NO PORTLAND FLOOD THIS YEAR.

Portland is not liable to have a summer flood this season through Columbia river backwater caused by melting snows on its headwaters many hundred miles in the interior. The Wednesday Telegram says: A year ago yesterday the river reached its highest mark for 1901. The gauge in Portland registered 20.8 feet, the exact stage reported today. Mr Beala says there is now little danger of a flood. At Portland and The Dalles the river will slowly fall for several days, unless an extreme hot spell sets in.

Oregonian June 4: J. M. Shelley, of Lane county, was a caller at Republican headquarters in the afternoon, Tuesday. He is quite proud of the record Lane county Republicans made on election day. Two years ago the county gave McKinley 353 majority, and in this election Furnish received about 250 majority, which was more than might have been expected, after the hard fight that was made.

Two years ago Lane county gave McKinley 484 plurality while this year according to the best returns available the Furnish plurality will not be far from 250, the number stated.
