

PAY YOUR TAXES

Unpaid Accounts Become Delinquent October 6th.

No Extension in Time Will Be Given for Making Payments—The New Law Quoted.

Under the new law for the collection of taxes, unpaid taxes become delinquent after the first Monday in October. The county courts have absolute jurisdiction in the premises, and do not have the right to extend for a day the time for the collection of unpaid taxes. Under the old law regulating the collection of taxes, the payment of the same became delinquent after April 1st, but the county court had the authority to make such extensions of time in which to make the collections as was deemed proper. But the county court has no power to act in this relation under the new law, and taxes will become delinquent after the first Monday in October.

Section 19, of the new law, treats with the delinquent roll, and prescribes when and in what manner it shall be made as follows:

"If any of the taxes mentioned in the roll shall remain unpaid, and the sheriff shall be unable to collect the same, he shall immediately after the first Monday of October extend the amount of the tax on each several parcel of real property, and upon the personal property assessed to each individual, in a column provided for such purposes on the tax roll, be delinquent, and shall return such roll, together with a statement compiled therefrom and entered thereon showing the total amount of taxes collected, the total amount of double assessments and other errors." etc.

Subsequent sections of the act provide that after the examination by the county clerk of the roll, and when the proper credits have been made for errors, etc., then the roll shall be returned to the sheriff with a warrant commanding him to sell the property upon which the tax was levied. So it will be seen that the county court has no voice in the matter. The time when the unpaid taxes become delinquent on the roll now being collected is regulated entirely by the statute, and there will be no extension of time this year.

W. T. Kayser's Lodging House.

W T Kayser, the former Elmira merchant, and who has many friends in Eugene, is putting up a lodging house at Cottage Grove. The Nugget says: "W T Kayser last Monday let a contract to O M Madden, architect recently from California, for the erection of one of the finest resident lodging houses in this section of Oregon to be erected on the south corner of the Hastings property. The workmen commenced work Monday morning and the building will be completed in 60 days. The building will be 30x44, on a brick foundation 16 inches wide, hard finished and oiled. It will be a two-story 18 room house with all modern improvements. The walls will be decorated. The stiles tarred and studding covered with building paper. When completed it will be one of the handsomest buildings in South Lane county."

A Divorce Suit.

Emma Picarel has instituted suit in the Lane county circuit court against her husband, John Picarel, for divorce and the custody of two minor children. The plaintiff alleges in the complaint that she and her husband were married at Salem July 6, 1891. That plaintiff at all times has been a faithful and dutiful wife; that defendant disregarding his marriage vows, without cause or provocation, in 1892, deserted plaintiff and has not lived or cohabited with plaintiff since said desertion, or contributed anything to her support. That there are as fruits of said marriage two sons, one Joseph Earl, 13 years old, by a former marriage of said defendant, and Robert Edward, 10 years old by the last marriage.

George Drake, a burly specimen of the colored population, of Salem was placed under arrest at Oregon City early yesterday morning, charged with adultery.

The warrant was sworn out by John Tidwell, a local horse trader residing in West Salem, who charges the negro with lewd cohabitation with his (Tidwell's) wife who left her home, husband and children at a late hour of the night some two weeks ago, and is believed to have eloped with the negro in custody. Mr Tidwell feels satisfied that his wife eloped with the negro and feels certain that he has been living together and that he has evidence sufficient to convict him of the charge.

Not many months ago Mrs Tidwell disappeared from her home under the same circumstances and Mr Tidwell traced her, in company with Drake to Eugene, but when services were attempted to be made upon them they got wind of the matter in some way and had made their escape when the officers made a raid upon their supposed rendezvous.

Drake was brought to Salem on the 11 o'clock train yesterday morning, arraigned before Recorder Judah at 11:30 o'clock, plead "not guilty" and was remanded to jail to appear for a hearing.

NO HOP CONTRACTS HERE

Hop Men in Fair Way to Make Pile of Money.

S. H. Friendly and F. E. Dunn Furnish Most of Money to Growers for Picking Purposes.

The following review of the hop situation in Lane county appeared in the Oregonian, by A W Prescott, of Salem: Lane county hop growers are in a fair way to make a good pile of money out of their crops this year. Robert Hays, one of the best known growers in the county, says that, so far as he knows, not a single crop has been contracted and a prominent dealer declares that not a contract has been made. The hops are in a splendid condition, and promise a large yield, so that the growers will get the full benefit of the high prices. A normal yield in Lane county is about 4000 bales, and from present indications this year's crop will equal that amount.

Lane county hop growers have always refrained from selling their hops in advance of picking and while they may have lost good sales in a few instances, they hold to the opinion that one year with another they fare better by taking the chances on a rise or fall in prices. Of course many hop crops are mortgaged to secure picking money but the mortgages leave the grower in a position to profit by a price that is high enough to leave a margin after all expenses are paid. Whatever the growers gain by having their hops free from the iron-clad contract, which this year holds so many Oregon crops, is due to a custom which is said to have been established by S H Friendly and F E Dunn. These men, it seems, furnish much of the money that is borrowed for hopping purposes and they have loaned it upon other security than contracts. This manner of securing picking money was adopted from the first, and the contracting plan has never been known here.

Mining Delegates Appointed.

Mayor G R Chrisman has received authority to appoint five delegates to the International Mining Congress which meets at Butte, Montana, September 1 to 5 inclusive. Acting upon the authority, Mr Chrisman has appointed Herbert Leigh and Geo A Dyson, of Eugene, and Attorneys J E Young and F G Eby, of Cottage Grove. The fifth one has not yet been selected, but Mr Chrisman says he wants to appoint a representative from Blue River.
