WHY?

The Kissenger tragedy up in the little Idaho town is another reminder of the curious fact that the disappointed lover who has seen enough of this world—at least thinks he has—is not content to get out alone. He must take the woman he professes to love with him.

In that the white man is about the same as the Indian, some of the tribes holding it to be good policy for a man to make provision for his residence on the other shore by having his favorite wife and horse killed on the occasion of his death in order that they may accompany him. Why should a man ruthlessly kill the object whom he professes to love so dearly? Kissenger nor those who have done such deeds may not answer. They save the hangman trouble through being willing travelers over the same route on which they send unwilling victims.

AN ENGLISH CORONATION INCIDENT OF 1272.

This coronation week of Edward VII of England has revived all sorts of stories concerning coronations of the past. One of the most extraordinary gifts made on the coronation day of Edward I in 1272 was that of 500 horses, which had been used by the royal princess and other personages in the procession to Westminster abbey. These horses, all richly caparisoned and harnessed just as they were, were let loose into the midst of the mob after the banquet in Westminster hall, that always succeeded a coronation in three days. The people in the streets were permitted to catch the animals, and to him who caught a horse it and its appointments belonged.

It speaks volumes for the difference in London's size and population between 1272 and 1902 that what would be a death trap now should have been a welcome present then, and that now his majesty's own steeds are being patiently trained to behave properly and without risk of danger to anyone, under stress of noise and the glare of military bands, on the great day in June.

A Nebraska paper, the Sutton Register, mentions a Swede farmer who has recently returned from the land of his birth. While absent his political faith received considerable of a jar. He found McCormick harvesters, of the class that sell for \$125 here at his Nebraska home, selling for \$62, less than half, over there. Wire nails, costing \$4 in Nebraska cost \$2.75 over there. He is now convinced there is a steel trust, which prevents competition at home and is protected by a prohibitive tariff.

The appropriation, of \$22,000 for public surveys in Oregon has been exhausted. That much more could be profitably expended, as there is great demand for public lands, both for homes and timber.

That was a great mini among our soldiers over in the Philippines who supplanted the "water" cure with the use of kerosene oil. The "cure" consists of pouring water or oil down the victim's throat while bound, gagged and helpless on his back. It is used to force information of hidden arms or of the movements or whereabouts of the Filipino guerrillas. This is some improvement over the Indian, who scorches his victim with fire.

A Salt Lake dispatch of June 30th says that after wandering through the mountains for thirty hours with a loaded shotgun, intent on suiciding, Alex Robertson, paying teller of the Wells-Fargo bank there, returned home, and was found in the attic at his home Sunday. He confessed to eight years' defalcations, amounting to \$90,000. Two other bank employees are said to be implicated. He alleged that they lost in the past three years \$100,000 in gambling. More arrests are expected.

Governor Taft has concluded negotiations for the purchase from the vatican of the friars' land in the Philippines for \$5,000,000. Let's see: Original price, Spain, \$20,000,000; cost of benevolent assimilation to date, according to Secretary Root, \$170,000,000; price for friars' lands, \$5,000,000; total for four years' occupation, \$195,000,000, or at the rate of about \$50,000,000 per year. Secure investment, but rather unremunerative.

Today, July 1, the documentary stamp law becomes null and void. It was inaugurated at the beginning of the Spanish-American war, and has afforded an immense amount of revenue to the government. The act bore quite heavily upon the railroad and express companies. There was a two cent stamp affixed to all shipping receipts, bills of lading, etc.

Portland brass bands have a Fourth of July music trust. They ask \$7 for each member of the band and \$14 for the leader for two hours of parade service, and \$5 and \$12 respectively for the evening concert. While the committee must pay it they are arranging the music program so there will be no "loading." Big pay, big music.

The plan of placing in the street railway franchise a provision that the city may at any time buy the properties for actual cost, is becoming popular, just now in San Francisco, where representatives of railroads have signified a willingness to have such a provision placed in the blanket franchise for which they have applied.

A New York preacher gives England's ruler great credit for being a peacemaker. Yes, he was bound to have peace down in South Africa even if he had to kill every Boer in sight to obtain it. The rulers of the world are not beating their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks to any great extent at the present date.

SEVERELY SCALDED.

Drew Severy Badly Burned by Escaping Steam.

Last Wednesday evening Drew Severy, engineer on the steamer Roberts, on the Stikine, was severely scalded. He was blowing off the boiler and had crept under it and opened a pipe to let out the water, when a piece of the pipe was blown off, letting the steam out on Mr. Severy. His face, hands, chest and limbs were severely burned before he could get out of the close quarters. As he was alone on the boat at the time the result might have been even more serious. He went home and Dr. Evans was summoned and made him as comfortable as possible.

Mrs. A. S. Kauffman.

Mr. A. S. Kauffman died at her home at the corner of East Fifteenth and Oryn streets, University addition, this Monday morning at 2:30 o'clock from consumption of the bowels. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the family residence and interment will take place in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Dr. A. E. McAllister will conduct the services.

Mrs. Kauffman was born in Kanebec county, Maine, on June 15, 1855, being aged 37 years and 15 days at the time of death. She was married at Brainard, Kansas, in 1887 to A. S. Kauffman and in the year 1892 they came to Eugene where they have since resided. Mr. Kauffman following his trade, that of a carpenter. Besides her husband, the deceased leaves two sons, aged 14 and 8 respectively.

Move in Behalf of the Forger Who Was Sent up From Lane.

HALEM, July 1.—A petition was filed in the office of Governor Steer yesterday asking for the pardon of John H. Gates, who is serving a term in the penitentiary for forging the name of J. W. Corbett to a check at Eugene about a year ago.

Gates is the State House janitor who figured in a sensational transaction during the Legislative session of 1901, when he made a heavy trip to Albany with \$1500 obtained from an unknown source.
