COUNTY OFFICERS.

Secretary of State Dunbar has issued an official list of officers of all the counties in the state, giving the political party to which each officer belongs, and the list reveals some interesting local conditions. While there are but few counties of the state which can be classed as Democratic on state or national issues or, officers, yet the Democrats secure the lion's share of the important county offices in many localities. Of the 33 county judges, only 12 are Republicans, the other 21 being Democratic, Citizen or Union. Of the county clerks 17 are Republican, and 16 from the opposition, while of the sheriffs only 15 are Republicans, with 18 Democrats. When it comes to holding the sack, however, the public confidence seems to be with the Republicans, who have 23 of the county treasurers, against 10 Democrats; and in educational affairs there is a similar leaning, 22 county superintendents being Republican and 11 Democratic. In dealing with property the leaning is not quite so strong, but there are 19 Republican assessors to 14 Democrats. Of the county courts, six are composed entirely of Democrats or opposition to Republicans viz: Baker, Josephine, Klamath, Union, Wheeler and Yamhill, ten others have a majority of Democrats, viz: Benton, Clatsop, Crook, Lake, Lane, Polk, Wallowa, Wasco and Washington, while Sherman county has a Democratic judge, one Republican commissioner, and one Probationist. Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lincoln, Marion and Multnomah counties have courts composed entirely of Republicans, while the other eight have a majority of that faith. Twenty-four of the coroners are Republicans, and one, in Lincoln county, is a Socialist. Twenty-one of the surveyors are Republicans, with one, in Morrow county, a Probationist. Of the ten county recorders in Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Jackson, Linn, Marion, Umatilla, Union, Washington and Yamhill, all are Republicans except in Linn. Clackamas and Douglas are the only counties in the state with a full set of Republican officers as such, but Multnomah has all Republicans, as McDonnell, the assessor, is of that persuasion notwithstanding he was elected as a "Citizen." Marion has a Democratic sheriff, and Lincoln has a Socialist for coroner, the only breaks in their list. There is no county entirely Democratic or very nearly so.

CREATING MORE BIG RE SERVES.

The farce of setting apart six thousand miles of forest reserve in Oregon is announced without further comment from Washington. Geological surveys, irrigation schemes, wagon road land grants, lien land schemes and railroad land grant frauds all lurk behind the forest reserve swindle. It is today the great breeding ground of civil service officialism—where the over-production of college graduates is worked off on the people for life jobs. In Oregon one corporation has taken 400,000 acres of the people's finest timber lands under the guise of forest reserve legislation. The forest reserves are an European invention, a mild name for a game preserve on which to multiply officialism, with which the land is swarming in every direction. Like the lice and frogs God sent as a plague on the Egyptians, the multiplication of officialism goes on. What is worse, the public lands are stolen and sequestered from the thousands who need homes, and who would protect the forest against fires. The Europeanization of America will not cease until the country is on the verge of a political revolution—if not over the verge. Oregon is sowing the seed that will result in a bloody harvest all over this nation some day.

RURAL MAILS HURT TRADE.

WASHINGTON, D C, July 29.—The rural mail delivery was hailed with delight when it was first placed in to operation, but there

promises to develop a lively opposition to its further extension. The country storekeeper declares that it is ruining his business and he is calling upon his Congressman for redress. Under the old postal regulations the farmer went to the village for his mail, and just so sure as he went he left some money with the storekeeper. Now he remains at home, never going to the village except in cases of necessity, enlisting the services of the mail carrier to do some little chores which he desires.

According to the census reports the farmer's business in the United States for the year 1899 turned in a gross income of 18.3 per cent. June 1, 1900, there were 5,739,657 farms in this country, and they were valued at \$16,574,690,247, of which 78.6 per cent represented land and improvements and 21.4 per cent buildings. On these farms were implements and machinery valued at \$761,261,550 and live stock to the amount of \$3,078,050,041. Total value of farm property thus accounted for, \$20,614,001,632. So the horny-handed tiller of the soil is established perhaps to his own surprise, well up in the billion dollar class. Since 1850 the farms have multiplied four times and the total values more than five times. Gains of value in the West have much more than offset the Eastern decrease. As the World recently noted, New York is high in rank among the agricultural states of the Union. It is preceded by Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania, in that order. The census reveals no reason why "the whistling farmer boy" should change from his merry tune.—World.

The New York World gives the public this bit of consolation: "The beef packers are promptly meeting out their punishment to the public. The eighty millions of Americans have the temerity to object to being robbed, and the government, after much pressure, brought action which has not yet acted so far as prices are concerned. The packers, accepting this as a piece of impudence, now proceed to form a new trust that will place them above all the laws against increasing prices. It begins to look as though the poor public had better keep quiet or cease to exist." If the "poor public" does not possess the courage and industry to stand up for its rights against a handful of men who seek to impose upon it, then it would be better for the poor public "to keep quiet or cease to exist." But if the American people shall become thoroughly aroused and shall be persuaded to use the power within their grasp, there is no trust and no coterie of men seeking to thrive upon public misery that can long withstand the determined assault.

The annual cry about the relationship between the State University and the Eugene Divinity School has been taken up by the Oregonian. The matter has been discussed by the GUARD before, and it has been shown that the two institutions have no organic connection whatever and are entirely separate from each other.
