his walk from the house to his office in Fleet street the rain streamed into his pockets and obliterated the notes of his speech.

How to Light a Solid Body.

Cadogan Morgan was the first electrician to experiment with electric light on solid bodies. This was in 1785. He first inserted two wires into a stick of wood and caused the spark to pass between them. This had the effect of illuminating the stick a beautiful blood red. An ivory ball, an orange or an apple may be lighted in the same manner. Some experimenters prefer the lemon for this purpose, it being very susceptible to the electric discharge, flashing forth at every spark as a spheroid of brilliant golden light. The wires used for this purpose should be brought within about half an inch of each other inside the lemon.

"Prayer" as it Preys.

Very strange is the insect popularly known as the "praying mantis." Of this insect M. J. H. Faure, a distinguished French naturalist, made a thorough study. According to him, "its long, pale green wings, like ample sails, its head upraised to heaven, its arms folded and crossed on its breast, give it a false resemblance to a nun in ecstatic devotion."

A ferocious creature it is, ever bent on carnage, the workshops of various burrowing hymenoptera being its favorite haunts, since there it is almost certain to find prey.

"Posted on some bush near the burrows," says Mr. Faure in his account of the insect. "It waits patiently until it sees some other insect, probably a spider, returning home. By a sudden rush of its half open wings it terrifies the approaching insect, which hesitates for a moment, and then as suddenly as a spring the toothed forearm folds back on an arm also toothed, and the insect is grasped between the blades of the double saw in the same manner as the jaws of a wolf trap close on its unfortunate victim at the instant when it is seizing the bait. Then, without unclosing the deadly machine, the mantis slowly eats its victim."

In Provence this cruel insect is known as "prego Dlou," which means "pray to God."

The Deaf Mute's Story.

Virus and Venom.

The difference between venom and a virus is very marked. Both are poisons and both of organic origin, but a venom is produced in secreting organs, commonly called poison glands, and is introduced into the system by means especially adapted for the purpose, such as stings or fangs. On the other hand, a virus is the result of disease or putrefaction and generally possesses the property of exciting in the system into which it is introduced the disease which produced the virus. A virus commonly produces little if any local disturbance. A virus generally causes great pain, often severe inflammation and swelling. Venom has a marked local effect. Virus causes a general disturbance of the system.

An Odd Habit Among Rooks.

Among the odd habits of rooks is the way that members of the same rookery have of intermarrying generation after generation. The males always choose their wives from among their near neighbors, and if one should be so bold as to bring home to his rookery a bride from a distance the other rooks will invariably refuse to receive her and will force the pair to build some way off. In the neighborhood of big rookeries outlying nests of this kind may always be found.

Fresh Paint Stains.

A fresh paint stain on woolen goods will disappear if rubbed against other woolen goods. For instance, if the stain is on the sleeve of a coat take that garment off and rub the paint against the other sleeve. It will disappear and leave no sign. This is easier than applying turpentine and exactly as efficacious, but it must be done while the paint is still wet.
