PROF. BLACK DIED AT LA GRANDE

Taken Off the Train Today
on His Way to Boulder,
Colorado.

This forenoon the following telegram
was received at the First National
Bank:

LA GRANDE, O., Aug. 11.
FIRST NATIONAL BANK, Eugene, O.:
C. W. M. Black, a passenger on our east-
bound train taken off at La Grande
this morning very sick and expected to
die. Can you advise in regard to rela-
tives?

Professor Black, who is assistant
instructor in Mathematics at the Uni-
versity of Oregon, having come from
Harvard at the beginning of the last
school year, has been suffering from
consumption for some time. About a
week ago he returned to Eugene from
the upper McKean resorts where he
went with hopes of benefiting his
health but he was much worse when
he came back than he was when he
left here. He started yesterday for
Boulder, Col., where the dry atmos-
phere is excellent for consumptives,
but could go only as far as La Grande
according to the message received over
the wires.

The only relative of the professor's
known of by Eugene people is his
brother, R. Bert Black, who is taking
a course in the school of mines at
Houghton, Mich. He has been notifi-
ed of the professor's serious condition.

DIED THIS AFTERNOON.
A telegram was received this after-
noon at the bank conveying the infor-
mation that Professor Black had died.
His many friends will hear of this
sad news with sincere regret. The
dead man's relatives have been tele-
graphed to but being unable to locate
him instructions have been sent to
embalm the body and hold it until
further instructed.

Linton Farm Sold.

This afternoon at one o'clock at the
courthouse door the T. D. Linton farm
of about 170 acres, lying immediately
north of the city, across the river, was
sold at sheriff's sale to J. H. McClung
for the sum of \$10,025 on a fore-closure
of mortgage held by Mr. McClung.

There was some lively bidding at the
sale. Three bidders were present, E. C.
Smith, Mrs. J. D. Vies and Attorney
John A. Pike, the latter representing
Mr. McClung. The bidding started at
something over \$5,000, and ran up to
\$10,025, when it was sold to Mr. Mc-
Clung. Mr. Smith's last bid was
\$10,010 and Mrs. Vies' \$9,000.

The farm is one of the finest in Lane
county and is well worth the price
paid for it. There are something like
60 acres in hops on the place, the yard
this year being conducted by Mr. and
Mrs. J. Davies.

Will Send Exhibit East.

The Willamette Valley Land Co. is
getting up a big display of Lane coun-
ty products, grains, fruits, wool, hops,
minerals, etc., and expects to ship it to
Lincoln, Neb., this week where Willard
Cooper, who is conducting a branch
office of the company, will take charge
of it and exhibit it at the Nebraska
state fair which will be held at Lincoln
next week.

The company has obtained space
at the fair for the display and will
have a tent 20x30 feet for that purpose.
This will be a splendid method of
advertising our resources among the
people of Nebraska, as thousands of
people from all over the state attend
the state fair, and they are bound to
see the display.

WANT MORE FIRE HYDRANTS

Argued That They are Too Far
Apart For Effective
Service.

The Eugene correspondent to the Ore-
gonian says:

The Eugene fire department has a
proposition to present to the council at
the next meeting for more hydrants for
better fire protection. It is the desire
of the firemen to have sufficient hy-
drants and have them so located that
the distance would not be more than
400 feet from any house in the city to
the nearest fire plug. The hose carts
carry 500 feet of hose each and it is the
desire to have this reach any fire.

At present there are many houses in
the city that could not be reached with
water until at least two carts could
unite their hose, and in a few instances
three carts would be required. While
this is the case there is danger of fire
going to extreme proportions where a
convenient hose would enable the fire-
men to subdue it with little damage.

Young Men in Trouble.

Mrs. Taylor, of Irving, the mother of
May Taylor, one of the young girls
who was placed in the city jail the
other day on the charge of vagrancy,

Medals for Marksmen.

