

MIXING OIL AND WATER.

United States Senator Knute Nelson was made temporary chairman of the Minnesota Republican convention, yesterday, and as usual with those who attempt to reconcile trusts and Republican politics got mixed up. He said in part: The tendency of the age is combination and concentration, and where the chief object of this is to lessen the cost of production so as to cheapen the cost to the consumer, and not to obtain a monopoly, suppress competition or check the reduction of price to the consumer, the public will not be injured and has no fair ground for complaint.

Where is the individual so verdant as to believe that these vast concentrations of capital exist with the "chief object" of "cheapening the cost to the consumer?" Nor that the combinations are made without the express purpose of obtaining "monopoly" Knute should go home and try to mix oil and water. When he can do that without aid of some extraneous substance he may be able to convince the reasoning man that the trusts have the interests of the people at heart, and are not combined for the purpose of extorting undue profits from those who toil.

DRUG SUBSTITUTE FOR SLEEP.

A London paper says that the health of people in fashionable society is being dangerously threatened by a drug which is popularly supposed to take the place of sleep. Very discreetly it declines to name this dangerous substitute. When tea was first introduced into England it was commended with the same virtues, and it was believed that it would no longer be necessary to waste seven or eight hours in sleep.

But extended experience has shown the disastrous results of cutting short the period of natural rest and remaining awake by the help of tea, and there is no reason to suppose that chemists will ever be able to devise any substitute for sleep which will not in the long run bring nervous breakdown. It is certain to result as with the man who was confident he could gradually reduce the quantity of food he partook of till he could get along without eating. Just as he was getting able to dispense with food entirely he died. And so it will be with whoever foolishly tries to dispense with "nature's sweet restorer, balmy sleep."

George Hon, a convict from Adams county, Ohio, serving a ten-year sentence for the forgery of an order for 25 cents' worth of tobacco, is applying for a pardon. Hon was the first prisoner confined in a county jail. The contractors offered a prize of \$100 to any prisoner who would escape from the cells. It was but 24 hours before Hon was at liberty. The sheriff put two bloodhounds on his track. Hon stole the dogs and sold them to a farmer for \$5. At Manchester he stole the laprobe and cushion from the buggy of the sheriff.

Many hearts in this Northwest will beat less rapidly now that news of the safety of the steamers Portland and Jeannie is assured. Though ice-locked in the Arctic ocean a revenue cutter was standing by to render assistance in case of necessity. The steamers had not been injured, and the prospects were good for an early escape from the ice.

The vote of Thayer was 16,301; for Beckman 16,132. In 1866 the contest between Woods and Kelly was nearly as close as the recent one between Chamberlain and Furnish. The vote for Woods was 10,283; for Kelly 9,956. Plurality for Woods 327.
