PRISON ESCAPE.

Oregon State Penitentiary Prisoners Got Arms Someway

Two Guards Killed---Turnkey Dying

Two Convicts Got Away.

SALEM, June 9, 9:35 a. m.—Salem's people were thrown into the wildest excitement early this morning by urgent appeals over the telephone line connecting the local telephone exchange with the state penitentiary for assistance to prevent a general delivery of the convicts confined therein.

The convicts succeeded in getting hold of several rifles and these they used with deadly effect on the guards who endeavored to drive them back into their cells. Guards Farrell and Tiffany were killed and Turnkey Jones was dangerously shot. He is dying.

The militia promptly responded to the hurried calls for assistance and prevented a general outbreak.

It is supposed that ex-convicts came to Salem on the excursion yesterday and during the time the crowds were passing through and inspecting the penitentiary, found means to secrete the weapons so the convicts could secure them at once when free of their cells.

Two of the convicts made their escape from the penitentiary and the rest were driven back.

Later.

SALEM, June 9, 4:42 p. m.—All three men killed have families. An inquest is being held.

Tiffany leaped over the fence after the convicts, was seized and shot through the heart. Convict Ingram interfered and was shot through the leg.

None of the 159 convicts in the shops when the shooting took place tried to escape. The Salem National Guards are still guarding the prison.

The sheriff of Marion county has possession of armed men out scouring the country for the convicts. Chief of Police Gibson and posse who went south got a glimpse of the fugitives hatless and each armed with a rifle.

They tracked south into timber when the convicts made west for the Willamette river, keeping in heavy timber.

Chief Gibson thinks the men will steal a skiff and try escape down the river.

MCKENZIE STOCK FARM SOLD.

Together With a Lot of Blooded Stock to O. W. Johnson, From Iowa.

Today the sale of Dr. Charles E. Moore's farm three miles east of Springfield and known as the McKenzie stock farm, containing 257 acres, was sold to O. W. Johnson, just from Whiting, Iowa. The consideration was \$10,270. The deal was made through E. J. Fraser's agency.

Mr. Johnson also bought Dr. Moore's entire herd of registered Hereford cattle, which is considered by stockmen to be the highest bred and altogether the finest herd of Hereford cattle in the Willamette valley. Less than a year ago Dr. Moore paid as high as \$600 for single individuals of his herd. Mr. Johnson also bought all of his graded Shorthorns and thoroughbred hogs and horses, except "Lord Phron."

Mr. Johnson leaves in a few days for Iowa where he will close up his affairs and return to his new home at the earliest possible date. In his purchase from Dr. Moore, Mr. Johnson secured the famous young stallion, "Im-prover," one of the most promising young horses in Oregon.

Dr. Moore goes to New York where he will take a post graduate course in one of the medical colleges of the Empire state.

COBURG LOG DRIVE.

Arrived Down Yesterday—1000 Stranded in the Stream.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Co's drive of logs for the Coburg mill arrived at the boom yesterday, having been brought down from the Mohawk.

Much difficulty was experienced in getting the logs down the Mohawk on account of the low stage of the water, and about a thousand of the largest logs were left stranded in that stream, where they will remain until next winter.

Following immediately upon this drive the company will start a drive of 7,000,000 feet in the McKenzie above Leabury. The water in the McKenzie is now at an excellent logging stage.

CONVICTS AT LARGE

Officers, Poses Scouring the Country for Merrill and Tracy

Stole Clothes and Horse

Bloodhounds Secured for Chase.

SALEM, June 10, 4:20 p. m.—The country about Salem is being scoured by officers and posers in search of the convicts, Merrill and Tracy who killed three guards and one convict at the state penitentiary yesterday morning while making their escape.

The convicts now have a great advantage over their pursuers as it is certain that they stole clothing below here. They left evidence of their securing citizens' clothing in the convict garbs which were left behind.

A horse is also missing from where the men's clothing was taken.

Portland officers expect they will attempt to reach Portland to secure hiding and protection from friends whom they are supposed to have there.

Bloodhounds have been secured and the officers are attempting to track the murderers.

REWARD OFFERED.

For the Capture of the Two Escaped Convicts.

\$1,500 THE AMOUNT.

Superintendent J. D. Lee, of the state penitentiary has sent circulars throughout the state with the information that \$1,500 reward is offered for the capture dead or alive of Harry Tracy and David Merrill, the convicts who escaped from the penitentiary and killed three guards and one convict yesterday morning. A reward of \$500 is also offered for the capture of the man who furnished the guns for the prisoners.

