WILL PARDON INGRAM.

Gov. Geer Says He Will Act in the Matter Soon.

SALEM, June 14.—In answer to an inquiry as to whether he contemplated pardoning Frank S. Ingram, the life term convict who was shot by Convict Merrill while trying to protect prison guards from being shot during the outbreak Monday, Governor T. T. Geer said:

"I am disposed to pardon Ingram, whose splendid action I believe deserves recognition, and unless valid objections should be raised and presented against such clemency, I think I shall take the matter up favorably in a week or so. There is no immediate hurry, as Ingram is not in condition to be moved yet, and besides I want to give time for all persons to be heard in the matter."

Ingram was sentenced to life imprisonment from Lyon county for killing his own brother ten years ago. His wound was in the right leg, which was so badly shattered that amputation was necessary. It is said that he killed his brother in self-defense.

SALEM, June 14.—M. O. Warner and Earl H. Church, of the Bohemia Smelting and Refining Co., recently incorporated to build a smelter in the Bohemia mining district, returned last night from the mines where they chose a site for the plant. It will be located about 200 yards above the old bridge at Wildwood. Furnaces and machinery for the smelter are now being built in San Francisco and it will not be long until the work of erecting the buildings will commence.

DR McDANIEL'S DEATH.

Horribly Mangled Under Street-car Wheels—Instantly Killed.

Friday evening's Portland Telegram has an account of the sad killing of Dr W J McDaniel, a brother-in-law of Mrs Helen Johnson of Eugene, also a graduate of the State University, mention of which was made in the GUARD yesterday. The Telegram says:

"While on his way to the house of a sick patient whom he had been hurriedly called to attend, Dr Williams J McDaniel was run down and instantly killed by a City & Suburban electric car, on Williams avenue, at 6:35 this morning.

"Being slightly deaf the physician did not hear the approaching car, which was going in the same direction. Unconscious of danger he crossed the track just as the car came up and in a moment was thrown off his wheel and under the car, the front truck passing over his body and mauling it in a frightful manner and causing almost instant death.

"Dr W J McDaniel was a native of Polk County, Oregon. He was born February 9, 1853, and in 1880 he was graduated from the State University, and in 1883 from the Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia. For five years succeeding his graduation he practiced medicine in Yamhill County. He then came to Portland and practiced here for 14 years. His character was of the best type. He became a member of the Baptist church when 9 years of age. He was married in 1880 to Miss Julia Adams, who survives him. Three children were born to him, but only one is now living."

FOUND DEAD.

G W Adkins Died Alone in Bed at Junction.

HEART TROUBLE THE CAUSE.

SPECIAL TO THE GUARD. JUNCTION CITY, June 14.—G W Adkins was found dead in bed at his home in this place yesterday afternoon. He was a widower and has been living alone in a house on Main street. Yesterday morning his neighbors noticed that he was not around the house or working in the garden as usual and about two o'clock they went to his house and found the doors locked. They pried a door open and on going into his bedroom found him dead in bed. He had apparently gone to bed in his usual health and died during the night. His death was no doubt caused by heart failure as there were no indications to the contrary. He was lying on his back with his hands folded across his chest.

Mr Adkins was a good old man. He had spent the greater part of his life as a trapper. He was 72 years, 8 months and 9 days old. He leaves a daughter, Miss Ida, who lives with J T Kirk of this place. Interment will take place at Luper's cemetery, Sunday at 10 o'clock.

S. S. STEPHENS DEAD.