The board of officers of the Oregon
National Guard met last week and de-
cided to offer a silver cup to the com-
pany scoring the highest in target
shooting. Marksmen's badges will be
offered to the members making the
highest in individual scores. This
was decided upon to stimulate the
practice of target shooting and shoot-
ing accurate. The officers of the Ore-
gon National Guard claim that by
January 1, Oregon will have the best
drilled militia in the United States.

BOOTH-KELLY CO'S BIG SURVEY

Lands on the Military Road
Grant to Be Surveyed at
Once.

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 11.—H. C. Per-
kins and Fred Mensch, of this city,
have obtained the contract for survey-
ing the military road grant, compris-
ing portions of six townships lying
directly on the summit of the Cas-
cades between the headwaters of the
Dechabates and Willamette rivers.

The work is to be done for the gov-
ernment, but directly for the Booth-
Kelly Lumber Company, which re-
cently secured an option for the pur-
chase of the big timber tract of the
California Company, which purchased
it of the Pendra Company several
years ago. The Booth-Kelly Company
will furnish the money for the survey
of the grant, but will be repaid by the
government upon the presentation of
proper vouchers in accordance with an
act of congress passed several years
ago. When the lumber company has
completed the survey on the land
grant, and has decided it to the United
States, scrip will be issued in lieu of it,
which can be exchanged for any other
government land situated anywhere
that is worth and selling for \$5 an acre
or more. This exchange may be made
either for timber or for grazing or
prairie land.

The surveying party left here and
will go by way of the Upper Regu-
lar road, passing through Crater
Lake National Park, on the other side
of which the surveying will begin.
The party is desirous of completing
the survey of the mountain portion
before October, as the snow will begin
to fall soon after that time and greatly
impede the progress of the work.

MONTHLY MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

Alder and A Streets Ordered Graded—New Sewers Ordered.

The regular monthly meeting of the
city council was held last night with
Mayor Chrisman, Councilman Dorris,
Paine, Green and Henderson present.

The meeting was an uneventful one,
there being but little business trans-
acted.

The principal business was the
ordering of a sewer built through the
alley from the center of block 1, Skinner-
ton's donation, to Fifteenth street and
one to run west from the west end of
the Eleventh street sewer. Several
protests were filed against the pro-
posed sewer, but the council acted on
the favorable report of the viewers, R.
M. Day, S. M. Yoran and W. W. Martin,
and ordered the city recorder to adver-
tise bids for constructing said sewers.

An ordinance to establish the grade
of Alder and A streets from East 11th
street to East Thirteenth street was
passed and the recorder was directed
to advertise for bids for the improve-
ment.

During the meeting Councilman
Green, chairman of the street com-
mittee, reported the use of 9045 feet of
new lumber and 890 feet of old lumber
in repair of streets and alleys.

Councilman Paine, chairman of the
health committee, reported that the
sewer had been notified to improve
the sanitary conditions about the
factory and that the same had been
done.

An adjourned meeting will be held
Wednesday evening.

Oil Drill Burned.

ASHLAND, Aug. 12.—The splendid
drilling plant of the Southern Oregon
Oil Company, of Ashland, located on
the Alfred place one and one-half miles
east of town, was destroyed by a fire,
whose origin is a mystery, Saturday
afternoon at about 2 o'clock. The large
barn of Mr. George M. Wright, with its
entire contents, situated on adjacent
ground, was also destroyed by fire at
the same time, the barn having caught
from the flaming buildings of the oil
company's plant. The fire represented
a loss of approximately \$2500 to the oil
company, and \$1000 to Mr. Wright.
There was no insurance.

Fine Hops.

Ed Ayers, of Harrisburg, has sent
the GUARD some clusters of hops which
are beautiful. There is one branch of
early hops, picking of which will com-
mence in a short time, and a branch of
later ones. The hops are large and
very well developed for this time of
the season.

