SATURDAY NIGHT'S FIRE.

Residence of J. C. Small Badly Damaged

Two fires for one day was Saturday's record. Following the burning of Mrs. Snyder's barn at noon Saturday, an alarm was turned in from the west end of town at 7:30 o'clock in the evening. The firemen found the blaze to be in the residence of J. C. Small at West Sixth and Washington streets.

The fire had caught in the roof of the kitchen, and huge volumes of smoke were pouring from nearly every part of the house when the fire companies reached there.

Everything upstairs was burned, but most of the furniture below was saved. The fire was soon extinguished but not before a loss of several hundred dollars was entailed. The house and contents were insured in the Continental company, M. L. Campbell & Co. local agents.

MONUMENTS UNVEILED.

Ceremonies Held by Eugene Woodmen Yesterday.

AT OAK HILL AND 100 OF CEMETERIES.

The monuments erected over the graves of the late W. P. Fisher in Oak Hill cemetery and T. K. Peters and Mrs. Elizabeth Ware in the 100 of cemetery were unveiled by Eugene Camp, Woodmen of the World, and Eugene Circle, Women of Woodcraft, yesterday with appropriate and impressive ceremonies.

A large number of the Woodmen drove out to Oak Hill cemetery west of the city where the monument to Mr. Fisher was unveiled at 10 a. m. Dr. W. L. Cheshire delivered a short address and the ritualistic services of the order were beautifully carried out. A large crowd was in attendance.

Returning to the city for luncheon, the Woodmen, accompanied by a large number of the members of the Circle, proceeded to the 100 of cemetery where Mr. Peters' and Mrs. Ware's monuments were unveiled at 2 o'clock.

At the Peters monument Rev. B. F. Rowland delivered the address which was followed by the services according to the ritual.

The Circle held their ceremonies immediately following those of the Woodmen.

In the evening at the M. E. church the annual sermon was delivered by Rev. B. F. Rowland to a large audience, the members of the Camp and Circle attending in a body. Special music had been prepared for the occasion. The sermon was splendid and made a deep impression upon the audience.

L. T. HARRIS.

Candidate for Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Lawrence T. Harris, who was recently elected for the second time as a Representative from Lane county, has announced himself as a candidate for Speaker of the House of Representatives. Mr. Harris was born in Linn



county in 1873. He received his early education in the schools of this city. Later he entered the University of Oregon, graduating with the class of 1893. Ambitious to obtain a first-class legal education, Mr. Harris went to the University of Michigan Law School, finishing the course and being admitted to the bar in 1896. Returning to Eugene, he opened a law office, and was soon appointed Deputy Prosecuting Attorney for the Second Judicial District, a position he still holds.

Two years ago Mr. Harris was elected Representative from Lane county, and discharged the duties of the office in a creditable manner, being recognized as one of the leaders of the lower house. In the recent election he received a plurality of 1001 votes over C. K. Hale.

THE WOOLEN MILL. OUR BAND SECURED.

Committee of Citizens Made a Formal Inspection Today. For the State Fair at Salem in September.

SEEMED SATISFIED.

A committee, consisting of F. E. Dunn, R. McMurphy, F. M. Wilkins, J. M. Shelley, J. H. McClung and S. B. Eakle, appointed by the citizens who subscribed the \$8000 bonus for the erection of the woolen mill in this city, made informal inspection of the plant this afternoon.

H. D. Wagon, the principal promoter of the enterprise, showed the committee through the mill and explained its workings to them. Although only a part of the machinery is in operation, the committee seemed satisfied that Mr. Wagon has carried out his part of the contract, and more than that, for he has put in a much larger mill than at first agreed.

The committee met at 3:45 o'clock and spent an hour or so in visiting the various departments of the mill.

THE HOTEL EUGENE.

W. M. Renshaw Will Conduct a Strictly First Class House.

W. M. Renshaw has leased the Hotel Eugene from Stephen Sneed for a period of years from Aug. 15th, T. N. Segar, who has had the management of the house for a year, at that time retiring.

Mr. Renshaw informs the GUARD that when he takes charge of the hotel it will be conducted along strictly first class lines, with rates not less than \$2 per day. He will purchase \$5000 or \$6000 worth of new furniture and fit every room, 50 in all, in splendid style.

The big new addition to the hotel will greatly add to the capacity and convenience of the place, and when the improvements are completed it promises to be one of the best hotels in the state.
