FOR FREE RURAL DELIVERY.

Inspector Clement Will Be Here Next Week.

Postmaster H. F. McCornack has received a letter from E. C. Clement, inspector of rural free mail delivery routes, stating that he would be in Eugene on Wednesday, July 30, for the purpose of examining proposed route No. 66,948 with a view of establishing free delivery on the same and for the purpose of conducting an examination for the appointment of a carrier and the establishment of an eligible register for rural free delivery from this office.

CLEMENT AT SPRINGFIELD.

Yesterday and today Mr. Clement and Postmaster Clark of Springfield went over the two proposed routes out of that place. Mr. Clement seemed well pleased with the routes selected and the establishment of the free delivery service on these routes is only a matter of time.

Examinations for carriers on these routes are being held at Springfield this afternoon. Postmaster Clark received about 15 applications but only a part of them appeared.

ANOTHER PRETTY HOME.

The Fine Residence of W. W. Calkins Will Be Completed About September 15.

The corners at the junction of East Elventh and Patterson streets are pretty sites for city homes. Already on two of the positions fine houses have been erected, namely, those owned by Professor John Straub and Mr. F. E. Dunn. On the third corner is being built a residence about which little has been said, although it is to be one of the prettiest houses in Eugene. It is to be the home of an eastern man, Mr. W. W. Calkins, who has decided that Eugene is his ideal place for a home.

This structure of which we speak, is three stories high, containing two full stories, a basement and an attic. It is a twelve-room house, and the principal rooms, the hall-ways and staircases will be finished in natural oak. It will be plastered throughout and fitted with all modern conveniences in regard to ventilation, heat, water and light. Mr. W. O. Heckert of Corvallis is the contractor. The house will be finished about Sept. 15 and will cost over \$40,000.

MISSING SCHOOL TEACHERS.

Found Foully Murdered by the Ladrones—Leaders of Murderers Killed.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The war department today received a cablegram from Manila announcing that John Wells and Louis Thomas, of Providence, R. I.; Ernest Nager, of Cincinnati, and Clyde France, of Berea, Ohio, the school teachers who have been missing in Cebu, were murdered by Ladrones, and their bodies recovered. The leaders of the murderers were killed, and eight others were captured.

THE NEW ELECTRIC CLOCK.

Erected by W. U. Telegraph Co. on North Wall of Matlock Building.

An electric clock was put up this morning on the north wall of the Matlock building by the Western Union Telegraph Company. The dial is 24 inches in diameter and surrounded by a broad square frame, exhibiting a huge advertisement. The clock will be corrected every hour by the telegraph company according to time at U. S. observatory. The position of the clock will make it a great convenience to the public.

U. S. Observatory time is reckoned from the 120th meridian and all times on the coast west of that meridian is the same. Every day exactly at noon the clocks of the coast are corrected by an electric current sent from Lick Observatory on Mt. Hamilton, California, through the Western Union wires. But the exact time of Eugene is the Astronomical time which is 13 minutes and 22 seconds behind the Observatory time. Still another time is the sun time which is seldom used except for astronomical computation. It varies according to the time of year and may sometimes be as much as 28 minutes different from the Pacific Observatory. Pacific or railroad time is the most practical and the one in general use.

TO BOHEMIA BY AUTO.

E. H. Ingham Left Yesterday Morning in His Automobile.

GREAT CENTRAL R. R. DOCK.

Will Be Built at Once at Empire on Coos Bay.

What may be considered perhaps the most important step in the history of the Great Central Railroad Company was taken yesterday, says the Portland Journal. The location of the dock, which marks the western terminus of the line was definitely located at Empire, on Coos Bay. This was the place originally selected, but a little hitch in the progress of events gave color to the belief that it might go in somewhere else, especially so since the Bilt Line Company was incorporated to build a line around Coos Bay.

Mr. Green, the assistant engineer, received a message this morning conveying the information of the final location. Mr. Green informs the Journal that construction work on the new dock will be begun at once. The superintendent for the construction of the dock, F. M. McLean, went down yesterday with the pile driver and material. Mr. Green says that the camp for the workmen has been established, and things are bound to go on now with a bang.

Chief Engineer Kinney is expected home some day this week, though it is possible that he will not be able to get here until Monday or Tuesday of next week. The Great Central is bound to go forward very rapidly from now on.

THO'T 'T WAS TRACY.

People of Coburg and Harrisburg Frightened by Three Harmless Bicyclists.

THEY WERE IN EUGENE.

Daily Guard July 24.
This morning Deputy Sheriff Fred Fisk received a message from the sheriff's office at Albany informing him that three men on bicycles, all heavily armed and one resembling the description of the notorious outlaw Harry Tracy, had passed through there on their way south. Officers at Harrisburg and Coburg were also notified.

