Locations of the Boxes for the Free Mail Delivery.

SIXTEEN OF THEM.

The first of next week Postmaster McCormack will set up the 16 large iron mail boxes for the free delivery system which is to be installed in Eugene July 1. The location of these boxes will be as follows:

Intersection of East Fourth and Pearl streets.
Intersection of West Fourth and Washington.
Intersection of Fifth and Willamette.
Intersection of West Sixth and Charnelton.
Intersection of West Sixth and Washington.
Intersection of West Sixth and Monroe.
Intersection of East Eighth and Oak.
Intersection of Ninth and Willamette.
Intersection of East Ninth and High.
Intersection of West Tenth and Charnelton.
Intersection of East Eleventh and Patterson.
Intersection of East Eleventh and A.
Intersection of Thirteenth and Willamette.
Intersection of East Thirteenth and High.
Intersection of East Fourteenth and Ferry.
Intersection of Clark and Washington.

These 16 boxes will be all that will be put up at present. As the demand requires additional boxes will be supplied by the government.

SUPT. BECHDOLT RETAINED.

And His Salary Raised \$100 Per Year.

The school board met this afternoon in the city hall for the purpose of selecting instructors for the Eugene public schools for next year.

Dr. A. F. Bechdolt, who has filled the position of city superintendent of schools very acceptably during the year just closed, was retained, and his salary advanced from \$1200 to \$1300 per year.

The corps of teachers was not selected in time to give their names in this evening's paper. There were over 100 applications for positions in the schools.

New Northwest History.

RAILROAD MAN INSANE

General Freight Agent of the Missouri Pacific in Jail Here

WILL BE CARED FOR

E. J. Flynn, general freight agent of the Missouri Pacific railway, arrived here this morning at 3 o'clock on the northbound train in an insane condition and was turned over by the trainmen to the night police who awakened Sheriff Withers, and that official took charge of him and placed him in the county jail.

Flynn boarded the train at Cottage Grove. It is said that he acted very strangely there, giving away his gold watch and all the money he had, and wanted to give away his fine diamond ring, but was restrained from doing so.

As an evidence of his insanity, Flynn wrote the following telegram at the depot last night and wanted it sent: ALBANY, June 20, 1902.

To OREGONIAN, City: Have been delegated through the great spirit of our Lord to advise our beloved President Roosevelt on matters now in controversy between both senate and house of representatives. Please arrange to meet me on arrival.

WILL BE TAKEN CARE OF.

The case was brought before County Judge H. R. Kincaid this morning. Papers on the unfortunate man's person identified him as the general freight agent of the entire Missouri Pacific Railway system. The man had annual passes on nearly every principal railroad in the United States. Considering him to be a man of some importance in railroad circles, Judge Kincaid sent a telegram to George J. Gould, president of the Missouri Pacific system at New York, telling him of the unfortunate man's condition. As yet he has received no reply from Mr. Gould, but in answer to a similar telegram sent to W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, at Portland, the following was received:

PORTLAND, Or, June 20, 1902. H. R. KINCAID, County Judge, Eugene, Ore:

Your wire concerning Mr. Flynn. Representatives from Rio Grande road and from this office will go to Eugene tonight to care for him. See that he receives proper medical attendance if required.

The demented man is 28 or 30 years of age, is very well dressed and has a fine appearance. The cause of his insanity is not known.

A BARN BURNED.

Mrs. M. M. Snyder on Oak is the Loser.

Shortly after noon today the big fire bell at the city hall sounded the alarm of fire. The fire companies were directed to the residence of Mrs. M. M. Snyder, a widow, at 637 Oak street, where her barn was enveloped in flames when they reached there.

A stream from the chemical engine and one from a hydrant were soon playing on the blaze, and in a short time it was extinguished.

Mrs. Snyder and family were eating lunch when the barn caught fire. A neighbor saw the flames issuing from the roof and informed Mrs. Snyder of the fact. The family succeeded in getting everything of value out of the barn except about two tons of hay which was burned.

The barn which was worth about \$200 or \$250 is almost a total loss, with no insurance.

It is not known how the fire originated. A man had been in the barn a few minutes before he put up his horse, and it is possible he might have been smoking and sparks from his pipe dropped into the hay, but it is not probable that he went into the loft with a lighted pipe.

Ashland Normal President.

Professor B. F. Mulkey, of the Monmouth normal school, was yesterday selected president of the Southern Oregon normal school at Ashland. Like the new president of the University of Oregon, Prof. Mulkey is an Oregon raised boy, his youth having been passed on a farm on Pleasant Hill, this county. He is a son of I. N. Mulkey who yet resides at Pleasant Hill. He is an educator of ability, genial, affable and has a large acquaintance with the public. He served Polk county in the Oregon state senate 1897-1901, and was a leader in that body. Public opinion was strongly in favor of Prof. Mulkey for the presidency of the Monmouth normal, and the appointment of Prof. Reesler of Eugene, came to many Monmouth people not only as a surprise, but as positive disappointment.

One thing is certain. Ashland gets a capable educator, a sterling citizen and a representative man in the selection of Prof. Mulkey.

PROF. GEO. WARFIELD'S NEW POSITION.—Prof. Geo. A. Warfield, who left Eugene last fall to accept a position in the Astoria public schools, has been elected professor of Latin and Greek in the Willamette university at Salem. Professor Warfield is a graduate of the Nebraska Wesleyan university and also of the Nebraska state University; he then took his A. M. degree for graduates study in the University of Oregon. He is 30 years of age and is an experienced teacher in Latin and Greek of which department he will assume the head at the Willamette university.

FRANK REISNER CLERK.—At the meeting of the board of directors of the Eugene school district the other day, Frank Reisner was unanimously elected clerk for the coming year, with bonds fixed at \$25,000. The clerk is now elected by the school board instead of by the people as heretofore.
