PENNOYER'S WILL.

Makes Handsome Bequests to Portland Hospitals.

PORTLAND, June 7.—The will of Ex-Governor Pennoyer, filed today, makes important bequests to charity, giving his farm of 20 acres on Columbia slough to the Good Samaritan hospital, and a 7-acre tract to St. Vincent's hospital.

The estate is valued at \$130,000, including the sawmill, residence and business property, and will be divided, the wife receiving the principal share; 400 acres in Clark county, Washington, are given to the daughter. Mrs. Pennoyer is made sole executrix.

ANOTHER VOLCANO RAMPANT.

Mount Taconia, Guatemala Central America, Erupted—1000 Lives Lost.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The steamer Palsun from southern ports reports that Retalibuen, Central America, was destroyed by an eruption of Mount Taconia a week ago and 1000 people lost their lives.

The volcano had been restless ever since the great earthquake of April 18 which destroyed the City of Quetzaltenango. Since that time shocks had occurred almost daily. Many of the inhabitants fled the city to places of safety before the outbreak came.

THE NEW 'PHONE LINE

Mr. Holden Soliciting Subscriptions From Eugene Merchants.

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS WANTED.

C. H. Holden, of Florence, one of the principal shareholders in the Eugene and Florence Telephone Co. which proposes to erect a telephone line from Eugene to Florence, is in the city to ascertain what support from a financial point of view the people of Eugene will give the project.

In conversation with a GUARD reporter today, Mr. Holden stated that the company wants Eugene to subscribe \$1000 toward the erection of the line, the total cost to be about \$4000, of which the people of Florence and along the proposed route have put up \$1000 and the shareholders in the company the remaining \$2000.

Mr. Holden, in company with Deputy Sheriff Fred Fisk, was out among the business men a short time this afternoon and met with considerable encouragement, and it is thought the \$1000 can be easily raised.

If the money is raised the company agrees to complete the line and have it in operation by Nov. 1, 1902, at which time the amounts subscribed will become due. It is stipulated in the subscription paper that the company will issue to subscribers coupons to the amount subscribed and the holders of these coupons are entitled to service over the line to the value of the said amounts. This seems to be a good proposition for the business men.

Mr. Holden says that stations will be established at every postoffice along the line which are as follows: Elmira, Hale, Walton, Glentena, Meadow, Lake Creek, Mapleton, Acme and Florence.
