BRITISH COMMERCIAL SPIRIT.

Have we been wasting sympathy on the non-progressive Boer? Treasury statistics for April, just given to the public, show that our exports to Africa for that month were greater than those to all South America, and more than double those of the preceding year. Of course the chief increase was to British South Africa, which took eighty-five per cent of our exports to that continent. While Great Britain pays the bills for the Boer war the United States gets much of the benefit from the opening up of that rich country to commerce.

Say what you please about the Englishman he makes business wherever he goes. And he does not surround himself with tariff and trade restrictions, but allows the world free field. It is the only policy that will win in the end. China tariff walls built about a country stifle and repress the commercial spirit. While they keep trade out they confine it to their own territory, excepting of course the export of raw materials; and that is a loss, as they should be turned into finished products at home. Trade, world wide commercial activity, is the only language of national greatness. And no nation ever became truly great without it. There has been no exception from Phenicia till the present day.

OUTRAGEOUS GAMBLING.

HOW THE FIRST ROTHSCHILD DIED.

When Mayer Rothschild, the founder of the great Rothschild banking business, died in 1812, he called his sons around his bedside and said: "Keep the law of Moses, remain united to the end; consult your mother before beginning any great business—keep in mind these three things, and the world will soon belong to you." HEART BEAT AFTER PRACTICAL DEATH.

A Chicago dispatch of Tuesday relates a peculiar physiological occurrence. It says: Practically dead for eight and one-half hours, the heart of Bridget Dempsey, a patient in the county hospital, has finally ceased beating. All action of the respiratory organs of the woman had ceased and the physicians in attendance pronounced her dead. The heart action, which apparently had died away, grew stronger a few moments afterward and an injection of n-tro-glycerine and other stimulant and artificial respiration were used, but ineffectually. Still the pulsations of the heart continued with regularity, while the woman remained to all other indications lifeless.

Dr J H Mustard, of the hospital staff, pronounced the case one of Landry's paralysis, one of the rarest diseases known to medical science. The disease is primarily paralysis of the respiratory organs, which does not act immediately upon the heart. The dead woman was 21 years of age and entered the institution to be treated for consumption.

HELEN STRATTON KILLED.

A Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Stratton.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer of Monday gave a lengthy account of the killing of Miss Helen Stratton and two companions through being run down by a passenger train, Sunday, as they were crossing the rail road track at Kent, a town of fifteen hundred people twenty miles north of Seattle on the line of the Northern Pacific railroad. The Seattle paper concludes: "Miss Helen Stratton was well known in Seattle, where she had spent the greater part of her life. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H F Stratton and a niece of Judge J A Stratton of this city. She was born at Eugene, Oregon, May 14, 1879. In the same year her parents moved to Eastern Washington, where they remained until 1889. Their residence was established in Seattle the year of the fire. Until last November the Strattons lived in this city. At that time they moved to Kent. "Miss Stratton, besides being an accomplished artist, was a musician of great natural talent. She had an exceptionally large circle of friends, particularly in Seattle, where she passed her school days and much of her girlhood. She began her education in the primary department of the Seattle schools, and passed through the grammar grades and into the high school. Horace F Stratton is well remembered by old-time Eugene people. He was engaged in business many years as a partner in the mercantile business at the corner now being built by J H Metcalf, with J B Underwood and C Gray for partners. Later he was a partner with F B Dunn. During the Palouse country excitement he moved to Cheney, Eastern Washington, and with Frank Harrington and other partners operated several stores in that section. Mrs Stratton is a sister of the late F B Dunn.

There appears to be a general belief that this year's crop of hops will sell for a higher price than has been realized in ten years.