A Medford, Ore., dispatch says that
50 carloads of Bartlett pears will be
shipped this season to Eastern markets
from that place. Consignments will
begin this week.

ROOSEVELT WILL COME TO OREGON

He Is Desirous of Becoming
Acquainted With the
State.

"President Roosevelt is very anxious
to visit Oregon," said Hon. Bingie Her-
mann, commissioner-general of the
United States land office, in an inter-
view by the Portland Telegram. Mr.
Hermann is on his way to his home at
Roseburg and is visiting the United
States surveyor-general in this city.
In conversation this afternoon the ex-
congressman referred to the intentions
of President Roosevelt to visit this
state.

"Many times has the president
spoken to me of coming to Oregon,"
replied Mr. Hermann. "He has re-
peatedly declared that he is desirous of
touring this vast, wealthy region of
the Pacific Coast. Of his great inter-
est in Oregon there can be no doubt.
I do not believe he will come to Oregon
this autumn, however, but I am posi-
tive he will make the journey early
next year. As is well known the pre-
sident is enthusiastic when big game is
concerned and Oregon is adequately
supplied in this direction.

Ingram at Albany.

Albany Democrat, yesterday: Frank
Ingram returned this noon from Sas-
sumet where he has been residing for
ten years and four or five months, and
will remain in Albany for awhile, just
how long he doesn't know yet. Two
months ago last Saturday, it will be
remembered he was shot by a bullet
while Tracy and Merrill were escaping
and his leg was amputated two months
ago today, so that he is now short one
leg. He has with him a pad of heart-
toss, which he will rattle off. When
shot he had a couple of sets, which he
had previously made. One of them he
rattled off in Salem, and the other
will be disposed of here. He looks
quite natural and well and wears his
beard the same as formerly, with side-
burns. He is an expert blacksmith
and will probably eventually get into
the business particularly if he succeeds
in getting a new leg. He has had an
eventful career since leaving Albany,
and is glad to be back in Lane county.

Ingram's version of the shooting by
which he lost his leg is that he was
endeavoring to wrench the gun from
Merrill, when the latter purpose, shot
him, and it was not an accident as
some of the paper have stated.

Coal in Douglas County.

Grants Pass Journal:—Two prospec-
tors, one of them being a coal miner
from the coal fields of Pennsylvania,
came in Monday from a long prospect-
ing trip in the mountains in Douglas
county. They report the discovery of
coal of a most superior quality, and of
great extent and of surprising depth of
vein.

When asked what they proposed do-
ing with their find, they said: "Being
poor men, we shall await the action
of capital that is looking for a good
thing in the way of a very remuner-
ative investment."

Raising Spanish Ships.

The navy department has awarded
contracts through the commandant of
the navy yard at Cavite to the Philip-
pine Engineering & Construction Co.
for raising the Spanish war ships Ad-
miral Dewey sank in the famous bat-
le of Manila Bay. The contract includes
the wrecking and dismantling of one
of the ships as well as for further ex-
penses. Nine of them are so badly damaged
that they are not worth raising. The
work has already begun and is to be
completed within a year.

BARCELONA SACKED.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Police-
men detected thugs robbing

certed effort was made to
capture them by the police-
men within call.

The burglars opened fire
on the police force and killed
two policemen. They then
succeeded in making their
escape from the premises.
Eighty suspects have been
placed under arrest.

Wright Not Yet Located.

Since the first report was received
by the officers three weeks ago that
Harry Wright had been seen in the
vicinity of his former home in the
Wolf Creek country, about 20 miles
west of Eugene, considerable effort has
been made to locate the alleged ac-
complice of Tracy and Merrill in their
escape from the penitentiary, but
without success.

Beyond the fact that he was known
to be with friends three weeks ago,
nothing can be learned of his where-
abouts or his movements. It is still
believed, however, that he is yet in this
county, being kept in concealment by
friends, and that the officers will
finally locate and capture him.