Following is a description of each of the escapees:

Harry Tracy—Aged 27 years, height 5 feet 8 1/2 inches, weight 160 pounds, complexion medium, hair light brown, eyes blue, medium build; pit scar above the outside corner of the left eye; pit scar back of left ear edge of hair; pit scar in front of right ear; pit scar right side bridge of nose; vaccine mark outside left upper arm; cut scar inside second joint left thumb; two cut scars second knuckle left index; cut scar second knuckle left fore finger; small cut scar above right knee—two pit scars on right knee cap; small pit scar below right knee; burn scar four inches long on left hip; small cut scar front left upper leg; small pit scar outside and below left knee; dim brown stain bottom right shoulder blade; brown stain on back near spine; varicose veins below left knee.

David Merrill—Aged 31 years, height 5 feet 9 1/2 inches, weight 147 pounds, complexion medium, hair brown eyes blue grey; medium built slightly stooped shoulders; dim pit scar below right temple; dim cut scar above outside corner right eye; dim pit scar right side back base of neck; small brown mole left side back base of neck; cut scar on first knuckle right thumb; two cut scars on second knuckle right index; cut scar third knuckle right index; cut scar between third knuckles right third and fourth finger; two vaccine marks outside left upper arm; two cut scars on first knuckle left second finger; cut scar third knuckle left second finger; pit scar on right knee cap; small pit scar on left side; burn scar on top left instep; varicose veins below both knees; small pit scar below left hip and one above left hip.

On Sunday, June 22, the Eugene Woodmen will unveil the monument of W. P. Fisher in Oak Hill cemetery and I. K. Peters in Odd Fellows' cemetery, at Oak Hill in the forenoon and at the Odd Fellows in the afternoon.

CITY COUNCIL.

New Sewers and Street Improvements Ordered.

NEW ARC LIGHTS.

The monthly meeting of the common council of Eugene was held last night with a full board present. After the preliminary business was disposed of the following was the order of the meeting:

STREETS AND SEWERS.

Green of the street committee reported 1050 feet of lumber used in construction of crosswalks and 75 loads of gravel hauled from the excavation of the M. Schneider block and placed on Lincoln street.

It was found on investigation that East Twelfth street, between Oak and Pearl, was dedicated to the city in 1884. The street committee recommended construction of a sewer in the alley between Oak and Pearl and between East Fifth and East Sixth streets to East Fifth street, and between High and Pearl on East Eleventh.

The report of the street committee was adopted and the city attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance covering the new ordinance.

The sewers of the city were reported being cleaned out.

A petition asking for a sidewalk on West Tenth street along north side from Charleston to Lawrence street was read and the sidewalk was ordered built.

ORDINANCES.

A petition for extending the bicycle ordinance to prohibit bicyclists from riding the sidewalks of West Seventh street between Willamette and Olive streets was read. Petition denied.

An ordinance permitting bicyclists to ride the sidewalks between Tenth and Eleventh on Willamette was passed.

An ordinance to establish the grade on High between East Fifteenth and East Sixteenth streets was read and adopted.

An ordinance to improve High street from East Fifteenth to East Sixteenth street was passed and the recorder was authorized to advertise for bids.

LIGHTS AND HYDRANTS.

Barker reported that the new arc lights for the Geary school and other parts of the city had been located and would be put up as quickly as possible. The committee recommended putting in a hydrant in the manufacturing district and one hydrant at Hilyard and East Fourteenth streets. Report adopted.

HEALTH.

Paine of the health committee reported that the case of diphtheria in a mild form, had fully recovered. He recommended that the city jail be put in a more sanitary condition, that two iron beds and mattresses be secured and that the interior be whitewashed. Report adopted.

BECOME SISTERS OF MERCY.—Sunday's Oregonian: A few mornings ago the following three candidates received the habit and white veil of the Order of Mercy in the chapel of the Mother House of the Sisters of Mercy, East Twentieth and East Irving streets: Miss Vera Gosselin, of Moscow, now Sister Mary Clare; Miss Margaret Woods, of Eugene, now Sister Mary De Sales; Miss Lena Schaefer, of Eugene, now Sister Mary Genevieve. The impressive services were conducted by Archbishop Christie, assisted by Rev. Canon De Guerin, of Quebec, at present chaplain of St. Joseph, and Rev. Father Faber, of the institution. After the address by Bishop Christie, the novices received from his hands the stouner, emblem of obedience, white veil, emblem of purity, and the church cloak, which is the sign of immortality.
