SALEM ESCAPES.

Got Away From Pursuers—Now Located at Monitor.

Child Murderer Located. Usual Whitechapel Robbery.

Special to the Guard. PORTLAND, Or, June 12.—Clarence Attebury was held up by a colored man and woman in the "North End" last night and robbed of \$62. Both were arrested.

Street Car Strike. PAWTUCKET, Ri, June 12.—Public tension on account of the streetcar strike has reached such a point that it has been deemed advisable to place the city under martial law to forestall possible riot and lawlessness.

Astoria Drowning. ASTORIA, June 12.—Charles Breakers of Portland accidentally walked off the wharf at the Ladue landing early this morning and was drowned.

The Convict Chase. Gervais, June 12, 3 p m.—Convicts Tracey and Merrill, the escaped murderers from the penitentiary, got out of the timber near Gervais where they had been hiding between one and two o'clock this afternoon and fled eastward.

The convicts appeared to become desperate and fired their pistols near a small canyon, through which it was thought they would try to escape. Part of the Woodburn militia rushed to that point when Tracey and Merrill escaped through the unguarded line. The remaining militiamen fired a number of shots at the convicts but it is thought without effect. The fleeing men took time as they passed through the line to fire several shots, but no one was hit.

They are now located in the timber near Monitor. [Monitor is a country post-office seven miles west of Gervais, on Butte Creek.—E P GUARD.] Later. WOODBURN, June 12; 4 p m.—Word has just been received from Sheriff Durbin, in pursuit of Tracey and Merrill, that no capture had been effected up to three o'clock.

Child Murderer Surrounded. SOUTH BEND, Wash., June 12.—Three state of Washington sheriffs with posse have the man Underwood, who is charged with murdering his three-months-old babe near Tacoma, surrounded.

He is hiding in the woods south of Tokeland, a Shoalwater Bay point. It is not thought that he can escape as his known food provisions are almost exhausted and there is no chance for him to procure further supplies.

A SMALLPOX SCARE.

John Kissinger, Postmaster at Fall Creek, May Have the Disease.

Special to the Guard. DAILY GUARD, June 12. R C Edwards, of Fall Creek, came down today and reports the Fall Creek neighborhood very badly excited over the suspicion that John Kissinger, postmaster at Fall Creek, twelve miles from Eugene, has the smallpox.

The only opportunity Mr Kissinger had to catch the disease was shortly before the first of June when he went to Roseburg on land business. He was too ill to go to the polls and vote on election day, June 2nd. As Mr Kissinger keeps the postoffice not a few of the residents came in contact with him about the time the disease was "catching," hence are somewhat uneasy as to the outcome. Dr Atwood went up this morning to attend Mr Kissinger.

LATER. Dr Atwood returned shortly after noon and diagnoses the case as "Manila itch." There is a difference of opinion, however, among the medical profession as to the nature of the disease, not a few reputable physicians asserting that the so-called "Manila itch" is a very light form of smallpox. In any event Mr Kissinger's neighbors will not trouble him with their presence until he is safely over the sickness.

A RUNAWAY. Two Ladies Hurt in a Smashup This Afternoon. Mr and Mrs Geo G Gross, Mr and Mrs "Fog" Wilson and daughter started out in a carriage shortly after one o'clock this afternoon to go to the country west of here. As they reached the end of West Sixth street at the intersection of Blair, and in running over a high crosswalk three tugs came loose, letting the tongue of the vehicle drop to the ground. This frightened the horses and they started to run. The carriage was turned bottom-side upward and the horses broke loose and ran back into town, being caught near Joel Ware's residence at East Fifth and Oak streets.

Mrs Gross and Mrs Wilson received quite severe but not serious injuries. One of Mrs Gross' ankles and one of Mrs Wilson's lower limbs was quite badly sprained. The other occupants received bruises and scratches.

ALMA EHERTON. Died From Pleuro-Pneumonia Last Evening. Alma E Ehernton, the popular mixologist at Wellington Waddell's Oregon saloon, died at his home at 515 Ferry street last evening, after an illness of only two weeks from pleuro-pneumonia.

The news of his untimely death came as a great shock to his friends, many of whom did not even know that he was ill. The deceased young man was aged 26 years, and leaves a wife and infant child. Mrs Ehernton, who is prostrate over her great bereavement has the sincere sympathy of all.

From his jovial and kind-hearted disposition the deceased won many warm friends during his year's residence in Eugene. The remains were taken to Muddy, Linn county, this afternoon for burial.
