PENALTY FOR SETTING FIRES.

Governor Geer Issues Annual Proclamation on the Subject.

SALEM, July 29.—Governor Geer has issued his annual proclamation warning against setting fires that may spread to timber, fences or crops. The law on the subject provides a fine of \$20 to \$1000 or imprisonment from three to twelve months for maliciously setting a fire which shall destroy the buildings, crops, fences or timber of another. If the fire be set without malice and yet destroy such property, the person setting the fire is liable to a fine of \$10 to \$100. Any person setting fire to a wooded country or forest owned by the United States is liable to a fine of \$1000, or imprisonment for one year, or both fine and imprisonment. In all cases one-half of the fine is paid to the person who first furnishes the information to the district attorney.

IMPROVEMENTS AT UO

Many Conveniences Ready For Next Session of School.

NEW APARTMENTS.

Daily Guard July 31.
When the session of school opens at the University next September there will be many changes not only in the faculty but also in the buildings and campus. A number of men are kept busy on the several different divisions of improvement and re-arrangement. The work may be conveniently grouped under five heads for explanation as follows: New apartments at Deady Hall; new electric lighting system; new sewer system; changes at dormitory; and new bath system in gymnasium.

NEW APARTMENTS IN DEADY HALL.
For a number of years, especially since the departments have become larger, and more systematized, the physics department under Dr. Chas. Friedel has needed larger and better arranged rooms for carrying on the work both in general and experimental physics. This need will be met for a few years to come by removing the laboratories and apparatus from the first floor of Deady Hall to the basement. To do this properly will cost the University over \$4,000. The entire basement had to be taken out and considerable excavation was necessary. New floor and walls, new plumbing and piping system for water and gas, and new system of wiring for lighting partly cover the work. The windows and staircases are also being replaced. The work of the department will be greatly facilitated in the new quarters.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING SYSTEM.
Heretofore the University has had no regular system of electric lighting. Under the direction of Mr. R. H. Dearborn, the old wires and poles have all been taken down and a newly arranged set are being put in place. The poles have all been painted green and added greatly to the appearance of the campus. Another dynamo, a 9 k w machine and a duplicate of the one now in use will be installed together with a fine marble switch-board. The stiles of Willard Hall and the Gymnasium have been re-wired and a new system has been put in the basement of Deady Hall and the Gymnasium. An inter-communicating telephone line is to be established between the four buildings, Willard, Deady, McClure and the Engineering halls.

NEW SEWER SYSTEM.
Two years ago a new system of sewer mains were laid on the campus. At that time the Dormitory and McClure Hall were connected. Last year the Engineering Hall was connected with it; this year an extension of the main was made and Deady Hall was joined on. Next summer, if sufficient means are at hand, the remaining buildings, Willard Hall, will be put on the main. The work has been done under the direction of Prof. E. H. McAllister, and those who have examined the work say it is the best laid sewer in the city.

CHANGES AT THE DORMITORY.
The library of the University is increasing in size gradually and at present the rooms on the first floor of the north end of the Dormitory are too small for the accommodation of all the books. The rooms on the second floor on the north end have been fitted with new shelves and doors will be used for library purposes. In regard to the management of the Dormitory as such, next year, nothing will be made known until after the meeting of the board of regents on next Saturday, August 2.

NEW BATHS IN GYMNASIUM.
Considerable complaint has been made heretofore concerning the baths at the Gymnasium. During this summer Stewart L. H. Johnson has had the whole of the old floor and stairs torn out and replaced by a cement floor and walls lined with zinc to a height of three feet so that all the water will be run into the sewer. A new dressing room has been fitted up for the football players in order to keep everything free from mud. The same tanks will be used for heating but the steam will be run through long coils instead of passing directly through the water, in that manner keeping the water hot without direct waste of steam in the heating system. The bath will be very sanitary as far as drainage, etc., are concerned and the complaints will meet.

ROUTE ESTABLISHED

Inspector Clement Reports Favorably on Rural Mail Route

EXAMINATIONS HELD

Daily Guard July 31.
Rural Mail Route Inspector E. U. Clement, who has been here the past two days looking over the practicability of establishing a rural free mail delivery route along the road leading through Fairmount, Springfield and the country north of Springfield and north-east of Eugene, left for Milwaukie, Or., on this afternoon's train to look over a route there.

Mr. Clement, when seen by a GUARD reporter this afternoon, stated that the proposed new route is a very good one and that he has recommended the establishment of free delivery on the same. Mr. Clement went over the route yesterday. It covers a distance of 22½ miles and will accommodate about 825 people. It will be five or six weeks before the route is fully established and in working order.

In speaking of the rural free delivery system Mr. Clement said that the government was liberal in its appropriation this year, \$7,250,000 having been set aside for that purpose. He said that routes are being established all over the country at the rate of 400 a month.

EXAMINATION HELD.

The examination for carrier and sub-carrier for the new route was held this forenoon in the High School building. Out of the 17 applicants only four appeared for the examination. They were Alfred A. King, Frank McMurry, Cecil Henderson and J. H. Maxwell.

STREET FAIR

May Be Held in Streets Surrounding Park—Meeting Tonight.

The executive board of the street fair and carnival held another meeting last night at which time several joint committees reported progress. The board appointed M. Svarverud, Geo. Fisher and W. M. Renshaw a committee on concessions. Geo. H. Yerington was added to the mineral display committee. The advertising committee was authorized to issue to the merchants carnival advertising matter that may be inserted into business letters. A proposition is being considered to enclose a block of a side street for a big display of minerals, agricultural and horticultural products.

A committee consisting of Geo. Fisher, W. M. Renshaw and G. W. Griffin was appointed to take hold of the