Several hours later word came from Harrisburg that the supposed outlaws had passed through that place, and shortly afterwards the constable at Coburg telephoned over that they had just passed through there and that it was strongly believed that one of the men was Tracy, but that he (the constable) was timid about stopping them with the small force of two or three deputies which he had banded together upon the receipt of the word from Albany. It is said that the residents of Coburg were badly frightened and stayed pretty well indoors while the men were passing through.

Deputy Sheriff Fisk, who has charge of the sheriff's office while Mr. Withers is away, didn't have a very strong belief that the men were Tracy and his pals, but took the precaution to notify the constable at Springfield to look out for them if they went that way, and kept a lookout for them himself here in Eugene.

Shortly before noon the three bicyclists arrived here wholly unconscious of the excitement they had created on their way up the valley. They went to the Banquet Cafe for luncheon where Deputy Fisk interviewed them, and was at once convinced that these men were not the bold bad outlaws that the Albany, Harrisburg and Coburg people thought them to be. One of the men Mr. Fisk is acquainted with, having been a former resident of Eugene. They stated that they were on their way from Vancouver to Ashland on a hunting trip.

SALEM FRIGHTENED.

Those three men passed through Salem last night and created great consternation there. They were seen at Woodburn in the evening and the sheriff was sent word that Tracy and a number of other outlaws were on the way to Salem to attack the penitentiary guards and cause the greatest delivery in the history of that institution. The guards were doubled and a posse started out to meet the men, but the expected attack was not made and everything at the pen remains serene.

When told today of the furor they had created in the several places they had passed through the men were naturally much amused and thought it splendid joke.

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TRACY ON WAY EAST.

After Seeing His Mother He is Ready to Give Up.

VISITING RELATIVES NEAR ROSLYN.

SEATTLE, July 24.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Roslyn, Wash., states that a man reported to be Harry Tracy spent Sunday and Monday at Camp Creek, 20 miles from Roslyn in Kittitas county. It is stated that Tracy went over the mountains on a freight train Saturday evening. The story of Tracy's arrival at Camp Creek was taken to Roslyn by a miner named Elmer. Tracy, Elmer states, was met by friends and went to Cle Elum lake, where they camped for the night. Thence they went to Camp Creek and there Tracy was given food and his wound dressed. Elmer says his wound is rather deep. Tracy, however, went fishing Monday and caught 18 trout.

The miners at the creek, according to Elmer, are in sympathy with the outlaw. Sheriff Brown of Kittitas and the marshal refuse to believe the story. The sheriff reached Roslyn, however, after Elmer had left for Camp Creek.

The report states that Tracy and his friends are heavily armed and the outlaw is still carrying a white sack filled with ammunition. Elmer declared that the murderer said his wife was at Palmer, but that he was on his way East to see his mother. After he had seen her he would be ready to give himself up.

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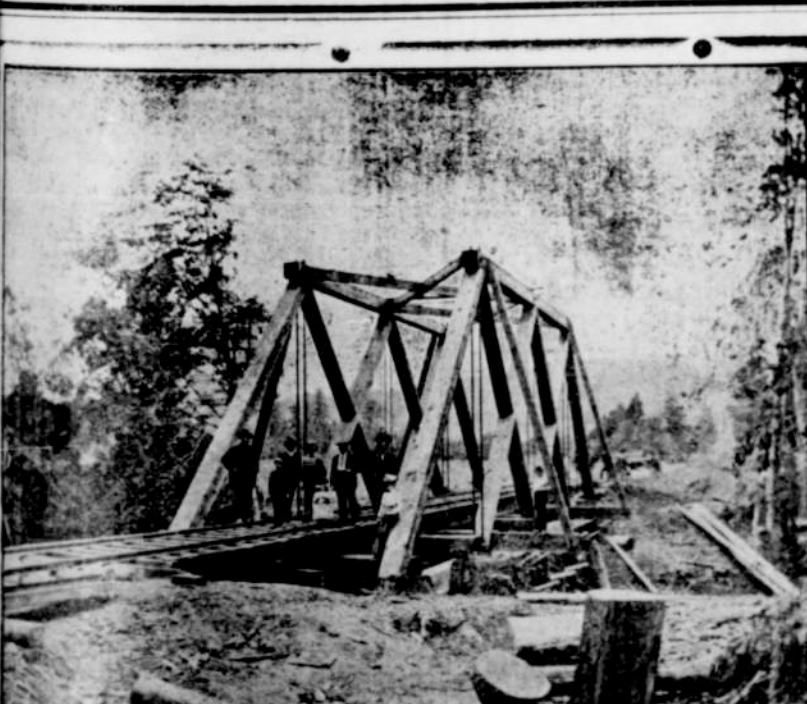
